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Though the new Grinch is less zany, this is still the charming Christmas play that marks the beginning of the holiday season for so many San Diegans.

It opens, as always, with the delightful chorale, "Welcome Christmas (Fah Who Doraze)," immediately setting the tone of holiday cheer and filling the room with warm fuzzies. The songs come one right after another without much lull in between. The audience is even encouraged to sing along to "You're A Mean One, Mr. Grinch," from the original 1966 cartoon.

The black-and-white sets continue to look as if you're actually sitting in a Dr. Seuss storybook, and the quirky red and pink bulbous costumes are the ultimate in eye candy.

The play, which is 75 minutes long and has no intermission, has always done a good job of making the material sophisticated enough for regular theatergoers and silly enough for young ones to enjoy. And this year's cast of young actors continues that tradition.

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Caitlin McAuliffe, who played Cindy-Lou Who on Friday night, certainly holds her own against the Broadway veteran and alongside seasoned Globe actors such as Phil Johnson (Grandpa Who).

And don't worry, the Grinch may be more sincere, but he still provides plenty of laugh-out-loud moments. He chastises the audience for clapping too long for Max, contorts his body in crazy shapes to show exactly how much he hates Christmas and particularly shines during the monologue.

All those elements - the costumes, the jokes, the music - help the message of Dr. Seuss' original work shine through. The holidays are meant to be with loved ones, taking in memories such as the one that the "Grinch" production will surely provide.

He's back.

Sure, he's as tall as a power forward and can bench press, he brags, 450 pounds. He can sing up a storm and trip the light fantastic and impersonate everyone from Arnold Schwarzenegger and John Wayne to Elvis and Michael Jackson.

The Grinch'll be the first to tell you he's "one of a kind," an island unto himself. But if being unique's such a big deal, why must the evergreen Sasquatch terrorize Whoville on Christmas Eve?

Maybe what the bowling-pin-shaped Whos say is true: his heart is "two sizes too small"; or, even more to the point, it's "full of unwashed socks."

But maybe the Grinch does have a point: Christmas has become too commercial and Whoville has lost the true spirit.

This makes his theft of the presents a kind of intervention. In spite of his eagerness to raise havoc, the Grinch is a Necessary Meanie. He restores the holiday and rediscovers himself in the process.

Steve Blanchard's the new Grinch in town, and he's a hoot. He's nasty enough to inspire trepidation but establishes instant rapport with his audience. Direct addresses and snide asides cement that connection with laughter.

Grinch is actually a memory play: Old Max the dog recalls the time in his youth when things changed radically for the better. Steve Gunderson makes Max unforgettable.

Grinch carries on another tradition: the Globe hires San Diego actors (and gives scads of youngsters experience in a professional production). Geno and Nancy Snow Carr, Phil Johnson, Amanda Naughton, and Randall Dodge are local performers given prominent roles. Not to mention eight-year-old Caitlin McAuliffe, who alternates with Remy Margaret Corbin as Cindy Lou Who.

Wearing Robert Morgan's candystripe costumes, the Whos waddle freely on John Lee Beatty's set, where the snowdrifts look like giant marshmallows.

Critic's Choice

The Old Globe's "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas" musical is well into its teens, but it's showing no signs of age in its 14th annual staging that opened this past weekend.

The secret to keeping the evergreen show fresh is how director James Vasquez changes things up every year. The 2011 show has a new Grinch, a mostly new Who family and a new narrator, as well as lots of new bits that fill every second of the intermissionless 80-minute show with laughs, visual wonder and magic.

For those new to the "Grinch," the 1997 musical was conceived and directed by former Old Globe artistic chief Jack O'Brien with book and lyrics by Timothy Mason and music by Mel Marvin. It's based on the 1957 children's book by late La Jolla resident Theodor "Dr. Seuss" Geisel and features some songs and elements from the famed 1966 animated edition of the story.

O'Brien's concept was to re-create the Seuss storybook and characters onstage, an eye-popping feat amazingly achieved by scenic designer John Lee Beatty and costumer Robert Morgan. And the show is chockablock with special effects, singalongs and audience interaction.

Highlighting this year's show is Steve Blanchard as the cranky green Grinch, who disguises himself as Santa to steal all the Christmas gifts (but none of the holiday cheer) from the villagers of Whoville one Christmas Eve. Blanchard played the Beast in "Disney's Beauty and the Beast" on Broadway for eight years, and he brings that powerful and dark presence to the role. He's huge (6-foot-3), has a rich, deep singing voice ---- and quite an impressive roar. He brings both a maturity and a slight menace to the role not seen before, and he adds an appropriate gruffness to his songs.

Yet even if Blanchard's the meanest Grinch so far, he's also one of the funniest, particularly in his solo number "One of a Kind," his self-adoring belly-rubbing, and his interactions with Cindy-Lou Who, the tiny girl who melts his heart. Cindy-Lou is being played at alternate performances by two North County grade-schoolers, Caitlin McAuliffe and Remy Margaret Corbin (adorable and poised at the performance I attended).

Steve Gunderson, who has played Papa Who for many years, has stepped into the role of narrator as Old Max, the aged version of the Grinch's dog Young Max. Gunderson is cuddly and warm in the part, and a good match for Logan Lipton, the sweet, energetic actor who's playing the young version of Max for his fourth year.

Longtime local actors Reno Carr and Kelsey Venter debut as Papa and Mama Who, and San Diego State grad Venter shows some impressive vocal chops in the part. Phil Johnson is especially endearing as Grandpa Who, and Amanda Naughton is quirky as Grandma Who.

Every seat was filled at one of three performances of the "Grinch" on Sunday, so this musical is showing no signs of waning popularity. Vasquez's show has heart, and it's still one of my favorite ways to get the holiday spirit flowing each year.

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

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THEATER REVIEW: "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas" will melt your heart

That grouchy green Grinch with the hairy, rancid seaweed-look outfit is back in town, still raging at Christmas and the Whos who love it.

The 14th edition of The Old Globe's beloved Christmas tradition "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas" plays through Dec. 31 on the Globe's main stage.

You remember the story: the (new) Grinch (Steve Blanchard), tired of putting up with all that Christmas cheer year after year, comes up with a terrible, wonderful plan to eliminate the season altogether.

He drafts his poor dog Max (returnee Logan Lipton) for the nefarious deed, forcing him to make like a reindeer by strapping fake antlers on his head. The idea is to steal all the gifts in Whoville - and therefore Christmas itself.

Brilliant, right? But little Cindy-Lou Who (returnee Remy Margaret Corbin) disarms the Grinch with her childlike trust and sunny outlook, which just might soften that famous heart that's two sizes too small.

"Oh. It's a ballad," deadpans the Grinch as she prepares to sing "Santa For a Day."

Broadway veteran Blanchard, new to the cast as the Grinch, puts his stamp on the part with his vamping of John Wayne and Elvis on the great vaudeville-inspired song "One Of A Kind" and the last-scene addition of the green giant blowing a fanciful Seussian shofar.

The cast boasts many returnees and some new faces, all of whom cavort, dance and sing appropriately and, most of all, amuse - thanks in no small measure to Robert Morgan's now-familiar bulbous pink (or red, depending on which cast you see) and white costumes.

The show, with charming songs by Mel Marvin and book and clever lyrics by Timothy Mason, wears surprisingly well, even for this grouchy old critic who has seen every single incarnation.

I predict you'll leave the theater with a smile - and maybe even damp eyes.

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Poway girl shines in Old Globe's 'Grinch'

The Old Globe's 14th annual production of Dr. Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" is a musical sure to bring joy to those of all ages - and sizes of hearts - this holiday season.

90-minute The show (there's no intermission) is an expansion of the book and animated television show of the same name. It tells the story of the Grinch who sets out to destroy Christmas for the residents of Whoville.

The Grinch's dislike of the holiday throughout his 53 years is thought to be due to his heart being "two sizes too small," according to Whoville residents and his loyal dog Max, who as his older self serves as narrator. Returning for the ninth-year as Old Max is Steve Gunderson, who has also appeared in several other Globe productions.

The "too small" heart, however, begins to soften (or grow) when the Grinch . ably portrayed by Broadway veteran Steve Blanchard encounters Cindy-Lou Who on Christmas Eve while steal-

ing her family's gifts, tree and holiday feast.

On opening night last Friday, Cindy-Lou was played by 8-year-old Poway resident Caitlin McAuliffe in her professional acting debut. She shares the role with Remy Margaret Corbin who made her Old Globe debut in the same role last year. All roles for children have been double cast so they can alternate among the 59 performances

scheduled throughout the show's run that concludes on Dec. 31.

Caitlin was adorable playthe sweetly innocent ing Cindy-Lou, who managed to pull at the audience's heartstrings when singing "Santa for a Day" and was undaunted when confronting the fearful and towering Grinch.

Blanchard, making his Old Globe debut, is wonderful playing the villain that is hard not to like by the end. Part of that was due to the way he interacted with Caitlin and the audience. Another reason was how he and Logan Lipton, another Broadway veteran playing Young Max for the fourth time at the Globe, played off each other. They have great comedic timing and Lipton is a talented dancer. Despite all his makeup, Blanchard's facial expressions at times were priceless.

Though the story was originally written by the San Diego-based Seuss for children, there are plenty of contemporary jokes and gestures - especially by Blanchard - that are geared toward adults and make the show entertaining for all, accompanied by children or not.

In addition, the audience is incorporated into the production by being invited to sing "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch." (If you don't remember the lyrics from the animated show, there's no need to fear as they are provided on stage.)

With the exception of Dec. 2, Christmas day and all Mondays (except Dec. 26 which has two shows), "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" can be seen daily through Dec. 31 in the Old Globe Theatre's Conrad Prebys Theatre Center

Tickets start at \$39 for adults, \$24 for youths ages 3-17. Children under age 3 are only allowed to 11 a.m. performances. There are morning, afternoon and evening shows including three during Balboa Park's December Nights festivities this Saturday (Dec. 3). 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How The Grinch Stole Christmas

What better time to begin the Christmas season and imbue oneself with cheer than on the day following Thanksgiving? No, it wasn't the Black Friday sales, although the shopping scene in Timothy Mason and Mel Marvin's "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" puts one in mind of the mall.

It's a kinder, gentler mall and it's in Whoville. The bargain is feeling one's Grinchy heart lifted as children in the plaza and in their seats at the Old Globe Theatre experience the simple wonder seeing a green, fuzzy beast discover that he can't steal Christmas from the Whos, who carry the holiday in their hearts. In other words, it's not the gifts under the tree or their cost, or even the roast beast; the deeper joy of the season is in family, the upturned faces of children and love.

The story of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" is told by the green guy's dog, Old Max (Steve Gunderson, a veteran of the production, new to this role). Old Max has come to bid farewell to memories of that day from long ago, when he was just a pup (Young Max is again played the charming Logan Lipton), and the grumpy Grinch (debuting Broadway matinee idol Steve Blanchard) decided to stop the joy and the caroling down in Whoville by stealing Christmas. As those who read Dr. Seuss' books to their children know, Mr. Grinch fails because he meets a little girl named Cindy Lou Who (8-year-old Caitlin McAuliffe, who alternates in the role with Remy Margaret Corbin). In the stage production, she melts his heart with "Santa for a Day." His heart grows three sizes and he finds love and acceptance

in Whoville despite his appearance and his attempted theft. Twenty youngsters divided into two teams comprise the young and teen Whos.

The current production, continuing through Dec. 31, is the Old Globe's 14th annual. As seasoned attendees discover, the show is invigorated this year with a new quartet of adult cast members, Geno Carr as Papa Who, Kelsey Venter as Mama Who, Phil Johnson as Grandpa Who, and Amanda Naughton as Grandma Who. Veterans also notice more subtle insertions and a few reinvigorated costumes. Whos are a notable challenge to fit, with their odd, insect-like bodies and the men and boys'

wasp-like tails. Robert Morgan's original costume designs are still endearing. James Vasquez directs the production originally conceived and directed by Jack O'Brien.

Each year one goes home humming songs from the familiar score, notably "Santa for a Day," but this year in particular the anthem "Fah Who Doraze (Welcome Christmas)," Old and Young Max's duet "This Time of Year," and the adult quartet "Now's the Time." Blanchard hasn't fully

captured the vaudevillian "One of a Kind" and is, as of now, a kinder, gentler Grinch, but it's a tough balancing act being green and mean and still not scaring the little ones.

Music Director Ron Colvard conducts an eight-member orchestra. My only carp would be that Paul Peterson's sound design imbues the Who Chorale with vocal edginess that verges on unpleasant.◆

The Grinch still rules at The Old Globe

A review of a holiday classic tops our coverage of plays in local production

During a recent performance of *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*, the green meanie himself was just about to recite a line when a little girl from the audience cried out "The Grinch!" Not missing a beat, Grinch Steve Blanchard improvised: "She knows whose name's printed on the ticket."

That young theatergoer's exclamation makes a couple of salient points about this holiday musical, now in its 14th year at The Old Globe. First, the Grinch is unquestionably the star of the show, which lags (especially for squirmy kids) when he's off stage. And second, Blanchard, making his debut as the Grinch, is an inspired choice for the title role. He's benignly menacing, sufficiently athletic and funny in ways that will delight all ages. Everyone else—even Max the dog, both young and old versions—is a straight man in this production. Blanchard manages to be sincerely grinchy while at the same time letting us all know—well, at least the adults in the theater— that he's in on the ioke.

James Vasquez (last gig: *Richard O'Brien's The Rocky Horror Show*, also at the Globe) directs this year's *Grinch*, which has a book and lyrics by Timothy Mason and music by Mel Marvin. As always, it's a festive cartoon-come-to-life, with imaginative sets by

John Lee Beatty, Seussian costumes by Robert Morgan and very merry dancing and singing.

The show's most famous song, of course, is "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch," with "Welcome Christmas" (both are holdovers from the 1966 TV cartoon) a close second. That said, Blanchard earns laughs with "I Hate Christmas Eve" and "One of a Kind." The numbers set in Whoville, *sans* Grinch, feel routine. Even at her cutest, Cindy-Lou Who is no match for the Grinch when it comes to stage presence, and a child, be she ever so talented, is not going to hold us spellbound with her singing.

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The challenges of this show from the beginning had to be how to get 90 minutes of story out of a 69-page children's book and how to honor the beloved TV cartoon without merely reproducing it. The Globe must be doing something right—14 years speaks for itself. It helps to have the right guy in the green suit. This *Grinch* absolutely does.

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HOW THE GRINCH STOLE CHRISTMAS

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The Grinch has been stealing Christmas for the past fifty-four years, ever since the now classic Dr. Seuss children's book first hit the stands, yet who would have thought then that the curmudgeonly cave-dweller with a heart "two sizes too small" would go on to conquer the small screen (in a 1966 animated special featuring the voice of Boris Karloff as the Grinch), the big screen (Jim Carrey played the hairy Green One in 2000), and even Broadway (in musical theater form in 2006 and '07)? Not even Dr. Seuss himself could have imagined such a future for his 1957 picture book.



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The Grinch is of course the grouch turned green with envy at the sight of all those Whos just bursting with holiday excitement, while he sits crankily atop Mount Crumpit with only his faithful dog Max to keep him company. With a chip this big on his green shoulder, what's a Grinch to do but steal every one of their holiday presents and decorations and thereby "prevent Christmas from coming"? Unfortunately, mean old Mr. Grumpy didn't reckon with getting caught in the act by little Miss Cindy-Lou Who—or being mistaken for none other than ... Santy Claus!

The Broadway version of How The Grinch Stole Christmas, with its book and lyrics by Timothy Mason and music by Mel Marvin, began its life in Minneapolis in 1994. It's at San Diego's Old Globe Theatre, however, that the musical has had its greatest and most noteworthy success, and it is to the Old Globe that How The Grinch Stole Christmas has now returned for its fourteenth consecutive year of charming and delighting audiences of all ages.



In the musical version's most noteworthy innovation, book writer Mason created the role of Old Max, the elderly incarnation of the Grinch's faithful pooch, who narrates the tale with all those great Dr. Seuss rhymes like: "I know just what to do!' The Grinch laughed in his throat. And he made a quick Santy Claus hat and a coat. And he chuckled, and clucked, 'What a great Grinchy trick! 'With this coat and this hat, I look just like Saint Nick!'"

How The Grinch Stole Christmas's dozen or so songs include TV special's two most famous numbers, "Welcome Christmas (Fah Who Doraze)" and "You're A Mean One, Mr. Grinch," (music by Albert Hague) as well as the Mason/Marvin creations "Who Likes Christmas?", "I Hate Christmas Eve," "Santa For A Day," and a pair of songs added in 2007, "This Time Of Year" and "It's The Thought That Counts." (You'd think that after fourteen years, a cast recording would have been released, but alas, no such luck.)





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The 2011 production introduces Broadway's Steve Blanchard in his first Old Globe appearance in the title role, and what a tour-de-force performance it is. Deliciously dastardly, delightfully over-the-top, and cute as can be, Blanchard is a Grinch par excellence, and no more so than in the Fosse-esque number "One Of A Kind," a guaranteed show-stopper.

San Diego stalwart Steve Gunderson returns to the Grinch for his umpteenth year, but his first as the wise and wizened canine, Old Max, and he is as marvelous as might be expected. In his fourth year as Young Max is Broadway's Logan Lipton, and a more adorable performance (or performer) is hard to imagine. At the performance reviewed here, Remy Margaret Corbin was Cindy-Lou Who, so cute and cuddly that no Grinch could resist her tiny tot charms. (All the children's roles have been double cast to allow the pre-teens time to be kids.)

Appearing for the first time each as members of Cindy-Lou Who's family are Geno Carr (Papa Who), Kelsey Venter (Mama Who), Phil Johnson (Grandpa Who), and Amanda Naughton (Grandma Who)—and what a terrific quartet of triple threats they are, even hidden under Who wigs and behind Who makeup.

The kids in the "Pink Group" (reviewed here) are a talented bunch indeed: Jonas McMullen (Danny Who), Natasha Portnoy (Betty-Lou Who), Luke Babbitt (Boo Hoo), Annie Buckley (Annie Who), A.J. Foggiano (Teen Who), and the Little Whos: Emma Rasse, Kevin Davison, Nikki Castillo, and Blue Schroeder.




Completing the cast as the Grown-up Whos (as well as understudying leading roles) are the multitalented Jacob Caltrider, Nancy Snow Carr, Randall Dodge, Meredith Inglesby, Kyle J. Jackson, Carly Nykanen, and swing James Vásquez.

Longtime Grinch vet Vásquez finally gets to hold the directorial reins, and a finer choice could not have been made to carry on the work of Jack O'Brien, who conceived and directed the original Old Globe production. Vásquez, who is dance captain as well, has once again lovingly restaged John DeLuca's original (and by that I do mean original) choreography, with additional choreography credited to Bob Richard and restaged by Vásquez. Musical director Ron Colvard conducts the show's topnotch eight-piece orchestra.

If ever there was a musical's design team who should get above-the-title billing, it's How The Grinch Stole Christmas's scenic designer John Lee Beatty and costume designer Robert Morgan, who bring the original Dr. Seuss vision to vivid red, pink, black, and white life, the Grinch's green an innovation of the TV special. This time round, no one receives program credit for the show's authentically Seussical Christmas trees, cans of Who Hash, step ladders, roast beasts, sewing machines, and countless other Whoville paraphernalia, made with scarcely a straight line or right angle in sight.

Completing the Grinch design is the excellent work of lighting designer Pat Collins and sound designer Paul Peterson. Leila Knox is stage manager, Annette Yé assistant stage manager.

Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!

I have fond memories of watching "How the Grinch Stole Christmas

(http://www.imdb.com/title/tt0060345/)" on the black-and-white Motorola growing up. So I thought it would be nice to take my 9-year-old son to see the Old Globe's annual Grinch musical. Who couldn't use a stirring tale of redemption every now and then? And the boy could stand to redeem himself in any number of ways.

Let me assert my personal belief that theater should enhance self-knowledge. And in that sense, this musical did not disappoint. I realize now, I am the Grinch.

You're familiar with the story. Green Seussian creature loathes all aspects of Christmas and the Whos who celebrate it so loudly. He disguises himself as Santa, tethers his dog Max to a sleigh and attempts to confiscate all Christmas goodies and cheer. The tale is so nicely told in the cartoon. Boris Karloff's impeccable diction gives it just enough edge. The Whos, for the most part, are distant apparitions singing in the night.

The play, on the other hand, offers an up close and personal view of the Whos and Whoville. We see them shop and decorate and coo. The women are resplendent in their Who balloon dresses and the men are awkward in what can best be described as Who diapers. The children are proportioned more normally but add an element of treacle that could throw many people into diabetic shock.

Seeing the Whos in all their glory, I briefly felt empathy for the Grinch but ultimately zoomed to contempt. He didn't go far enough. He should have TP'd their houses and uprooted their rutabagas. And Max. In the cartoon, he is mostly ambivalent towards the Whos. He just wants to get through his crummy day. But theater Max (Steve Gunderson and Logan Lipton) is entirely pro-Who. He is a Who advocate.

In that light, the Grinch (Steve Blanchard) comes off less as a misanthrope than a perfectly reasonable creature. I too would recoil at the Whos, and often did. Blanchard's Grinch adds an element of humor to the performance but he is only one man.

James Vasquez's direction is mercifully quick. There are a lot of moving parts to this show and he winds them together quite nicely. The costumes, as mentioned, are effective and quite Who-ful. The sets are also nicely rendered and transmit a sense of motion when called for. The songs (except the anthem from the cartoon) are inoffensive and unchallenging. If they were wine, they would be white Zinfandel.

Anyway, as I looked around the audience, I noted that no one else seemed to share my disdain. People clapped and sang and chuckled merrily. There was even a grade-inflation standing ovation at the end. And I thought, what kind of a monster does not appreciate the sheer existential joy of happy Whos frolicking in the snow? A Grinch.

On the way to the car, I asked my son what he thought. "I don't know," he said. "I tend to like things with more plot development."

That's my boy.

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How The Grinch Won Christmas

EVEN BEFORE THE CURTAIN RISES, when the legendary voice of The Grinch booms out a warning to the audience (and, yes, all children) to not use cameras and to turn off their cell phones, it's obvious that a fun evening is in store. That's exactly what the 14th annual production of *Dr. Seuss'How The Grinch Stole Christmas* at The Old Globe provides. It's a winner.

Other than a few clips and that catchy "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch" tune, I had made it well into adulthood without experiencing this classic. I shouldn't have waited so long. Since the book was published in 1957, you probably know the story, set in the mythical realm of Whoville. Town residents are called Whos and all have Who in their names. They love and glory in Christmas. The Grinch, not so much. In fact, he loathes it, and no one seems to know why except perhaps because he has a heart "two sizes too small." A mysterious, rarely-seen green, furry creature who lives atop Mount Crumpit, The Grinch plots – with the help of his not-totally-willing dog Max – to "steal" Christmas from the town below, and worst of all, from its children, who he finds noisy and annoying. The story is told largely as a flashback through the eyes of an older Max.

The sets of Whoville and the mountains are a whimsical cross between confection and Dr. Seuss sketches. The exaggerated, bulging costumes are entertaining. The choreography, from the opening *"Who Likes Christmas?"* number, is crisp and precise. None of this is surprising, given that this production was first conceived and directed by the famed Jack O'Brien with original choreography by the renowned John Deluca.

The closest to a show-stopping number has a campy Grinch praising himself for being "One of a Kind." He even gives hints of a variety of voices, from Arnold Schwarzenegger to Elvis. This is perhaps the supreme moment, among several, when the musical particularly has as much appeal to adults as children. While one won't exit humming most of the songs, they work. The dialogue is lyrical and poetic; after all the creators had

the words of Dr. Seuss with which to work.

Steve Blanchard as The Grinch and Steve Gunderson as Old Max, are convincingly strong in their roles. They only occasionally let down their guard to allow the audience to see they are very much having fun with their parts – and when they do, that's part of the joy. The Grinch is a character who could lend himself to varying shades of interpretation. Blanchard's wide Broadway experience serves him well. 
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

One of the events that never fails to put me in the holiday spirit is the Old Globe's annual production of *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* This is the 14th year in a row for the family classic about everyone's favorite green man with a heart "two sizes too small," and this year there's a new Grinch in town. Steve Blanchard takes on the role for the first time and gives a new interpretation that finds him grumpier and more curmudgeonly than Grinches of late. 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Perennial 'Grinch' steals show at Old Globe

It has been 14 years since "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" premiered at San Diego's Old Globe Theatre. It would seem that after all this time, the Grinch (Steve Blanchard) would see the error of his anti-Christmas ways, or could have converted himself to Judaism and changed his name to the Men

Alas, he hat famous green "mean one" who despises the beloved holiday and the tiny people who cherish ite the Whos. Along with his hapless dog, Max (Logan Lipton), the Grinch attempts to stop Christmas from happening in Whoville.

Running at a relatively short 90 minutes, this popular musical continues as a charming Balboa Park tradition, mostly because of Timothy Mason's timeless book and lyrics. While adding plenty of creative rhyming and humor, it still respects Seuss' original story and includes many famous lines from the children's classic. Even with a few deliberately corny jokes, the ensemble manages comedy that brings wall-to-wall smiling and laughter.

Blanchard has big shoes to fill by playing a character previously portrayed by acclaimed actor Patrick Page. The shoes fit comfortably for Blanchard, who puts his own touch on the "One of a Kind" individual, making his interpretation of the Grinch simultaneously sinister and blissfully silly. Another standout performer is Caitlin McAuliffe as Cindy-Lou, the precious Who who seems to emotionally connect to the Grinch. While previous actresses who have played Cindy, such as Vanessa Hudgens, have been as young as 10 or 12, McAuliffe is only 8. Her rendition of the ballad "Santa for a Day" is heartfelt and touching.

Just as impressive as the acting is the Who-chestra. It is versatile in its sound, ranging from a short "Les Misérables"-like overture to the jazzy sounding "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch." The band's finest moments are its short musical interludes that are appropriate for an adaptation of a clever Seuss story.

Not only does the music, composed by Mel Marvin, sound very Seuss-esque, but John Lee Beatty's scenic design is like seeing a life-sized Seuss illustration. The cartoonish look of Whoville has a joyful quality that adds to the festive playfulness of the production.

If any fault exists with "The Grinch" it is that there are too many reprises of musical numbers. While some songs never get old, the irresistibly cheerful group number "Who Likes Christmas?" is sung at least twice, while other tunes are needlessly repeated. One that comes to mind is "I Hate Christmas Eve," in which the same exact lyrics the Grinch and Max sing are performed moments later by some of the Whos.

It almost feels blasphemous to criticize something so beloved, but even with a few too many reprises, "How The Grinch Stole Christmas" is still a delightfully enjoyable time. The inventive director,

James Vasquez, has not deviated far from Jack O'Brien's original direction, which is perfectly fine. "The Grinch" was a hit in 1998, and it continues to be great family friendly entertainment years later. Little girls in brand new Christmas dresses ran up and down the aisles before the lights dimmed. Eyes fell upon the glowing green Grinch face up on stage, a subtle hint to sit down. 

The first weekend in November, my husband and I finally visited San Diego. We had been meaning to go for years but the flight takes about as long as to Dublin, and the Irish have real Guinness and fantastic accents. So it wasn't until the Old Globe announced it was doing the Rocky Horror Show as a fully staged (i.e., non-movie) musical that I really considered it. Then they cast a few American Idiot alumni (Andrew Call, Sydney Harcourt James, and Jeanna de Waal), and I was more interested. When I found out that (HOLY CRAP) Kelsey Kurz from the amazing Huntington Theatre production of Stephen Karam's Sons of the Prophet in Boston was going to be Brad, that did it.

I bought the tickets and emailed hubby from the car on the way out of town. (I think Lisa was driving us to Poughkeepsie to see Michael Cerveris and Michael Esper in the workshop of Duncan Sheik and Steven Sater's terrible musical The Nightingale.) I don't have a lot to say in favor of San Diego itself (if you're not a beach bum, it's pretty much boring architecture and creepily deserted of people, but Balboa Park is fantastic, and we got to see some old friends). But I LOVED the show, and I marked Rocky Horror off my bucket list.

Rocky Horror was seriously, hilariously, totally fun. All three times. I hope they'll bring this particular production to New York soon (with a few cast changes). I mean, that would be a disaster for my schedule and my bank

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account. But I really, really need it to happen. Unless the audiences are going to be awful. (I'm really not ok with the random yelling from the audience, though more synchronized responses like "slut" every time someone says "Janet" or "asshole" everytime someone says "Brad" are fun and don't interfere with the show.)

The design was great for the space, the costumes were excellent (the bondageinspired ones for the final scene were INSANE and awesome), the staging was fun, and the choreography (especially for Rocky) was very cool. The show lost its Frank and its director during rehearsals, but I couldn't tell from the performance. I really want them to just ship the whole show (other than a few casting exceptions mentioned below) to New York. Immediately.

First, it was great to see Kurz in a completely different role. He has serious musical-theater comedy chops (and he's SHAMELESS, as obvious from the photo below), and I already loved him in the funny-but-serious Prophets, so I'll pretty much just follow him around to anything he's in from now on. I don't remember Sydney Harcourt James from the Idiot ensemble, but he was amazing as Rocky (especially his dancing--ok, and his 12-pack).

Although I wish her voice hadn't copied Little Nell so much, Nadine Isenegger was great as Columbia, and her tapping was ridiculous in the best way. Laura Shoop and Jason Wooten were delightfully creepy as Magenta and Riff Raff and charming as the story-framing ushers. David Andrew Macdonald as the narrator really held the show together and dealt with the vocal audience with aplomb, and he was fine as Dr. Scott, though that's a bit of a nothing role until the fishnets break out (and he has seriously nice legs). The other "phantoms" were good, Kit Treece in particular.

And now the roles I would want recast ...

Look, I like Matt McGrath. He was good even in that dreadful Nightingale musical workship, and I liked him a lot in the Atlantic Theater's production of Pinter's The Collection last season. But his voice was a bit thin for Frank 'N' Furter, and though he threw himself into the role, he was just a little below par in charisma. He was sassy and bitchy and domineering and hilarious. But Frank needs to also be irresistible or what little plot there is kind of falls apart.

I just don't like Jeanna de Waal as a performer, so I wasn't surprised that I spent the whole time wishing I had seen just about anyone else as Janet. de Waal is a fine technical dancer, and she certainly sings better than Susan Sarandon, but she has no charisma, and I just don't like how her voice sounds. That said, this is probably the role in which she will be best cast, ever. And she didn't ruin the show. So, whatever.

This breaks my heart, but I didn't love Andrew Call as Eddie. (There's a photo out there of him as Rocky in a different production, and I would have loved to see that.) His voice isn't strong enough, and (as with his performance as a St. Jimmy understudy in Idiot) he didn't have that charisma needed to really pull of

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this Elvis-esque role. But I loved him as one of the phantoms, and his slide down the bannister was thrilling. The boy can DANCE. And he carries a tune fine, but they really do need someone stronger, more magnetic for the role.

Now, back to something happier: KELSEY KURZ. Wow, he was completely fantastic at every moment. He was never not acting, never out of character. And Brad and Janet stand around on the sidelines a lot in this show. de Wall just took up space being not particularly Janet-like most of the time, as though she could only act if she were speaking, when she had specific direction. But Kurz just threw himself into that goofball Brad and went for it (his deliveries in Dammit, Janet were so adorkable), and he constantly reacted to everything going on around him--but not in a way that pulled focus. The more theater I see, the more I realize how difficult that must be, because when someone gets it right, it's just thrilling to watch. 

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

"It's much the same here — you can easily go into a 75-minute vaudeville act, and play all the shticky shtick. But if you do that, you sacrifice the story."

That story pivots on the Grinch's unexpected feelings of care and empathy for Cindy Lou Who, the tiny Whoville denizen who catches him stealing everyone's presents yet still buys his cover story that he's actually Santa.

"It's such a redemptive character," Blanchard says.

"He really falls in love with this little girl — she looks up at him with those big blue eyes and doesn't believe he's the Grinch. He's 'Santy Claus.' She just wins his heart."

Blanchard adds of the Globe production, directed again by James Vasquez: "I think they really have made a conscious choice this year about going back to the story, making it more touching and down to earth."

As down to Earth as it may be, the show still has Blanchard in full flight much of the time — a fact he hadn't fully grasped before getting to San Diego.

Blanchard had consulted with his old friend Patrick Page — the Globe associate artist and onetime Grinch now tearing it up in "Spider-Man: Turn Off the Dark" on Broadway — before signing on for his debut in the role.

But "just like everyone else I talked to about the show, he (deliberately) didn't say much," Blanchard reports. "It's very much like the Beast: If someone told you you're going to be in a lot of latex and fur, running around, losing about 5 pounds of water weight per show, you'd probably run from the place with your hair on fire.

"I kept asking if there was a video or something, but no one would tell me anything." Now, Blanchard is coming to grips with "the 75 minutes of craziness that you sign up for."





Who says you can't teach an old dog new tricks?

Steve Gunderson puts that question to the test this month when he steps for the first time into the role of Old Max, the canine narrator of the Old Globe's "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas." Gunderson is an 11-year veteran of the "Grinch" musical (he played Papa Who for 10 years and Grandpa Who for one), and he's eager to put his own spin on the old dog role.

"I've always coveted the part," said Gunderson, who has understudied Old Max for the past two years. "I love the part and I've had my own ideas about how to play him for a long time. So when I got the call, it was such a great surprise."

Now in its 14th year, the Old Globe's "Grinch" musical tells Dr. Seuss' story of a grumpy mountaindwelling creature who (with his reluctant young dog Max) tries unsuccessfully to spoil the Christmas spirit in the nearby town of Whoville. Conceived by former Globe artistic director Jack O'Brien and written by Mel Marvin and Timothy Mason, the musical is a memory tale told by Old Max before he heads into doggie retirement.

The L.A.-based Gunderson said his own dogs have inspired his take on Old Max.

"I have these long-term relationships with dogs," said Gunderson. "I had one for 16 years and another that's new in my life. When my dog got old, she was an old dog who on the turn of a dime would puppy out. I wanted to bring that to Max. I'm not the old man, I'm a puppy who grew old. And he's not just a narrator ---- he's a character, and this play is his memory. And as he's reliving it, he's feeling those emotions again and he's interacting with the other characters, they just can't see him."

Gunderson's long association with the Old Globe began in his teens, when he won a theater showcase at Crawford High in San Diego whose prize was a bit role in the Globe's Shakespeare festival. 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

Who says you can't teach an old dog new tricks?



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But for Steve Blanchard, the actor who takes on the Grinch role for the first time this month, finding the Grinch's humanity is key to the part.

"There would be no way the audience would be able to invest in the Grinch, or for the actor to invest in the character he's playing, if he's not human and identifiable with their own personal experience," said the 6-foot-3-inch Blanchard, who knows a thing or two about playing creatures.

Blanchard spent eight years on Broadway playing the Beast in "Disney's Beauty and the Beast" and he played Frankenstein's monster in a 2007 off-Broadway musical version of Mary Shelley's novel. Blanchard said the Beast (a bewitched prince who's returned to human form when he earns a woman's love) and the grouchy Grinch (who learns the true spirit of Christmas from a little girl) are very much alike.

"It's the love of a beautiful little girl who opens the Grinch up and shows him how to get in touch with himself and how to love. That's what Belle does to the Beast. Here are two grumpy people who are grumpy to everyone around them, and they have no idea of the beautiful soul that lies within them until this person comes along and unlocks their hearts," Blanchard said.

Blanchard said he's got a great affinity for the Grinch because they share a birthday. Theodor "Dr. Seuss" Geisel was 53 when he wrote the Grinch tale in 1957, and in the story, the Grinch is also 53 years old. Blanchard said he'll turn 53 next month, so "it's a serendipitous moment for me."

Over the years, four other actors have played the Grinch at the Globe, and Blanchard is putting his own stamp on the part this month. He said he always loved Boris Karloff's vocalization for the Grinch in the animated 1966 version, so Blanchard said there will be a "Karloff-y sound" to his voice. Also, he said he likes to sing in character, so expect a gruffer, more creaturelike sound to his songs.

"The Grinch is not going to sing like the Phantom, and the Phantom won't sing like Frankenstein's creature, and Lancelot won't sing like the Beast. It bugs me when actors do shows and they act one

way, then sing their songs like they're standing in front of a piano," he said.

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Blanchard said he enjoyed finding the right balance between goofiness and darkness in the Grinch role.

"It's a tricky little arc over the 75 minutes of this play," he said. "You can't be too goofy or too schticky or no one will be afraid, but if you're too mean, it will be too hard to win the audience over in time. I'm finding my own inner Grinch."

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Poway girl shines in Old Globe's 'Grinch'

The Old Globe's 14th annual production of Dr. Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" is a musical sure to bring joy to those of all ages - and sizes of hearts - this holiday season.

The 90-minute show (there's no intermission) is an expansion of the book and animated television show of the same name. It tells the story of the Grinch who sets out to destroy Christmas for the residents of Whoville.

The Grinch's dislike of the holiday throughout his 53 years is thought to be due to his heart being "two sizes too small," according to Whoville residents and his loyal dog Max, who as his older self serves as narrator. Returning for the ninth-year as Old Max is Steve Gunderson, who has also appeared in several other Globe productions.

The "too small" heart, however, begins to soften (or grow) when the Grinch . ably portrayed by Broadway veteran Steve Blanchard encounters Cindy-Lou Who on Christmas Eve while steal-

ing her family's gifts, tree and holiday feast.

On opening night last Friday, Cindy-Lou was played by 8-year-old Poway resident Caitlin McAuliffe in her professional acting debut. She shares the role with Remy Margaret Corbin who made her Old Globe debut in the same role last year. All roles for children have been double cast so they can alternate among the 59 performances

scheduled throughout the show's run that concludes on Dec. 31.

Caitlin was adorable playing the sweetly innocent Cindy-Lou, who managed to pull at the audience's heartstrings when singing "Santa for a Day" and was undaunted when confronting the fearful and towering Grinch.

Blanchard, making his Old Globe debut, is wonderful playing the villain that is hard not to like by the end. Part of that was due to the way he interacted with Caitlin and the audience. Another reason was how he and Logan Lipton, another Broadway veteran playing Young Max for the fourth time at the Globe, played off each other. They have great comedic timing and Lipton is a talented dancer. Despite all his makeup, Blanchard's facial expressions at times were priceless.

Though the story was originally written by the San Diego-based Seuss for children, there are plenty of contemporary jokes and gestures - especially by Blanchard - that are geared toward adults and make the show entertaining for all, accompanied by children or not.

In addition, the audience is incorporated into the production by being invited to sing "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch." (If you don't remember the lyrics from the animated show, there's no need to fear as they are provided on stage.)

With the exception of Dec. 2, Christmas day and all Mondays (except Dec. 26 which has two shows), "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" can be seen daily through Dec. 31 in the Old Globe Theatre's Conrad Prebys Theatre Center



The cast of The Grinch changes somewhat every year. but some things always remain the same. "I love working there because it has a family feeling," said Buckley who has great support from her parents who have also been involved in theatre. Watching them inspired her.

"I saw my dad acting a lot, and I was also one of those little girls who loved being in the spotlight, so acting seemed just right for me," Buckley said. "And I was right because there are lots of kids and they're all your friends, and if you ever feel afraid, once you go to rehearsal all your fears go away because everyone is so supportive."



El Caion's A.J. Foggiano (Teen Who) is thrilled to be back in The Grinch for a fifth year. Although Foggiano wasn't a shoo-in for the role of Teen Who, he did have confidence. "It's always nice to walk into a room when you know the people who you are going to audition for," he said. "That was easier than most auditions,

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but I do a lot beforehand. I think about what I want to do. get my sheet music together and my monologues prepared and then give them what I got."

Looking at his bio, Foggiano has a lot of experience on stage. The 15-year-old is in 10th grade at Grossmont High School. His theater credits include Whisper House, Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! ('06-'09 and '11. The Old Globe), The Merry Wives of Windsor (The Old Globe Summer Shakespeare Intensive), Bye Bye Birdie (San Diego Musical Theatre), The Wizard of Oz (Starlight Musical Theatre), A Year with Frog and Toad and The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee (San Diego Junior Theatre), Seussical the Musical (Actors' Conservatory Theatre San Diego), 13 (American Rose Theatre) and Peter Pan (Christian Youth Theater). His film and television credits include Oxycontin PSA (KUSI), Ready? OK! (Daisy 3 Pictures) and The Legend of Pocahontas (I Can Fly Pictures).

Foggiano started taking classes in all aspects of theatre as a youth and still takes some today. Like other performers in The Grinch, Foggiano recognizes and respects that the play is a tradition. "It's a very unique show," he said. "It's become part of what San Diego and The Old Globe are about. Working in the show is like being part of a family so it's nice to part of that every year and meet seasoned actors, new actors and really talented people behind the scenes."

His goal is to make acting his career and along with maintaining good grades and continuing to build his performance repertoire Foggiano has his eyes on the goal. "After high school I plan to go to college and study more of my craft and then pursue a career in acting. I'm very passionate about acting, and as an actor, I feel there's nothing else I can do."

Because he's come so far and knows the ropes well, Foggiano has good advice for kids wanting to be on stage. "Just be vourself - a little kid," he said. "That's what producers want to see, because Who-ters are just people with over exaggerated costumes."



Santee's Kevin Davison (Little Who Ensemble) makes his debut at The Old Globe but is already comfortable being on a stage. He's appeared in Seussical the Musical (Pickwick Players), The Wizard of Oz, Snow White (CYT), and Peter Pan (Christian Youth Theater). The 11-year-old keeps up good

grades at Horizon Christian Academy Claremont while taking singing and dancing lessons and auditioning where he can. He would like to have a role in Bye Bye Birdie and hopes to be on Broadway someday. Davison is excited to finally land a role at The Old Globe. "The Grinch is a really funny show and it's so fun to be in. Acting is my passion so I work hard before an audition. I think Steve is a great Grinch and he makes all of us laugh, even the adults."

Davison said he really had fun recently when it was Crazy Sock Day. "Everyone had to show up with one sock. It was really funny when even the leads in the play came on stage with one crazy sock on instead of their costumed-shoe.'

Breaking the assumption by some that Christmas is about a tree or decorations, Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! reveals an important aspect of the season. A.J. Foggiano couldn't have described this show any better when he said about The Grinch, "It has a message about community and family that never gets old. The feeling of everyone wanting to feel they belong somewhere is as true today as it was 10 years or 20 years ago or beyond that."

Poway girl shines in Old Globe's 'Grinch'

The Old Globe's 14th annual production of Dr. Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" is a musical sure to bring joy to those of all ages - and sizes of hearts - this holiday season.

90-minute The show (there's no intermission) is an expansion of the book and animated television show of the same name. It tells the story of the Grinch who sets out to destroy Christmas for the residents of Whoville.

The Grinch's dislike of the holiday throughout his 53 years is thought to be due to his heart being "two sizes too small," according to Whoville residents and his loyal dog Max, who as his older self serves as narrator. Returning for the ninth-year as Old Max is Steve Gunderson, who has also appeared in several other Globe productions.

The "too small" heart, however, begins to soften (or grow) when the Grinch . ably portrayed by Broadway veteran Steve Blanchard encounters Cindy-Lou Who on Christmas Eve while steal-

ing her family's gifts, tree and holiday feast.

On opening night last Friday, Cindy-Lou was played by 8-year-old Poway resident Caitlin McAuliffe in her professional acting debut. She shares the role with Remy Margaret Corbin who made her Old Globe debut in the same role last year. All roles for children have been double cast so they can alternate among the 59 performances

scheduled throughout the show's run that concludes on Dec. 31.

Caitlin was adorable playthe sweetly innocent ing Cindy-Lou, who managed to pull at the audience's heartstrings when singing "Santa for a Day" and was undaunted when confronting the fearful and towering Grinch.

Blanchard, making his Old Globe debut, is wonderful playing the villain that is hard not to like by the end. Part of that was due to the way he interacted with Caitlin and the audience. Another reason was how he and Logan Lipton, another Broadway veteran playing Young Max for the fourth time at the Globe, played off each other. They have great comedic timing and Lipton is a talented dancer. Despite all his makeup, Blanchard's facial expressions at times were priceless.

Though the story was originally written by the San Diego-based Seuss for children, there are plenty of contemporary jokes and gestures - especially by Blanchard - that are geared toward adults and make the show entertaining for all, accompanied by children or not.

In addition, the audience is incorporated into the production by being invited to sing "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch." (If you don't remember the lyrics from the animated show, there's no need to fear as they are provided on stage.)

With the exception of Dec. 2, Christmas day and all Mondays (except Dec. 26 which has two shows), "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" can be seen daily through Dec. 31 in the Old Globe Theatre's Conrad Prebys Theatre Center



These shows are conspicuously bereft of holiday overtones-and they have a boatload of competition. Take a look to the right at the list of the week's openings. All four of their themes center on Christmas, and six more such plays will open during the month. The Old Globe's annual production of Dr. Seuss' The Grinch Who Stole Christmas! opened last month and runs through Dec. 31.

There's nothing wrong with any of this, mind you; beyond its profound religious value, Christmas is a cultural phenomenon of the Western world, holding seasonal sway over national economies and fueling renewed interest in the way human beings perceive themselves.

I wish there were a hundred such shows to reflect that spirit, especially as new beginnings in 2012 are in sight.

But as appropriate as it may be, the flurry of seasonal productions might say something about local theater as a public servant.

atheists, alcoholics, the homeless, flight attendants: All include majorities and minorities, rife with tales to tell and interested parties who choose to listen. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says 110 languages are represented in San Diego County (far-flung Tagalog is first behind English and Spanish); their speakers represent myriad traditions, cultural values and, I daresay, holidays that command their attention year-round.

Not all those speakers are theatergoers; there's no reason to believe out of hand that theater rules their households, any more than it's the driving force behind English-based enterprise. But 110 of anything means 110 possibilities for cultural exchange as only the theater can provide it-and when your culture is shut down with nine Christmas plays opening in December, those possibilities evaporate pretty quick, especially when you're fighting the annual battle for attention with the fat guy in the red and white suit.

This country was conceived as an ethnic mosaic, and because theater is the library of the stories that help make it that way, the country's performance art should reflect that ideal. Men. women, kids, blacks, gays, Hispanics, Christians, Jews, Muslims,

Christianity saw the need to compete, eventually appropriating that glut of festivals as its own-from there, commerce helped fuel the Christmas we know today. For good or ill, it pervades every nook and cranny of our lives, especially those of us with kids. With all that's going on in December, it hardly seems possible that we'll have time for the theater.

But we'll make time. The only problem is that we may be making time for something that we do out of habit. Christmas is a product of secular rituals-but so are most of the world's great theater movements, and right now, they don't have a lot of representation on San Diego stages. William Shakespeare,



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

Rudolph. Charlie Brown. The Grinch. They're longtime favorites who always grab top billing when the networks roll out their holiday programs.

You have to wonder, though, whether they would have become big TV stars, or whether their shows would have earned "classic" status, if not for the extraordinary contributions of solid supporting players. After all, to achieve lasting pop-cultural shelf life, it usually takes teamwork.

With that in mind, we salute some of the top holiday scene-stealers ---- great characters who have the power to make us laugh, cry, and sometimes wince, year after year after year:

"Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas" (8 p.m. Monday, ABC)

Character: Max the dog

Scene-stealing credentials: We adore Cindy Lou Who, the sweet little tot who melts our heart. But no one tops the pitiful pooch who basically serves as slave to the abusive Grinch, yet loves him unconditionally. The wild trek that has Max ---- with makeshift reindeer headgear ---- pulling an overloaded sleigh over treacherous mountain passes is pure slapstick brilliance.

Quotable: Seuss said it best when he described the cartoon canine as an "Everydog ---- all love and limpness and loyalty."

Random trivia: Max was just a minor character in the Seuss book, but animator Chuck Jones wisely expanded his role for the TV adaptation. Fourteen years ago, San Diego's Old Globe Theatre turned the story into successful annual stage musical that has "Old Max" (aged, gray and now headed off into doggie retirement) narrating the story about his youth.

"Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" (8 p.m. Tuesday, CBS)

Character: Yukon Cornelius (voiced by Larry D. Mann)

Scene-stealing credentials: Yes, the blustery prospector is full of himself, but he provides a jolt of comic relief. Not only does Yukon utter some of the show's funniest lines, he is pivotal to its final resolution ---- outwitting the "Bumble" and paving the way for Rudolph's heroics. All that, plus he has a prodigious beard that Giants pitcher Brian Wilson would envy.

December Nights organizers also encourage participants to use public transportation to prevent traffic congestion. A free shuttle will be available at City College downtown and the Little Italy Blue Line Station.

Wormser said, "Generations of San Diegans have enjoyed the event for the past 34 years, and we look forward to creating fond memories for future generations."

San Diego's grand holiday tradition attracts hundreds of thousands of revelers to Balboa Park

an Diego may not bring much in the way of an idyllic White Christmas," but it has its own beloved tradition in December Nights.

For the past 34 years, people from all over the county have gathered at Balboa Park for the free celebration that features music, art, storytelling and plenty of food.

The event, called Christmas on the Prado until 2002, was founded in 1978 by 10 Balboa Park cultural organizations and attracted 3,000 guests. The two-evening event featured museum store shopping, crafts, Elizabethan dances and music.

It has since grown to 300,000 visitors over two days and includes everything from performances of "The Nutcracker" and a tree-lighting ceremony to carolers and foods from around the world.

You'll find something magical happening in practically every corner of the park. Here's a guide to navigating one of San Diego's largest festivals, broken down by area.

Spreckels Organ Pavilion

December Nights kicks off at this iconic location with opening ceremonies and a tree-lighting event with Mayor Jerry Sanders at 5:30 p.m. Friday.

It's also where you can see more seasonal performances like Del Cerro Baptist Church's annual staging of the "Christmas Story Tree," in which an 80-person choir and drama team tells the story of Christmas in music and living scenes from 8:40 to 10 each night.

Also performing: the Southwestern College Chamber Singers, the Revolution Show Choir, civic organist Carol Williams and the San Diego Sun Harbor Chorus clad in elf costumes.

California Quadrangle

This area by the San Diego Museum of Man is where you'll find the Santa Lucia Procession, a Swedish celebration with candlelight and music. It takes place at 6 and 8 each night, and be sure to stick around for Swedish meatballs and glögg, the hot, spiced wine.

Plaza de Panama

This popular section of the park, near the San Diego Museum of Art, is where to go if you're over 21 and looking to have a few drinks.

Here you'll find The Prado Pub at the Square, operated by Cohn Restaurant Group. It will feature cocktails, beer, Tarantino Gourmet Sausages (featuring bacon dogs) and The Chop Soo-ey and

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Ms. Patty Melt food trucks. You'll hear The Bon Temps Social Club play sounds of the Louisiana Bayou on the Pavilion Stage.

It's also where SDG&E customers can exchange up to three old incandescent light strands for energy-efficient LED ones. (A valid California ID or a copy of your recent SDG&E bill will be required to participate.)

House of Pacific Relations International Cottages

When people talk about the food at December Nights, they're mostly referring to this area's beloved International Christmas

Festival.

Arrive hungry and with an adventurous spirit, because you'll find palak paneer and chicken tikka masala from India; empanadas from Argentina and Colombia; pancit from the Philippines; Viking pea soup from Norway; coconut rice and sancocho from Panama; paella from Spain; aebleskiver (pancake ball) from Denmark; sausages from Germany, Hungary and the Czech Republic and Slovakia; crepes from France; and much, much more.

Don't worry, there will also be cuisine for less adventurous eaters: hot dogs and baked beans from the United States; tacos and churros from Mexico; hot chocolate from England; and baked potatoes from Scotland. Prices vary at each location.

Palisades Midway

If you've got little ones, head straight for this area, located by the San Diego Air & Space Museum.

You'll find a mini carnival complete with slides, a Ferris wheel, carnival games and snacks. It's also near the Marie Hitchcock Puppet Theater, where an adaptation of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" will be performed at 6, 7 and 8 each night.

Along the Prado and museums

The park's corridor will feature a variety of vendors, plus access to the museums, which will be offering free admission from 5 to 9 both evenings.

Along with the latest exhibits, each museum will also have holiday-themed activities. Some highlights include holiday tunes at the San Diego Natural History Museum's atrium, as well as cookies, mistletoe, crafts, coffee and other beverages for sale. The Mingei International Museum will showcase a charming "Gingerbread City" exhibit, while the San Diego Museum of Art will have holiday music in Hibben Gallery.

Fans of dance will want to visit the Casa del Prado Stage, where excerpts from "The Nutcracker" will be performed by the San **Diego Civic Youth Ballet and San** Diego Civic Dance Arts will feature tap, jazz, modern and hip-hop performances over two days.

The Botanical Building houses its 25th annual Poinsettia Display from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, and there will be a new stage in that area featuring a variety of dance and music performances.



Art galleries and gift vendors will sell their wares, and there will be photos with Santa, carolers, a barbershop quartet, and food and drinks.

The Spanish Village Art Center stage will feature Scott Williams performing Celtic, colonial, medieval, rock and Renaissance-influenced holiday music on the hammered dulcimer.

Cascades Holiday Marketplace

Located at Fountain Plaza next to the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center, this is a good place to satisfy your sweet tooth, as you'll find vendors selling snacks like mini doughnuts, chocolate-dipped food kebabs and funnel cakes. GETTING THERE

As magical as December Nights can be, traffic and parking are often a nightmare. But unless you insist on finding a spot near the park, there are plenty of stressfree solutions.

Free and low-cost options: You'll find free parking and free shuttles running every 10 to 15 minutes from City College and the County Administration Building on Pacific Highway. You can park at Petco Park for \$3 and take a free shuttle. The shuttles, which are stroller-friendly, run from 4:30 to 11 p.m. Friday and noon to 11 p.m. Saturday.

Paid options: If you want to be by the park, you'll have to pay. Preferred parking

at the Natural History Museum lot is \$20 and goes fast. Spaces across the street at Inspiration Point go for \$10. Those who show up early can find some free spots at the San Diego Zoo and along the streets, but those go even faster.

Beware: Balboa Park lots close at 2 p.m. Friday, so you can't arrive early and save a spot. Cars will be required to exit and re-enter with paid admission.


Public transportation: If you take the trolley, your stop will be the Smart Corner on Park Boulevard, then transfer to the Route 7 bus, which will run extra buses throughout the weekend.







Off Field: Holiday Fun in San Diego

While soccer can be played the year around in San Diego (barring occasional winter storms), only at this time of year can you enjoy the holiday happenings of the region. From community light displays to LEGO snow and holiday animals, there is something for everyone around San Diego.

A great place to kick off the holiday season is **Balboa Park**, located in downtown San Diego. The annual **December Nights** celebration happened at the beginning of the month, but you can still see all the decorations around the **Prado**. The center of the Prado includes strings of lights and towers with running light displays down the corners. Santa's sleigh and his reindeer take over the grassy strip between the central Prado and the **Organ Pavilion**, although the jolly old elf doesn't show up until Christmas. Just off to the side is the fully decorated Community Tree. At the far end of the Prado is the **Bea Evenson Fountain**, which is flanked by more lights.



Come to Balboa Park before dark and enjoy some of the many buskers (street performers) who hang out along the way. At noon every day through New Year's Day, holiday music will sound from the Carillon in the California Tower. Also in the Park, check out the Poinsettia Display at the **Botanical Building**, located at the south end of the reflecting pond. Finally, if you are in the mood for some theater, see "**Dr**. **Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas**" at the <u>Old Globe</u> <u>Theater</u>. This delightful holiday show, in its 14th season, presents the familiar tale of the Grinch who learned that Christmas doesn't come in a bag. Catch the Grinch before he heads back to Whoville after December 31.

LEGOLAND California in Carlsbad caters primarily to young children and their parents, with the focus on the little interlocking blocks that so many have grown up with. During the holidays LEGOLAND presents the world's largest LEGO Christmas Tree, LEGO Santa and reindeer, and "real" snow. Through December 24 the park will have a nightly tree lighting ceremony, and the musical "Let it Snow" will play through December 31. From December 26 through 31 LEGOLAND will have nightly fireworks displays, culminating with a special children-oriented New Years' Eve celebration. On December 31, performances on the Miniland USA stage beginning at 2:30 p.m. will lead to the special Brick Drop and fireworks at 6:00 p.m.

For those who like their holidays a bit more "wild," the **San Diego Zoo** presents its annual **Jungle Bells** celebration, nightly December 10 through January 1. The fun includes animal-themed lighting displays, music, animal encounters, and much more. This year you can catch Jumping Jiving Elves (trampoline performers), a bell choir, and holiday stories. The park is open until 8:00 p.m. every night except for Christmas Eve. Just outside the Zoo, catch the Holiday Train for a quick ride around more holiday light displays.

If you like your holiday wet as well as wild, try **Snow World** at <u>SeaWorld's Christmas Celebration</u>, daily through New Year's Day. This celebration features a snow play area and holiday-themed shows, including **Shamu's Christmas**, **Clyde and Seamore's Night Before Christmas**, and **Christmas Tails**. You can also catch the **Polar Express 4-D Experience**, enjoy holiday music, and even have breakfast with Shamu and Santa. At night enjoy the tallest holiday tree in San Diego – the Sea World Sky Tower decorated with hundreds of lights.For those who like their holidays a bit more "wild," the **San Diego Zoo** presents its annual **Jungle Bells** celebration, nightly December 10 through January 1. 

THEATER REVIEW Cygnet sends off 'It's a Wonderful Life' with class

Christmas is all about traditions, and many local theaters have taken that to heart, with long-running holiday shows that return for a welcome visit ever year after Thanksgiving.

San Diego Repertory Theatre staged "A Christmas Carol" for 30 years straight, and the <u>Old Globe</u>'s now in its 14th year of the "Grinch" musical. But another perennial show — Cygnet Theatre's "It's a Wonderful Life: A Live Radio Play" — is about to come to an end. The sixth and final production of the play is now under way in Old Town.

I, for one, will be sorry to see this slick and wellpolished heartwarmer go, but artistic director Sean Murray said he's eager to move on to new projects, so if you

haven't caught "Wonderful Life" yet, you'd be smart to see it now before it's history.

Since 2006, Cygnet artistic director Sean Murray has continually upgraded his fine production of Joe Landry's stage adaptation of the 1947 Frank Capra film. Murray's upscale '40s radio studio set is classy, as are Jeanne Reith's perfect period costumes. And most of the returning cast members have grown so comfortable in their roles, they slip into them like a second skin.

The play features seven actors, a pianist and a sound effects artist gathered before a live studio audience to tell the story of a poor, smalltown savings-and-loan operator who discovers his true wealth lies in family, friendship, love and goodwill.

The play takes place on Christmas Eve 1946, in the red-walled WCYG "Playhouse of the Air" radio studio. Before the show begins, cast members (in character) interact with the live studio audience, then after a few introductions, the "On the Air" sign illuminates and the actors re-create the events, sights and sounds in the fictional town of Bedford Falls, circa 1944.

Although it's designed as a radio show, with actors reading from scripts behind microphones, there's a lot of dramatic action in Murray's production. The radio "actors" have back stories,



they interact with the audience, and they use both their voices and bodies to tell the story. It's also fun watching Jason Connors (who replaces Scott Paulson this year as the sound effects artist) creates the sounds of slamming doors, broken glass and the crunch of shoes on newly fallen snow.

For those not familiar with "It's a Wonderful Life," it's the heart-tugging story of George Bailey, whose plan to leap to his death on Christmas Eve is foiled by an enterprising guardian angel named Clarence Oddbody. Bailey, distraught over the impending failure of his savings and loan (which has financed the homes of the town's middle class and immigrant populations), believes that his family and community would be better off if he'd never been born. Clarence grants George's

wish by showing him how the fortunes of his town and his friends would've been far worse without his generous spirit and supportive presence.

Returning in the role that earned him a 2008 Craig Noel award from the San Diego Theatre Critics Circle, Tom Andrew stars as George Bailey. It's a remarkable and touching performance. In the first few years, Andrew seemed to be channeling the film role's originator, Jimmy Stewart, but over time he's put his own stamp on the part.

Amanda Sitton is strong and supportive as Mary, the small-town girl who wins George's heart, and she's hilarious as the slightly vain actress and beauty queen who plays Mary in the radio show.

Tim West's endearing and guileless as Clarence (whose good deed for George earns him his angel wings) and as Uncle Billy, whose careless loss of the association's cash deposits brings the savings and loan to the brink of failure.

Also back again are four other show veterans who are all terrific in their multiple roles: Jonathan Dunn-Rankin as the station announcer and evil Old Man Potter; Melissa Fernandes as the flirtatious Violet Bick and George's youngest daughter, Zuzu; Veronica Murphy in multiple roles, including Ma Bailey and George as a boy; and Billy Thompson as show music director/pianist, among other roles.

New to the show this year is Patrick Osteen as George's fighter-pilot brother, Harry Bailey, and other small roles.

On opening night Saturday, Andrew concluded the show by asking audience members to join hands in singing a Christmas carol. It was a warm, communal moment in an already tearjerking evening. Cygnet may be ready to move on next year without "It's a Wonderful Life," but I expect a good number of audience members are not. Catch it before it's gone.



Several months' worth of great San Diego stagecraft

The best productions and performances since August

Here's one way to avoid the conundrum of trying to assess an entire year in theater in one column: Start with August. That's when I came on board as *CityBeat's* theater critic. So, with all due respect to the stellar 2011 productions that preceded the beginning of my tenure, here's a look back at some of the memorable offerings on stage from August on:

Standing ovations: Ion Theatre's revival of the Tony Kushner masterpiece *Angels in America: A Gay Fantasia on National Themes— a* powerful yet restrained and dignified production, in which the

emotional resonance rendered the length (six hours, in two parts) irrelevant; Moxie Theatre's *Dead Man's Cell Phone*— edgy and bitterly funny, the comedy by Sarah Ruhl soared under the direction of Delicia Turner Sonneberg, with a winning performance by Jo Anne Glover.

A's in chemistry: Doug Waldo and Kelsey Venter as grumpy boss and spunky secretary in Lamb's Players Theatre's production of Joanna McClelland Glass' *Trying*; Rod Brogan as George Bernard Shaw and Angela Pierce as heiress Charlotte Payne-Townshend traded barbs and flirty quips in the Old Globe's *Engaging Shaw*.

Towering infernos: Rosina Reynolds, as Amanda Wingfield, reigned over the tension and entanglements of Tennessee Williams' *The Glass Menagerie* on Cygnet Theatre's Old Town stage; Matt McGrath's Frank 'N' Furter sizzled in an uneven but rousing *Richard O'Brien's Rocky Horror Show* at the Old Globe Theatre.

Unexpected surprises: Who knew the much-produced *Lend Me a Tenor* could still be so much fun? It was, at North Coast Repertory Theatre. Seeing *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* for the umpteenth time shouldn't have been such a hoot, but Grinch Steve Blanchard makes it so.

Noteworthy: Diversionary Theatre's *Edward II*, with a cast of 15, was the company's largeststaged production to date—and, for the most part, it worked; a hosanna for La Jolla Playhouse's re-imagination of *Jesus Christ Superstar*— not immaculate, but inventive, and you can't beat the music.

If I had one wish for 2012, it would be that more San Diegans would take advantage of the richness and diversity of their theater scene. If the theater companies themselves, in a trying economy, can keep ticket prices accessible and still do justice to their aspirations, all the better for everybody.

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas at theaters around the region, with nearly three dozen holiday tales coming to life on

stages from San Diego to Temecula.
