OLD 'GRINCH' IS BETTER THAN EVER

You're a mean one, Mr. Grinch. And you're also pretty hilarious, as well.

With a year under his belt as the green-skinned humbug in The Old Globe's "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" musical, the strapping actor Steve Blanchard revels in his return to the role this fall with a very funny, wallto-wall performance chock full of new ad-libs and dance moves.

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
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O'Brien's concept was to re-create the Seuss storybook and characters onstage, an eye-popping feat amazingly achieved by scenic designer John Lee Beatty and costumer Robert Morgan.

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The intermissionless show is just the right length for preschoolers, with a singalong, snowfall effects and actors in the aisles to keep them engaged. And the physical production — with fresh costume elements this year — looks brand-new. The Grinch is back, San Diego, and as Blanchard says at the end of his "One of a Kind" solo number: "Get used to it."

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wilder" performance than that heard in 2003, perhaps because the players were less inhibited by age and experience; however, in viewing the UCSD documentary I realize the SummerFest performance at Mandeville Auditorium was pretty wild too.

The work was performed exuberantly by The Hausmann Quartet (**Isaac Allen** and **Eric Chin**, violins; **Angela Choong**, viola; and **Jeremiah Shaw**, cello, artists in residence at San Diego State University). Jie Ma, who began playing the pipa at age 5, performed on the ancient Chinese instrument, which has four strings and as many as 20some frets.

Ghost Opera is incomparable in its use of unconventional effects, which include theatrics, walking and vocalizing (text from Shakespeare's *The* Tempest and words from traditional Chinese peasant invocations) in addition to the aforementioned natural elements of water and stones plus paper and various gongs, bells and cymbals. The five movements are titled Bach, Monks and Shakespeare Meet in Water; Earth Dance; Dialogue with Little Cabbage"; Metal and Stone; and Song of Paper.

The first time I was informed (in a poem) that stones have souls I was dubious; now, not so much. If one is familiar with other Tan Dun works one recognizes the poetic vocabulary. To hear it twice in one s lifetime is a privilege. He is celebrated for his Oscar-winning score for the film Crouching Dragon, Hidden Tiger," but we know him from the concert hall.

Other works on the program included J.S. Bach s Prelude and Fugue No. 4 in C-sharp minor, BWV 849 (from the book of the Well-Tempered Clavier) performed by harpsichordist **Ines Irawati**; and Bright Sheng s *The Stream Flows* performed by violinist **Pei-Chun Tsai**.

Let the Grinchmas begin

Dr. Seuss How the Grinch Stole Christmas! kicks off holiday season

Following the Friday (November 23) opening performance of the Old Globes 15th annual production of *Dr. Seuss How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* an elementary school sized boy

skipped up the stairs leading to Alcazar Garden, gripping his father s hand. Who Likes Christmas?" he sang. Dad sang along. I can think of no other image that better describes Audrey (Mrs. Dr. Seuss) Geisel s gift to the theatre and to the children of the world than to grant the rights for the Timothy Mason/Mel Marvin musical to the Globe.

The show, originally conceived and directed by **Jack O Brien**, has a company that comprises professional actor/singers plus two companies of kids, who play the little ones of Whoville, where everyone loves Christmas. Inside this years program are profiles of previous Cindy-Lou Whos, what they are doing now. It is obvious that what *Grinch* engenders, in addition to being marvelous family entertainment: it gives rise to an entire generation of theatregoers whose children may or may not become theatre professionals, but who will never forget the experience of seeing the musical for the first time and who may possibly get into the theatergoing habit. The work was originally commissioned by Minneapolis Children s Theatre.

For the second year in a row, **Steve Blanchard** portrays the mean green one; this year with even more relish, if possible. His One of a Kind," performed with newcomer **Jason Edward Cook** as Young Max, is a highlight of the show. I ve always suspected that Blanchard's Grinch is more ham than Who. Now I know for certain. It's a delightful performance, not scary enough to frighten the smallest show goers, as has happened in some interpretations over the production's duration. Cook is quite appealing as Young Max, and part of the appeal is built in. Who can resist a puppy as cute as this?

The adult ensemble includes the considerable talents of **Geno Carr** as Papa Who, **Kelsey Venter** as Mama Who, **Phil Johnson** as Grandpa Who and **Amanda Naughton** as Grandma Who. Other grown-up Whos are played by **Jacob Caltrider**, **Nancy Snow-Carr**, **Randall Dodge**, **Kyle J. Jackson**, **Carly Nykanen** and **Allison Spratt Pearce**.

On opening night **Caitlin McAuliffe**, a veteran of the role, portrayed Cindy-Lou Who, both acting and tessitura under control in her winning Santa for a Day," in which she mistakes the felonious Grinch for Mr. Claus and causes his heart to melt. Subsequently, that organ grows three sizes and he returns all the purloined presents. The turning point, as you remember, is when he realizes that Christmas comes to Whoville even without presents.

Seen in alternate performances, the Pink Team comprises Lilith Freund as Cindy-Lou and others as follows: Dylan Nalbandian, Annie Buckley, Aaron Acosta, Sydney Rose Horowitz, Gabi Leibowitz, Luke Babbitt, Ava Marie Bunn, Katrina Heil, and Maxine Sutton.

James Vásquez directs and Charlie Reuter is musical director/conductor. The excellent union Who-chestra comprises associate conductor/keyboard Steven Withers; Andrea Altona, concertmaster; Karina Bezkrovnaia, violin; Erica Erenyi, cello; Deborah Avery, flute/clarinet; Cory Hornick, clarinet/tenor sax; Joe McNally, acoustic bass; and Tim McMahon, drums/percussion. Bob Richard provides additional choreography to John DeLuca s original. The artistic team further comprises John Lee Beatty, scenic design; Associate Artist Robert Morgan, costume design; Pat Collins, lighting design; Paul Peterson, sound design.

Chicago playwright **Marisa Wegrzyn** loves puzzles and intricate, wacky people. She s reached the top of this game with *Hickorydickory*, an intricate puzzle play that was seen opening night, November 24, at Moxie Theatre. Previously, Moxie has produced two of Wegrzyn s plays, *The Butcher of Baraboo* and *Ten Cent Night*.



Grinch is here already, with fingernails out to there, nothing but bad to say about Christmas and a special hatred for those Whos down in Whoville.

The 15th annual rendering of "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas!" barged into The Old Globe and has set up shop through Dec. 29. James Vásquez directs and restages the choreography, as he has since 2003.

After the green monster threatens to confiscate audience cell phones, the Grinch's elderly canine companion Old Max (Steve Gunderson) comes on to narrate the story of his mean ol' boss whose "heart was two sizes too small."

Old Max takes us back to the snowy, lonely Mount Crumpit above Whoville where the Grinch (Steve Blanchard) lives in a cave with Young Max (Jason Edward Cook), loudly moaning about all the joy and good will circulating like the common cold down in Whoville.

This year, the Grinch puts into operation his "wonderful, awful" idea to eliminate Christmas forever with a devious plan to steal all the Christmas presents, reasoning that surely that's what the season is all about.

The Grinch runs a reconnaissance mission to Whoville first, to scope out the gift sites. He doesn't figure on meeting the annoyingly friendly natives, who invite him to the roast beast feast the next day. Little do they suspect his nefarious intent.

In the end, of course, the Grinch's nasty plan is thwarted by love, joy and the Christmas spirit in the form of little Cindy-Lou Who (double cast and played adorably if not always with perfect diction or intonation by Caitlin McAuliffe at this performance).

The main supporting cast is played with reliable panache by "Grinch" veterans Geno Carr, Kelsey Venter, Phil Johnson and Amanda Naughton; together with the large, lovable ensemble and the fine Charlie Reuter-led "who-chestra," the now-familiar songs by Mel Marvin and Timothy Mason sound as good as ever.

Bravo (again) to set designer John Lee Beatty, costumer Robert Morgan, as well as Pat Collins and Paul Peterson, lighting and sound designers, respectively. Joshua Rosenblum's vocal arrangements and incidental music are fine, as is the dance music arranged by David Krane.

This year, at 10:30 am Dec. 15, the Globe will present an "autism-friendly" performance of "Grinch," the first of its kind at the theater, patterned after similar, highly successful initiatives on Broadway.

It's almost gotten to the point where it's not Christmas without "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas!" If you haven't seen it (or even if you have), I'd advise you to grab the kids and go.

The Grinch may be only "as cuddly as a cactus" but his wit and charm in the Old Globe's 15th annual production of Dr. Suess' How the Grinch Stole Christmas is funny and welcoming. Playing through December 29, the show is a laugh a minute from start to finish. This rendition of the classic Christmas story is unlike any I have ever witnessed.

Steve Blanchard plays the incredible grumpy villain whom the audience can't help but love. Blanchard brings absolute bustling charisma and comic genius to his Grinch character. Of course, where would the Grinch be without his trusty companion Max (Steve Gunderson, Old Max), who opens the play and keeps the audience up to date all the way through? Having Young Max (Jason Edward Cook) and Old Max both tell the story in past and present tense brings the story to life all that much more.

Little Cindy Lou Who (Caitlin McAuliffe – in this performance) is a show stopper, tugging at heart strings as her beautiful innocence reminds us to love thy neighbor unconditionally. 'Silver Linings Playbook' — smart, funny and great performance

Solitano's doctor told him. After spending eight months in a mental institution, Pat (Bradley Cooper) has good reason to listen to his physician. But as the plot of *Silver Linings Playbook* unfolds, the question arises – did that one incident for Pat occur when he found his wife in the shower with her colleague, or was it his wacked-out reaction to the confrontation?



After being released from the hospital, Pat (Bradley Cooper) thinks little about anything logical at first. He's back where he never wanted to be – living with his parents (Robert De Niro, Jacki Weaver). Mom is too coddling. Dad, an obsessed football nut, thinks Pat must sit by his side watching every move of a Philadelphia football game or they will lose.

The first days are most difficult for Pat as he refuses to take his medicine and his bi-polar illness has him sending a book out through the attic window because it had an unhappy ending and scrapping dishes off of a table to the floor at a diner. That's where Pat has invited Tiffany (Jennifer Lawrence) to breakfast.

Tiffany met Pat at a family dinner and began stalking him on his run every morning. Over several days Pat discovers Tiffany is as mixed up as he is. She's also trying to forget and compensate for a past history.

Once they actually become

civil to each other, Pat realizes Tiffany may be the one to slip a note to his ex-wife Nikki (Brea Bee), who has a restraining order against Pat and does not want to see him. Tiffany agrees but only if Pat will be her partner in a dance competition.

Pat decides he must learn to look for the "Silver Linings" in his life if he wants to stay out of incarceration. How he determines what a "Silver Lining" is – as well as what could cause more trauma in his life – turns out to be more complicated than he ever imagined.

Lawrence (Winter's Bone, The Hunger Games, The Buming Plain) has quickly leaped ahead of many of her peers in making every one of her characters come fully alive. She does this magnificently in Silver Linings Playbook by depicting Tiffany as tireless in trying to break the chains of regret from around her heart and find life worth living once again. It's a superb performance.





Roberta Wells-Famula, director of education at the Old Globe, said the company was inspired by the Autism Theatre Initiative that was launched last year by New York's Theatre Development Fund, a nonprofit group that provides support for stage productions.

The Theatre Development Fund has organized autism-friendly performances of Disney's "The Lion King" and "Mary Poppins" on Broadway.

Wells-Famula said the Old Globe performance isn't part of the development fund program, but the New York organization will act as an advisor to the Old Globe. She said the Old Globe is modeling the performance on what TDF has done with"The Lion King"and "Mary Poppins."

GLOBE TO STAGE AN AUTISM-FRIENDLY 'GRINCH'

Popular holiday show will tone down loud noises and bright lights and offer areas in the lobby where playgoers can take a break

The <u>Old Globe</u> Theatre is planning something new for the 15th season of its popular holiday show: an "autism-friendly" performance of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!"

The performance, set for 10:30 a.m. Dec. 15, will include both small adjustments to the show itself and (perhaps just as important) a friendly and flexible environment for people on the autism spectrum and their families.

Larger theaters in San Diego and elsewhere have long offered performances for the visually and hearing-impaired, but the autism-friendly initiative is a first for the Globe (or any major San Diego theater company).

It takes after similar, very popular performances of "The Lion King" and "Mary Poppins" on Broadway, as well as the "sensory-friendly" movie screenings offered by the AMC cinema chain.

Tickets go on sale Sept. 9, although

details of distribution and pricing are still being worked out.

The Globe, which began work on the idea last year, has received guidance from the Theatre Development Fund, the New Yorkbased nonprofit behind the "Mary Poppins" and "Lion King" initiatives.

"They would love to see this happening all over the place," said Roberta Wells-Famula, the Globe's director of education. "They've seen how it's been received with such joy by the public. They were just astounded by the reaction they got, and how quickly the shows sold out."

Autism is a spectrum of conditions that, in various combinations and to various degrees, affect people in three main areas: communication, social skills and behavior (the latter sometimes characterized by repetition or very narrow interests).

Some people with autism can be highly sensitive to loud noises, bright lights or other sensory stimuli. Others may have difficulty sitting through a whole show without SEE 'GRINCH' • E7

a break, or may vocalize or have other behaviors that the average theater patron isn't accustomed to.

"This is one of the problems for many families of children with autism," as Wells-Famula put it. "It isn't (always) the kind of thing where you look at a child and say, 'Oh, that child has autism.' You can't see it. You don't know. And so you see a child acting a certain way, and you react. You say, 'That child is misbehaving,' or 'That parent is a bad parent.'

"Parents are afraid to take their children somewhere. So they don't. They don't want to disturb other people. So this is intended to be a welcoming, warm environment, an accepting environment, for families who get it. These are people who know what the other families are going through, and they're all there together to say, we understand each other, we accept you."

Some elements of the Globe's autism-friendly initiative:

• Recruitment of autism specialists to act as volunteers (the theater already is working with local autismfocused groups).

Training for all theater staff members who will be interacting with the public.
A special rehearsal for

the show's cast, as well as a briefing on what the actors might expect to hear or see from the audience.

• A toning-down of loud noises and flashes during the performance, as well as of some scenes where actors rush into the aisles (although they will otherwise be substantially the same).

• Special areas in the lobbies for patrons to sit and take a break. "(Playgoers) can go back in, or not," says Wells-Famula.

• Printable "social stories" on the theater's website that will help patrons visualize and prepare for the whole experience, from parking lot to theater.

Wells-Famula emphasized that while the "Grinch" is primarily a children's show, there are no restrictions on who comes to the performance: "This is for all ages."

She noted that Michael Murphy, the Globe's managing director, attended an autism-friendly "Poppins" performance in New York.

"He was struck by all the preparation that was done, but also by the fact (the experience) wasn't that different," she said. "The children were completely engrossed in the show, having a marvelous time."

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

Grinch makes his 15th appearance at <u>Old Globe</u>

SAN DIEGO

At the Old Globe Theatre, it's going to be another green Christmas — the 15th since that avocado-hued crank the Grinch first skulked onstage in Balboa Park.

The theater's latest edition of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" gets under way this week, with the first preview performance tonight.

The yuletide really starts to roll in Sunday when the Globe hosts its annual Grinch Christmas Tree Lighting.

Lilith Freund of University City and Caitlin McAuliffe of Poway will alternate in the all-important role of Cindy-Lou Who. The cast also features such distinguished (grown-up) San Diego actors as Steve Gunderson (in his 10th "Grinch" edition), Kelsey Venter, Randall Dodge, Geno Carr, Jacob Caltrider, Nancy Snow Carr and Allison Spratt Pearce.

James Vasquez, fresh off staging two straight shows at Diversionary Theatre, returns to direct.

At 10:30 a.m. Dec. 15, the Globe will present an "autismfriendly" performance of "Grinch," the first of its kind at the theater.

Oceanside theater closes first season with 1930s comedy

The theater's latest edition of the holiday standby "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" gets under way this week, with a first preview performance Saturday night.

The yuletide really starts to roll in, though, on Sunday (Nov. 18), when the Globe hosts its annual Grinch Christmas Tree Lighting.

At the event's center is a Seuss-ian tree designed by John Lee Beatty, who also conceived the sets for the show. (It'll stay on the theater's Copley Plaza for the duration of the musical's run.)

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James Vasquez, fresh off staging two straight shows at Diversionary Theatre (as well as making movies and working on possibly uncountable other projects), returns to direct.

And new this year: At 10:30 a.m. Dec. 15, the Globe will present an "autism-friendly" performance of "Grinch," the first of its kind at the theater. The idea was inspired by similar, highly successful initiatives on Broadway. (See our previous story for more details.)

The delightful and whimsical musical is based upon the classic Dr. Seuss book and features a story that keeps kids speechless or laughing out loud and features the songs "Santa for a Day," "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch" and "Welcome, Christmas (Fah Who Doraze)."

One of the best things about this show is that it gives local children and adults a chance to spread their artistic wings playing characters in the play. This year the stage will be filled with new and returning junior thespians.

Being a great fan of Dr. Seuss, Dimmick is thrilled to be making her debut with The Old Globe in this season's Grinch.

Despite her busy schedule Dimmick is excited to be appearing in Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! "I was very excited to get the part, and everyone there really helps us a lot." she said. "I've never seen it, but I've read the book. I really love the dancing the most. "

Dimmick agrees the costumes in the show are quite funny. "I play the character My Son Pinocchio, Beauty and the Beast and Peter Pan (San Diego Junior Theatre), Alice's Daughter in Big River (California Youth Conservatory) and Once Upon a Mattress (Actors' Conservatory Theatre – San Diego). 

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

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

"Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" Old Globe Theatre

It wouldn't be Christmas in San Diego without the Grinch. The Green Meanie, that beloved anti-Christmas curmudgeon from the Dr. Seuss book (Theodor Geisel was a long-time La Jolla resident), will sled down his mountain to the Old Globe for the 15th year. Children of all ages adore this swiftmoving, irresistible musical (book and lyrics by Timothy Mason, music by Mel Marvin), that brings the cherished classic delightfully to life – in all its black, white, pink and red splendor. Even the tiniest tots are wide-eyed with wonder when they see the snow fall in the theater.

This year, The Globe is offering something new: an autism-friendly performance (Saturday, Dec. 15, 10:30 a.m.). In consultation with autism authorities, special features, in-

which makes for some striking '30s costumes and engaging original music, though the time period doesn't add any new layers or insights to the work.



The Grinch may rest his rep on separating people from their Christmas presents, but Saturday at the Old Globe Theatre, the comical Dr. Seuss villain came bearing a rare gift indeed.

The Balboa Park theater presented a special performance of its popular holiday musical "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" geared toward people with autism and their families.

The performance, the first of its kind at a major local theater (and inspired by similar initiatives on Broadway), featured modified sound, lighting and other effects in deference to sensory sensitivities.

But for many of the families who attended, the most welcome aspect was just being in a community of people who understood their challenges and wouldn't bat an eye at behavior that might be deemed disruptive at a typical performance.



special "Grinch" perfor-mance will be offered with several adaptations. Before the show, children can familiarize themselves with the Globe and the show. During the show, loud noises and flashing lights will be reduced, actors will not walk through the audience or move too quickly on stage, and the house lights will be kept on so children in the seating areas will feel more comfortable. The lobby will be reserved as a quiet space where families can go if the children become overwhelmed during the show, and volunteers will be on hand to assist families before and during the performance.

Tickets for the autismfriendly performance will go on sale Sept. 9. Visit theoldglobe.org/autism.

With their input, the exhibit has been redesigned so that it focuses more on human rights issues than on the devices and how they operate.

The exhibit features a range of artifacts on loan from the Museo della Tortura in Italy.

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

Honoring lyricist Ira Gershwin in 'Words By'

North Coast Rep's latest a fun visit to the past

North Coast Rep invites us to revisit the Gershwin brothers' collaborative songbook in a world-premiere production written by Joseph Vass. The production, which, on top of highlighting Ira Gershwin's work, includes additional lyrics by DuBose Heyward, and music from Harold Arlen, Vernon Duke, Jerome Kern and Kurt Weill, will entertain audiences through Nov. 18.

The set list includes 26 songs, with favorites such as "How Long Has This Been Going On," "I Loves You Porgy" and "The Man That Got Away."

Ira Gershwin (played by Nicholas Mongiardo-Cooper) spends a lot of time chatting up his brother, George, about their lifelong collaboration. Ira almost always penned the lyrics after George wrote the music; that's the way these siblings worked best. The results included popular songs as well as Broadway and opera scores.

Throughout the production, Mongiardo-Cooper as Ira – arguably one of the greatest American lyricists of all time – informs the audience about the inspiration for many of the duo's best-known songs. It's a casual, reflective and warm story telling, mostly done while sitting in a comfortable arm chair set stage right, in front of a few panels highlighting words straight from many of the songs you'll hear during the production.

Director David Ellenstein maximizes the music and interjects a touch of dance to vary the mood. His three-actor cast, in addition to Mongiardo-Cooper, includes Andrew Ableson as "Crooner" and Meghan Andrews as "Chanteuse." All three are competent, showing off a wide range of vocal accomplishment. They even complete on the song "Tchaikovsky," attempting to break a 31-second record set by Danny Kaye.


and Duncan Moore on drums. Vass includes many of the

Gershwin brothers' best-known songs, while interjecting some of the lesser-known musical ditties that Ira Gershwin wrote with his brother, such as the funny and entertaining "Blah Blah Blah."

It's amazing their joint song list is so extensive, considering George Gershwin died at the age of 38. Ira describes his brother as a workaholic, not ever able to step away from the music to relax and take in a round of golf like himself.

This musical play is fun and moves along at a pleasant clip, offering up tidbits of jazz and pop. It's also a very nice visit to the past.

For many this show may be too comfortable; not enough edge to songs like "The Man That Got Away" or not enough soulful pain exhibited on "Porgy and Bess." But for those of you who like curling up at night in a warm comforter, this one's for you. ▼

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






The San Diego Museum of Art, Timken Museum of Art and Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego (MCASD) have come together to stage one groundbreaking exhibition: "Behold, Americal: Art of the United States from Three San Diego Museums." In a process that dates back to 2005, the institutions are sharing ideas, resources and works of art on one project for the very first time.

Open now through Feb. 10, 2013, "Behold, America!" showcases U.S. art from each museum's permanent collection, with works spanning from 1761 - 2009. Amy Galvin, project curator for American art at the San Diego Museum of Art and the exhibit's curator, said the decision to combine the three museums on this project has many benefits.

"It seemed like a natural fit to bring together the art of the United States, because each institution has strong examples of work created in the U.S., but none of the institutions

This is the first in a trilogy of plays by the widely praised African-American playwright <u>Tarell Alvin McCraney</u>. The second in the trilogy will be staged in January at the Old Globe.

Over at <u>Diversionary Theatre</u> in Hillcrest, a play called "when last we flew" runs for a few more weeks. It's a coming-of-age drama about a young black man in Kansas who is obsessed with Tony Kushner's modern classic "Angels in America."

Once it closes, Diversionary does a complete 180, and whips up some campy holiday fun with "Scrooge in Rouge." It's set in a Victorian music hall where a production of "A Christmas Carol" is in jeopardy when a bad case of food poisoning hits. Only three actors are left to put on the show, wearing all the wigs and costumes available. Not sure you'll find a more risqué version of the Dickens classic.

If manic slapstick is your thing, you actually have another option. After a seven year hiatus, <u>San Diego REP</u> brings back a Christmas show. In fact, it's called "The Ultimate Christmas Show." From the same comedic minds behind the <u>Reduced Shakespeare Company</u>, it promises an elf ballet AND disco dancing. In other words, there's a little something for everyone.

A few other options to consider:

<u>North Coast Rep</u> offers two holiday plays: an "unscripted" version of "A Christmas Carol" and "Sister's Christmas Catechism: The Mystery of the Magi's Gold."

<u>New Village Arts</u> in Carlsbad has "Plaid Tidings," which features a singing group sent to earth by Rosemary Clooney to put some harmony in the world.



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




keeps giving — earning ample year-end revenue, reaching an expanded public, and initiating youngsters into theater-going. Center Theatre Group, in its 46th season as L.A.'s flagship stage company, is putting on its first Christmas production a new version of "A Christmas Carol" by Chicago's Second City comedy troupe at the Kirk Douglas Theatre in Culver City. So is the Geffen Playhouse, with "Coney Island Christmas," a new comedy by Pulitzer Prize-winner Donald Margulies about Yuletide consternation within a Jewish family in 1930s Brooklyn. But neither is touting its show as a renewable resource just yet.

"It's a script that makes me laugh out loud when I read it," CTG artistic director Michael Ritchie said of "The Second City's Christmas Carol Twist Your Dickens!" But he isn't ready to envision it as a sugar plum to serve yearly. "Whether we'll do another one, I don't know. I couldn't begin to go down that path yet."

In the two counties south of L.A., nearly 1 million playgoers have seen the two reigning Christmas plays — and that's not counting San Diego Repertory Theatre's "A Christmas Carol," which ended a 30-season run in 2005.

Sometime between now and Dec. 29, the 500,000th person

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will stroll past the Dr. Seuss-inspired Christmas tree on the plaza at the Old Globe in Balboa Park and take a seat for the 15th annual presentation of its musical, "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!"

In Costa Mesa, some 450,000 playgoers since 1980, many multiple-repeat customers, have taken in SCR's "A Christmas Carol."

Hal Landon Jr., has monopolized the role of Scrooge since the beginning. For many repeat viewers, part of the suspense in this 33rd season will be whether Landon can still coax his 71-year-old frame through his trademark somersault across the bed as Scrooge joyously greets Christmas Day, grabbing and donning his top hat before he hits the floor and scampers off to literature's most touching Christmas dinner with Tiny Tim and the rest of Bob Cratchit's clan.

Executive director Paula Tomei says audience surveys suggest that about a third of the audience, which totals about 15,000 annually, makes "A Christmas Carol" a yearly feature of its holiday celebration. About two-thirds of the audience, drawn mainly from Orange County, doesn't see any other plays at SCR, so "A Christmas Carol" is an important cog in fulfilling one aspect of a nonprofit company's mission — reaching people who otherwise might not experience live theater.

"There are adults now who played Tiny Tim when they were children and are bringing their own families to see the show," Tomei said. "It speaks to the enduring value of the production in people's lives."

It also has enduring value for the company's coffers. "A Christmas Carol" typically plays to 90% to 95% of capacity at the 507-seat Segerstrom Stage, Tomei said, and this year's projected box office take from 36 performances is \$750,000, or about 17% of the 2012-13 season's expected ticket revenue.

The show, an in-house adaptation of Dickens' 1843 novella written by SCR's former dramaturge, Jerry Patch, demands a large cast -17 adults and eight children. But one of the economic advantages of a holiday perennial is that the set pieces, costumes and props don't have to be created and paid for more than once, apart from whatever refurbishments and replacements might be needed as the years go by.

Presented as a non-subscription stand-alone, "it helps subsidize other programs," Tomei said — a sort of living, renewable endowment that the company has come to rely on as a fiscal anchor for its overall seasons.

The numbers for the Globe's "Grinch" are also eye-catching: This year's 61-performance run in the 600-seat main theater is expected to play to about 32,000 people and gross about \$1.6 million, said managing director Michael Murphy, or about 15% of the company's annual box office receipts. La Jolla resident Audrey Geisel, now 91, granted the Old Globe performing rights to the "Grinch" story that her late husband, Theodor, had written and illustrated in 1957 under his pen name, Dr. Seuss.



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

Its bid is "A Snow White Christmas," a humorous, song-filled retelling of the fairy tale staged in partnership with Lythgoe Family Productions, a company anchored by the son and ex-wife of television producer Nigel Lythgoe, creator of "American Idol" and "So You Think You Can Dance."

Artistic director Sheldon Epps liked the Lythgoes' 2011 independent staging of the show at the 354-seat El Portal Theatre in North Hollywood. Modified for American tastes, it's a traditional British form of holiday entertainment called panto, in which the telling of a classic children's story becomes the springboard for a kind of variety show that includes pop songs, comedy, magic and lots of audience interaction. Epps said the partnership will continue in 2013 with "Aladdin."

"I think we're all searching for that holiday entertainment we can think of more or less as a sure thing," he said. "It can support some of the riskier choices you want to make in your subscription seasons."

The Playhouse's previous bid for a holiday franchise was "Plaid Tidings," an offshoot of "Forever Plaid," a popular musical about a 1950s-style harmony vocal group. It sold well in 2001 and 2002, Epps said, but lost its box office groove when brought back for a third year. He hopes the pantos will supply the critical missing ingredient: appeal to families with young children.

At A Noise Within, the husband-wife leadership team of Geoff Elliott and Julia Rodriguez-Elliott is banking on a traditional telling of "A Christmas Carol." Geoff, who wrote the custom adaptation, will star as Scrooge. The fact that the original text is in the public domain and therefore free for all comers to weave into their own stage version figures into its popularity with stage companies.

Past bids for a holiday perennial didn't work for A Noise Within at its former 140-seat space in Glendale. The two company leaders think their new 283-seat theater in Pasadena, which opened last year, provides a suitable launching pad for extending Dickens' franchise to the L.A. area.

"It's an opportunity for a community of artists and a community of [playgoers] to come together with this unified event every year," Rodriguez-Elliott said. "It connects people

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FUN Murder Mystery

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The Geffen Playhouse is exploring the connection of Jews to (or their disconnection from) Christmas in "Coney Island Christmas," which Margulies ("Dinner With Friends") wrote at the behest of the company's late leader, Gil Cates.

Artistic director Randall Arney said that he and Cates, who died in 2011, had talked for several years about trying to develop a holiday season staple and wound up commissioning Margulies, one of their favorite playwrights. He decided to adapt Grace Paley's short story "The Loudest Voice," about the commotion caused in a Jewish family in 1930s Brooklyn when a daughter is cast as Jesus in her school's Christmas pageant.

"We're excited about creating something new and unique for the Geffen, and we're going to see how it connects," said Arney. "We don't want to get ahead of ourselves, but we're hoping it can become a perennial."

Small theaters also can cultivate Christmas gifts for themselves. The 49-seat Chance Theater in Anaheim has hit on a combination of family musicals in prime time (this year it's "Little Women"), and Jeff Goode's ribald comic tale of a sexually scandalous Santa Claus, "The Eight: Reindeer Monologues," in late night and early-in-the-week slots.

"Reindeer Monologues" is in its ninth year, and managing director Casey Long, who's been in every cast, says it has gotten to the point where the usually packed audience will call out their own answers to rhetorical questions in the script. "The show offers an alternative to the sweet holiday fare that's out there," he said.

The Blank Theatre Company in Hollywood is staging its production of David Sedaris' "The Santaland Diaries" for the fourth straight year. Having scored its biggest-ever hit in 2005-06 with another Sedaris show, "The Book of Liz," artistic director Daniel Henning seized upon "Santaland" amid the economic agony of 2009. The initial running packed the Blank's 49-seat home stage and the show has since graduated to the 99-seat Stella Adler Theatre.

Henning says it's "no coincidence" that the Blank, launched in 1990, was finally able to afford a part-time office manager when "Santaland" first kicked in, and there have been other benefits as well. "It doesn't make tons of money, but it makes a little profit, and that pays for the development of some new plays."




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

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Old Globe Spreads Cheer

On December 15 at 10:30 in the morning, The Old Globe Theatre offered an autism-friendly version of their annual performance of *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* in order to include all types of people in the holiday tradition (*oldglobe.org*). The autism-friendly version of the show is an excellent way to unite the whole of the San Diego community and should be replicated in further performances. "I think it's great how they're expanding their audiences so that everyone can experience this great show," said Sophomore Christian Lathrop.

According to the Old Globe's Director of Education Roberta Wells-Famula, the company was inspired by the Autism Theatre Initiative that New York's Theatre Development Fund launched last year. As part of the Autism Theatre Initiate, the nonprofit group advised the successful autism-friendly performances of *The Lion King* and *Mary Poppins* on Broadway (*playbill.com*). According to the *New York Times*, these shows were met with great success, with the autism-friendly performance of *The Lion King* selling out in one day (*nydailynews.com*). There is clearly a hole in the theatre-going community that these performances helped, and, as shown by the Old Globe's production, continue to help fill.

The primary virtue of the autism-friendly *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* performance was its creation of a sense of inclusion and community. Families with someone who has autism commonly feel uneasy when attending a play for fear of bad reactions to the lighting or sound, or of causing a disruption, according to the *New York Times (nydailynews.com)*. However, when a performance is specifically tailored to accommodate autistic needs, these concerns are eliminated. "Celebrating its fifteenth anniversary this year, *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* is a holiday tradition for many families throughout Southern California. However, there are those out there with family members on the autism spectrum who often avoid outings like this out of concern of being a distraction or embarrassment. This performance offers a safe place, or judgment-free zone, for the *entire* family to celebrate together," said Director James Vasquez. "I've always felt a great responsibility to treat the show with respect and love, and think it's a wonderful holiday gift to San Diego. And to be able to expand that audience and welcome more families into Whoville is a great honor."

Like Vasquez said, this broadening of audiences is doubly great because of the season during which it occurred. Not only does it create a better sense of community, but it also does this at a time when the community is particularly joyful and compassionate – the holidays. *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* has become integral to many San Diegan families' holiday celebrations. It is only right that all people can feel comfortable participating in this tradition, especially when unity and happiness are on everyone's mind. "Everyone deserves a lil' Grinch this time of year, and we are thrilled that we can do something special and ground-breaking here at the Globe to include ALL family members and loved ones," said Actor Steve Blanchard, who played the Grinch. According to Vasquez, by making slight changes to the show to produce an autism-friendly version, the Old Globe embodied the spirit of the holidays. These changes included putting the house lights on low levels over the audience throughout the performance and adjusting moments of loud noises and surprising moments.

"I hope this encourages other theatre companies to do what we are doing," said Actor Amanda Naughton, who played Grandma Who. "There are a lot of communities who previously may not have been encouraged to experience live theatre because of various constraints. If we learn what they need, and then do some modifications to make it more acceptable to these communities, just think of all the people we can reach." The Old Globe is taking a commendable step towards promoting shows that include all types of people in the community. If all goes well, hopefully this will soon become a trend in San Diego and across the United States.

For the last 35 years, she's performed in the popular Christmas Story Tree production, which retells the biblical story of Christmas through hymns and living scenes. "The reason I've stuck

"The reason 1 ve stuck with it for so long is because it's one of the only free Christmas programs in town," she said. "And so many people come up to me to say that our performance is part of their Christmas tradition." The Christmas Story Tree is an elaborate performance that begins soon after the mayor lights the December Nights Christmas tree.

It features an 80-person choir, a 20-piece live orchestra and many hours of set construction. But what makes this show unique is that the Christmas tree opens up to reveal various moments from the Nativity Story. "It's fun to be out in the

audience around people who are seeing it for the first time," said the church's pastor, Mark Milwee. "People think it's just a regular tree, but when it opens up, you can hear the sighs. It just takes their breath away." It's one of Sizemore's favorite moments, too. But for the first time since she's been part of the chorus, Sizemore, 74, will be away during December Nights (to attend her grandson's college gradu-

ation). Though her voice won't be among the choir, she's nonetheless a part of Balboa Park's most iconic celebration, which turns 35 this year.

San Diego may not bring much in the way of an idyllic "White Christmas," but for the past three decades, people from all over the county have gathered at Balboa Park for the free celebration that features music, art, storytelling and plenty of food.

The event, called Christmas on the Prado until 2002, was founded in 1978 by 10 Balboa Park cultural organizations and attracted 3,000 guests. The two-evening event featured museum store shopping, crafts, Elizabethan dances and music.

It has since grown to 300,000 visitors over two days and includes everything from performances of "The Nutcracker" and an artist village to carolers and foods from around the world.

You'll find something magical happening in practically every corner of the park. And while it's not easy to go into this event with an itinerary, there are plenty of highlights, including:

The Santa Lucia Procession: This is a Swedish celebration with a candlelight procession and music at 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. each night in the California Quadrangle by the San Diego Museum of Man. Be sure to stick around for Swedish meatballs and glögg, the hot, spiced wine.

International Christmas Festival: When people talk about the food at December Nights, they're mostly referring

December Nights now has a mobile app, December Nights on Meridian, that features an activity guide and nightly event listings. Download it for free in the App Store or Google Play by searching for "Meridian."

There will also be free Wi-Fi at many museums and popular spots, including the House of Hospitality, Mingei International Museum, Museum of Photographic Arts, Reuben H. Fleet Science Center, San Diego Air & Space Museum, San Diego Hall of Champions, San Diego Museum of Art, San Diego Museum of Man, San Diego Natural History Museum, The San Diego Museum of Art and more.

to the activities at the House of Pacific Relations International Cottages.

Arrive hungry and with an adventurous spirit, because you'll find palak paneer and chicken tikka masala from India; empanadas from Argentina and Colombia; pancit from the Philippines; Viking pea soup from Norway; coconut rice and sancocho from Panama; paella from Spain; aebleskiver (pancake ball) from Denmark; sausages from Germany, Hungary and the Czech Republic and Slovakia; crepes from France; and much, much more.

Don't worry, there will also be cuisine for less adventurous eaters: hot dogs and baked beans from the United States; tacos and churros from Mexico; hot chocolate from England; and baked potatoes from Scotland. Freebies: The park

offers free access to the museums from 5 to 9 p.m. both evenings. And within each museum, you'll find unique celebrations, including the Timken Museum's Christmas ornaments display. Del Cerro Baptist

Church: The choir performs "A Christmas Story Tree" at 8:30 each night at the Spreckels Organ Pavilion. Those who want to catch the performance without the big crowd can see it at 5:15 p.m. Sunday.

Getting there

As magical as December Nights can be, traffic and parking are often a nightmare. But unless you insist on finding a spot near the park, there are plenty of stress-free solutions.

Free and low-cost options: You'll find free parking and free shuttles running every 10 to 15 minutes from City College lots between 16th and B streets. You can park at Petco Park for \$5 and take a free shuttle. The shuttles, which are stroller-friendly, run from 4:30 to 11 p.m. Friday and noon to 11 p.m. Saturday.

Paid options: If you want to be by the park, you'll have to pay. Preferred parking at the Natural History Museum and South Carousel lots is \$20 and goes fast. Spaces across the street at Inspiration Point are also \$20. Those who show up early can find some free spots at the San Diego Zoo and along the streets, but those go even faster.

Beware: Balboa Park lots close at 2 p.m. Friday, so you can't arrive early and save a spot. Cars will be required to exit ad re-enter with paid admission.

Public transportation: If you take the trolley, your stop will be the Smart Corner on Park Boulevard, then transfer to the Route 7 bus, which will run extra buses throughout the weekend.

Art, music and performance bloom year-round.

Spanning 1,200 acres of lush, beautifully landscaped terrain, Balboa Park is known as San Diego's "crown jewel," offering a variety of outdoor recreation options for kids and adults alike, not to mention a verdant respite from the bustle of the city's increasingly metropolitan pace. The park is also the seat of San Diego's thriving cultural scene.

Nestled between palm trees and botanical gardens, ornate Spanish Colonial buildings house many of the park's museums and art exhibits. Several of the buildings were constructed as part of two world fairs: the Panama-California Exposition in 1915–16, and the California-Pacific International Exposition in 1935–36.

It can take more than one day to see and enjoy each museum, garden and attraction. The **Visitors Center** (619.239.0512) in the House of Hospitality offers a Passport to Balboa Park, allowing admission to any of the park's museums for one week. (Keep in mind some museums are closed on Mondays.) Deluxe packages include passes to the neighboring **San Diego Zoo**. Or go high-tech and let the park's iPhone app be your guide.

ARTS & CULTURE

Performing arts abound in the park. The **Old Globe Theatre** routinely presents top talent in world-renowned productions; winter features include the popular holiday classic, *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas* (through Dec. 29), followed by *Pygmalion* (Jan. 12-Feb. 17) and *The Brothers Size* (Jan. 26-Feb. 24). See p. 64-65 for more theater listings.

Elsewhere in the park, the **Marie Hitchcock Puppet Theatre** presents whimsical puppet shows, while **Spreckels Organ Pavilion** houses the world's largest outdoor pipe organ, with some 4,500 pipes. Free concerts are offered Sundays at 2 p.m.

The park is also home to groups celebrating culture. The **House of Pacific Relations International Cottages** promotes the heritage of countries around the world by hosting open houses and weekend festivals. Neighboring **WorldBeat Center** uses art, music, dance and education to celebrate African and indigenous cultures, while **Centro Cultural de la Raza** is a multidisciplinary center dedicated to the preservation of Chicano/Latino culture.

The park has a vast array of institutions celebrating the visual arts, past and present. Known for its presentation of eclectic traveling exhibits, the **San Diego Museum of Art** also has a trove of Renaissance and Baroque works, plus a large Asian collection; an exhibition featuring works from the colonial period, *Behold, Americal*, tells the story of the history of the U.S. and runs through Feb. 10. The world-class **Museum of Photographic Arts**

showcases compelling photography and also presents films in its state-of-the-art theater. The **Mingei International Museum** is dedicated to folk art, craft and design from around the world, while the **Timken Museum of Art** is home to the Putnam Foundation's renowned collection of European and Byzantine art, including Russian religious paintings.

The San Diego Art Institute's **Museum** of the Living Artist presents exhibitions by contemporary local artists every four to six weeks, and the historic **Spanish Village Art Center** is a collection of 37 studios representing more than 200 artists working in media ranging from sculpture to blown glass; the charming courtyard setting is meant to evoke an Old World town square.

SCIENCE & HISTORY

Balboa Park's many non-visual-art museums are a huge draw for children, but most distinguish themselves by crafting exhibitions that also appeal to adult sensibilities.

The San Diego Air and Space Museum salutes aviation with 68 original, reproduction and model airplanes and spacecraft. The Reuben H. Fleet Science Center has interactive science exhibitions and an IMAX Dome theater. The country's largest multisports museum, the San Diego Hall of Champions has interactive displays inviting sports fans to test their athletic and broadcasting skills. From antiques to hot rods, the San Diego Automotive Museum's collection illustrates the evolution of the automobile.



the **San Diego Museum of Man** explores cultures of the world, especially the Americas.

The largest of its kind, the **Model Railroad Museum** boasts scale models and interactive features for children. The **Museum of San Diego History** features traveling shows and exhibitions culled from the Historical Society's vast collection. At the **Veteran's Museum & Memorial Center** visitors will find military uniforms from World War I, Vietnam and the Korean War, as well as maritime paintings by local artists and other displays.

The **Marston House** (see *p.* 69), a Craftsman Prairie-style mansion designed in 1905 by noted architect Irving Gill, is a must for history and architecture buffs; the grounds also feature a carriage house and gardens.

ATTRACTIONS & GARDENS

The park's major attraction is, of course, the **San Diego Zoo** (*see p. 68*), with some 4,000 rare and endangered species. Among the animal residents you'll find the much-beloved meerkats, Asian and African elephants, monkeys, birds and more. Be sure to stop by Panda Canyon to say hello to the newest giant panda cub, born this past summer.

After visiting the zoo, try your hand at the brass ring game from your perch atop a hand-carved pony on the **Balboa Park Carousel**. Both kids and grown-ups are welcome on the **Balboa Park Miniature Railroad**, which takes a three-minute, half-mile trip through four acres of the park.

The park also features several gardens, a legacy left by its founding "mother," botanist Kate Sessions. Complete with ornate fountains and colorful tiling, the Spanishstyle Alcazar Garden, which abuts the Art Institute and Mingei Museum, blooms with 7,000 brilliantly colored annuals. The Japanese Friendship Garden features a Zen meditation garden and bonsai exhibit, while the sunken Zoro Garden has an interesting history: It was designed as a nudist colony during the 1935 California-Pacific International Exposition but is now a habitat for monarch, sulfur and swallowtail butterflies. Also built for the Expo, the Old Cactus Garden has succulents and other exotic plants.

With some 2,100 orchids, ferns, poinsettias and other plants, the **Botanical Building** is among the world's largest lath structures; along with its gorgeous **Lily Pond**, it's one of the park's most photographed sites.

RECREATION

From hiking and jogging to tennis and bocce ball, you'll find it in the park. The **Balboa Park Activity Center** has facilities for badminton, table tennis, volleyball and more, while the **Balboa Park Municipal Golf Course** offers striking views of downtown and Coronado.

At Texas and Upas streets, on the park's northeast end, the **Morley Field Sports Complex** is a haven for disc golf fans and other sports nuts, boasting a pool, velodrome, archery range and bocce court. Check in here for information on the many hike and bike trails through **Florida Canyon**, a popular workout spot for joggers.

The nearby **Balboa Tennis Club** is open to the public, with 25 courts and a full-service pro shop, plus lessons and clinics.

The dapper, white-clad members of the **San Diego Lawn Bowling Club**, which has been around for more than 75 years, play seven days a week near the corner of Sixth Avenue and Laurel Street. Visitors are welcome to join the fun and get a free lesson.

There are also a few **leash-free dog parks** here, including one at Balboa Drive and El Prado, south of the Cabrillo Bridge, and another at Morley Field, northwest of the tennis courts.

DINING

Several casual snack bars and coffee carts can be found throughout the park and inside certain museums. For a sit-down experience, try **The Prado**, whose lively, colorful interior and charming garden patio—not to mention hearty American cuisine, refreshing salads and exotic South American cocktails—have made it a longtime local favorite.

The Tea Pavilion at the Japanese Friendship Garden serves tea, noodles and sushi in a casual setting, while the Sculpture Court Café at the San Diego Museum of Art is a good bet for salads and sandwiches

For the at-home gourmand, the **Balboa Park Food & Wine School** has classes in everything from fondue-making to sushirolling taught by celebrated local chefs, plus wine education. Be sure to make reservations in advance, though, as classes tend to fill up quickly.

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


