'GRINCH' A CHRISTMAS TRADITION WITH COLOR, MAGIC

Returning cast, classic set bring happy familiarity

Christmas traditions are usually sacred rites with little variation from year to year. That recipe seems to be working as well as ever at The Old Globe. where "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas" musical is marking its 16th holiday season.

With many of the same cast members and only a few minor script tweaks, this year's "Grinch" runs like a well-oiled machine, yet there's nothing routine about it. It still has the charm, warmth and magic that brings audiences back year after year.

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A sweet, ambling Steve Gunderson reprises his role as Old Max, the show's nostalgic narrator. Geno Carr, back for thirds, has honed his gentle-natured Papa Who to perfection. Moonlight Amphitheatre veteran Bets Malone makes her Old Globe debut as Mama Who, giving the part a much younger vibe than past performers. Endearing 7-yearold Gabriella Dimmick has to be the tiniest Cindy-Lou Who in Globe history. Eileen Bowman returns once again. as Grandma Who and Kürt Norby makes his debut as Grandpa Who.

And Elan McMahan, musical director for the Globe's past two Shakespeare festivals, adds the "Grinch" to her credits as both musical director and conductor.

The 100-minute musical is just the right size for toddlers, who made up a starry-eved (and quite vocal) chunk of Thursday's opening-night audience. Since the "Grinch" is showing no signs of age, today's toddlers might just be bringing their own children to see the show someday.



The lights are going up on San Diego's freeway overpasses, a noticeable chill can be felt in the air, and a decorated tree nearly 30 feet tall appears in the forecourt of the Donald and Darlene Shiley Stage at The Old Globe Theatre in Balboa Park.

It must be time for that green-furred villain everyone loves to hate, as **Dr. Seuss' "How the Grinch Stole Christmas"** plays through Dec. 28.

It's Christmastime in Whoville and the residents are bustling about in the final preparations for their most beloved holiday of the year. Living above Whoville is the Grinch who despises the Whos almost as much as he despises Christmas all on account of his heart being two sizes too small.

Can the spirit of the holiday melt the Grinch's ice-cold heart or will he succeed in stealing the season away from Whoville?

Geared toward a more family-friendly theatre experience, The Old Globe goes to great lengths to ensure this production can be seen by one and all and is sure to be a hit with parents and children alike.

The typical 8 p.m. curtain time has been moved back one hour to 7 p.m. and the performance is done without intermission letting audiences out around 8:30, plenty of time to have young ones in bed and ready for school the next morning.

For those still concerned, afternoon matinees have been added at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. An additional note: though the Old Globe has a strict age limit on its shows (no patrons under age 3 allowed) all 11 a.m. performances are for all ages allowing even the littlest Whos to experience the magic of 'The Grinch.'

To give this production the ultimate test for a kid's approval, I invited my 9-year-old niece to attend the show with me. "That was the neatest thing I've ever seen!" was her review. "The Grinch was funny and I liked the guy who played his dog a lot but I loved the part where the Grinch rode the sleigh the best!"


Indeed there are some wonderful special effects along with a superb set provided by John Lee Beatty and equally stunning costumes designed

by Robert Morgan. Book and lyrics provided by Timothy Mason and music by Mel Marvin, this show finds the magic in Dr. Seuss' original work and exquisitely reintroduces it to a whole new audience.

Helmed by local theatre guru James Vasquez, this production enters its 16th season and shows no signs of slowing. Steve Gunderson returns for his 11th turn as Old Max, the narrator and faithful companion to the Grinch, and Steve Blanchard tackles the title character for his third year in a row. The yin to his yang, Gunderson plays a playful albeit slower Max juxtaposed by Blanchard's over-the-top and rancorous Grinch. Both are absolutely delightful.

Surrounding these two is a company as charmed as the original work itself that work tirelessly to bring this classic to the stage and into the hearts of theatregoers alike. After 16 years, this production is introducing this Seuss tradition, as well as the gift of live theatre, to a whole new generation and reminding us older folks what this season is really all about.

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THEATER REVIEW: "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas!"

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The weather's turner colder. It must be time for the reappearance of His Grinchiness at The Old Globe.

Yes, it's the 16th incarnation of this happy holiday tradition back to amuse, annoy, perhaps even scare but most of all to touch our hearts with the possibility of change and human (well, sort of) connection.

"How The Grinch Stole Christmas!" plays Tuesdays through Fridays through Dec. 28, with three shows a day on weekends. James Vásquez directs and restages the choreography, as he has since 2003.

Continuing a new tradition started last year, a special autism-friendly performance on Dec 14 at 10:30 am will serve children and adults on the autism spectrum with this lovely show.

You remember the story: the Grinch's now aged dog Old Max (Steve Gunderson) returns for one last look at the old place before he retires and moves on. He recalls those days when his master, the distinctly unjolly green giant Grinch (Steve Blanchard) took him to live in that frigid Mt. Crumpit cave and forced him to help in his nefarious plan to stop Christmas from coming to Whoville below.

You see, it's the joy he finds among those Whos he can't stand. They all seem so – well, happy, especially at this time of year. It's downright depressing.

So he ties some (stolen) antlers on Young Max (Jeffrey Schecter)'s head, hitches him to a rickety sleigh and steals into Whoville in the dead of Christmas Eve night to grab all the gifts and decorations. Surely this will end Christmas forever.

But an unexpected visit from little Cindy-Lou Who (the adorable Taylor Coleman the day I saw it) melts that hairy green guy's Grinchiness with winsomeness and before you know it, his poor shriveled heart has grown three sizes.

The show, with music by Mel Marvin, book and lyrics by Timothy Mason (with additional music by Albert Hague and additional

lyrics by Dr. Seuss himself) features fine performances, crazy costumes, sprightly choreography, cute songs and lots of good will.

That's why it's a holiday tradition.

Blanchard, back for his third Grinch, has this role down pat and he's not only mean but ugly, with that long, mossy hair and fingernails out to there. But he cleans up pretty well and manages to look almost fetching as a Duke-imitating visitor from "Whoston." And he can sing, dance and crack a joke with the best of them.

Coleman (an adorable 7-year-old) is totally winning as Cindy-Lou. The Grinch's grouchiness doesn't have a chance around this pint-sized dynamo.

Gunderson's Old Max and Schecter's Young Max are perfect as the main recipients of the daily meannness finally freed by the Grinch's change of heart.

The main supporting cast – veterans Geno Carr (Papa Who) and Eileen Bowman (Grandma Who) and show newcomers Kürt Norby (Grandpa Who) and Bets Malone (Mama Who) are excellent, as is the large ensemble.

This year's "Who-chestra", capably led by Elan McMahan, makes the charming songs sound as good as ever.

Bravo (again) to set designer John Lee Beatty, costumer Robert Morgan, as well as Pat Collins and Paul Peterson, lighting and sound designers, respectively. Joshua Rosenblum's vocal arrangements and incidental music are fine, as is the dance music arranged by David Krane.

It's almost impossible to imagine Christmas in San Diego without "Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas!" So grab the kids (and the adults) and go.

Dr. Seuss's How the Grinch Stole Christmas!

In the Old Globe's annual holiday show, Steve Blanchard's Grinch does the near impossible: he wins over the audience twice: first as maybe the world's most entertaining Green Meanie (when he sings "One of a Kind"); second, when Cindy-Lou Who sings "Santa for a Day," and he de-Scrooge's before our eyes. This is the Globe's 16th version, originally conceived and directed by Jack O'Brien. Since 2003, director James Vasquez has kept it as fresh as the original. One of the best parts of the tradition: local actors get a paying gig, and make the most of it. Steve Gunderson heads the supporting cast as Old Max, the Grinch's loyal (and abused) mutt. As Max recalls his youth, Gunderson makes a touching, understated transformation. Worth a try.

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How the Grinch Stole Christmas at the Old Globe

FINDING BIGFOOT. "Hi. I'm Matt Moneymaker. We're here at a Whoville Town Hall meeting. Show of hands: How many've seen a big, brown-haired creature?

Cindy-Loo Who. "Me! Me! Only his hair wasn't brown. It was green, and he could channel Elvis, and John Wayne, and ex-governor-what's-his-enager. And he knew about hashtags, and said 'what up, dawg,' to young Max, and..."

And Steve Blanchard's Grinch manages the near-impossible: he wins over the audience twice.

First, although obviously an off-kilter simian whose heart is "two sizes too small" - and hates Christmas, children, and all things Who - he does self-centered razzmatazz ("One of a Kind") and earns round after round of warm applause.



Then, after ransacking every Christmas present – and ornament – in Whoville, he wins approval once again when Cindy-Loo sings "Santa for a Day." Blanchard drops character and un-Scrooges himself before our eyes.

This is Blanchard's third go-around in the title role. He's found a deft way of being just mean enough to turn a snowdrift green, and yet entertain throughout, as if, deep down, the 53-year-old Grinch is an old vaudevillian hoofer miscast as a meanie.

This is the Old Globe's 16th annual version, conceived and directed by Jack O'Brien (whose memoir, *Jack Be Nimble*, could be a stocking-stuffer for local theater buffs), with music by Mel Marvin (composer of *Yentl* and *Tintypes*) and book and lyrics by Timothy Mason (*Levitation*, *Babylon Gardens*).

Since 2003, director James Vasquez has kept it as fresh as the original.

That's no mean feat. The story's simple, but the staging demands many a kaleidoscopic effect: the pear-shaped Who's – their costumes variations on a candy cane – flow and swirl; as does John Lee Beatty's cartoon-like set, where gigantic scoops of snow (are those walrus tusks dangling from Mt. Crumpit?) must float on and off with a choreography all their own.

One of the best parts of the tradition: San Diego actors get a paid gig.

Geno and Nancy Carr, indefatigable Eileen Bowman, Bets Malone, Kurt Norby, and (possibly setting a record for most musical appearances in a year - make that most successful appearances) Randall Dodge, plus a passel of youngsters getting professional experience —especially seven-year-old Gabriella Dimmick who played Cindy-Lou the night I caught the show (she doubles with Taylor Coleman) and sang the house down.

Jeffrey Schecter scores as Young Max, the Grinch's loyal mutt. And Steve Gunderson plays Old Max, quite effectively, in a different key. *Grinch* is actually a memory play. Old Max returns to the site of recollected fondness. And, Gunderson suggests without forcing the thought, he could use some today.

The original Old Max went for laughs. Gunderson doesn't. He makes a touching, understated transformation almost as sweeping as the Grinch's.

Grinches beware

Grinches among us would have us believe that the <u>Old</u> <u>Globe</u>'s annual "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas" is just for kids. A word to the wise for all aunts, uncles and parents out there—it is for kids, but it also packs an insider wallop or two for the adults.

For instance, when the Green One makes his first foray into Whoville dressed as a Hollywood producer, he surveys the scene, shudders and says, "What a dump!" Rest assured that writer/lyricist Timothy Mason has additional treats in store and that onlookers go home singing Mel Marvin's melodies, which include "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch."

Now in its 16th year, the original production was conceived and directed by Old Globe Artistic Director Emeritus Jack O'Brien, who's just staged the Lincoln Center Theater's "Macbeth" starring Ethan Hawke and featuring Byron Jennings, John Glover and Malcolm Gets as the Wicked Sisters. The reviews were mixed, with most agreeing that the Witches stole the show.

At the Globe, the Grinch's witchiness steals the show. He's everywhere, "One of a Kind," sarcastic and narcissistic, out to steal joy from Whoville until Cindy Lou Who steals his shrunken heart ("Santa for a Day"). He is redeemed and discovers he's a Who too

There was a dyed-in-the-wool skeptic outside the theater before curtain. An auntie crouched eye-level with a little boy, trying to convince him with the biggest spoiler of all time—the Grinch gives gifts to all the Who's at the end of the show, his shriveled heart having grown three sizes. The Kid was unconvinced.

This kid has attended the show every year since its inception, sometimes dragging herself kicking and screaming to Balboa Park, yelling "I Hate Christmas," but always uplifted when the snow begins to fall and all the Who families come down the aisles singing a reprise of "Welcome Christmas."

You know the story penned by the late La Jollan Theodor "Dr.

Seuss" Geisel: Old Max returns to Mt. Crumpet before his retirement and ponders his servitude as Young Max to the Grinch. He introduces the oddly shaped people who live in Whoville. They love Christmas. the Grinch steals their Christmas, gifts, roast beast and Christmas tree, and then discovers Christmas is about more than gift giving.

Since 2003, "The Grinch" has been directed by James Vásquez, whose Globe credits include "Richard O'Brien's The Rocky Horror Show" and whose work is frequently seen at Diversionary Theatre ("Pippin," "She-Rantulas from Outer Space - in 3D!" and "Harmony, Kansas"). Broadway veteran Steve Blanchard returns for his third season as the Grinch. Taylor Coleman of Carmel Valley and Gabriella Dimmick of La Mesa alternate as Cindy-Lou Who. Marking his 11th appearance in "Grinch," Steve Gunderson returns as Old Max, and Broadway performer Jeffrey Schecter debuts as Young Max. Their duet, "This Time of Year," is a highlight of the show. Others in the company are Geno Carr as Papa Who, Bets Malone as Mama Who, Kürt Norby as Grandpa Who, and Eileen Bowman as Grandma Who. Music Director Elan McMahan conducts the nine-piece "Who-Chestra," members of American Federation



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

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

No help required for the big green guy at The Old Globe

The song "One of a Kind" is the best number by far in *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas*, now in its 16th year at The Old Globe Theatre in Balboa Park. Why? Because the only person on stage during it is the Grinch himself (Steve Blanchard, in his third year as the big green guy). Without the cloying inhabitants of Whoville to weigh him down, the Grinch is free in the song to be his snarkiest, grinchiest self, and that's holiday fun for adults, as well as kids.

I caught Blanchard's debut as the Grinch back in 2011, skipped him last year and revisited the show (and him) this past weekend. He's got the physical presence as well as the comic chops required of Dr. Seuss' most famous meanie, and he's still a pleasure to watch in action. And I will say this for the Whoville ensemble—there are some talented folks among them who will be familiar to San Diego theater audiences: Randall Dodge, Eileen Bowman, Bets Malone, Geno Carr and Steve Gunderson, to name a few.

Globe rolls out green carpet for 'Grinch'

Theater announces show's cast, plus autism-friendly performance, tree-lighting event

There's been a flurry of news updates from San Diego's Old Globe Theatre, but we'll start with the scoop on that mean, green dude in the fake Santa getup:

The Globe has just announced the full cast for this year's production of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas" -- and has confirmed that it will offer an "autism-friendly" performance of the holiday favorite once again.

That special performance, which will feature slightly toned-down lighting and sound effects plus plenty of other accommodations for those with autism and their families, is set for 10:30 a.m. Dec. 14. It's an encore of an initiative that proved popular in its Globe debut last year. (The idea was inspired by similar efforts on Broadway, (http://www.tdf.org/autism) sponsored by the Theatre Development Fund.)

Returning in the title role of the family-minded musical (which runs Nov. 16 to Dec. 28) is Steve Blanchard, a veteran of Broadway shows including "Beauty and the Beast." He's joined by such luminaries as Steve Gunderson (making his 11th appearance in the show), Eileen Bowman, Megan Carmitchel, Geno Carr, Nancy Snow Carr, Jacob Caltrider, Randall Dodge and Bets Malone.

Taylor Coleman and Gabriella Dimmick both make their Globe debuts, alternating in the central role of Cindy-Lou Who. And the San Diego-based director James Vasquez once again helms the show, now in its 16th Globe season.

Related to all that: The eighth annual Globe Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony, a perennially popular event, happens at 6 p.m. Nov. 17 on the Copley Plaza outside the theater. Members of the "Grinch" cast will perform amid a holiday "snowfall." The event is free but reservations are required; call (619) 234-5623 or email tickets@theoldglobe.org.

And one more thing: The Globe is reprising its "Santa for a Day" contest, whose young winner not only gets a four-pack of tickets to see the "Grinch" at 4:30 p.m. Nov. 17, but gets to assist the Grinch in lighting the tree after the show.

The official rules, per the Globe: "Children aged 3-12 may create a drawing expressing what the holidays mean to them, and parents may enter it by emailing a photo of it to contest@theoldglobe.org. 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It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas...(ok, ok, in San Diego, it looks just a bit like Christmas as it's still hot and sunny here) and that means the Grinch is on his way! To the Old Globe Theatre, to be precise.

For the 16th year now, Dr. Seuss' *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* is being performed at the Old Globe Theatre in Balboa Park and warms people's hearts in San Diego. For many San Diego families, attending the performance has become a yearly tradition. If you haven't seen it yet, here's what you need to know:

Where: The Old Globe Theatre, located at 1363 Old Globe Way in Balboa Park.

When: The performances of *How the Grinch Stole Christmas* start November 16, 2013, and last until December 28, 2013. Performances happen most days with the exceptions of Mondays and holidays. (Though it will be performed on December 23.) There is an 11 a.m. matinee performance on weekends that is open to children of all ages. During the 7 p.m. evening performance each day, children under the age of three are not permitted. During the week of Christmas, a 2 p.m. performance is sometimes offered instead of a 7 p.m. performance. Check out the performance calendar to find the date and time that works best for you.

Who: Some of San Diego's most accomplished thespians take the stage for *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*. Plus, many children actors fill out the roles of some of the main characters of Whoville, which child attendees will delight in.

Special Performances: On December 14 at 10:30 a.m. a special performance geared toward autistic children and adults will be held. This performance will use less flashing lights and noise to make it a more comfortable experience for attendees with autism.

Tickets: Tickets cost between \$29 to \$66 and can be purchased online.

Sixteen years ago, San Diego received a musical gift for the holidays and it has been reopened this time of year at the <u>Old Globe</u> ever since.

From Nov. 16 – Dec. 28, the stage will again be transformed into a land called Whoville to retell Dr. Seuss' story of How the Grinch Stole Christmas. It was borrowed from the original TV cartoon, then conceived and produced for the stage by then artistic director Jack O'Brien.

According to present artistic director Barry Edelstein, O'Brien figured he had something of great entertainment value after the fifth year but he did make some minor adjustments and added a few lyrics. He even introduced it on Broadway in 1989.

Edelstein's will focus on major decisions while James Vasquez returns to direct the interchanging cast that features 34 Whoville folks. Several youngsters in the ensemble will need to change places during the run.

Steve Blanchard, noted for his Broadway performance in Beauty and the Beast, returns as the green villain who tries to rob Whoville of Christmas.

Edelstein, who came to the Globe a year ago, has been working with the summer Shakespearean plays, an assignment he relishes. Besides having directed in New York, he has lectured and written national articles about the Bard's plays.

But he welcomes overseeing versatile productions.

"Going from Shakespeare to this family production is what makes my job fun," he said. "Actually I saw the Grinch show for the first time last year. Most are familiar with the Grinch classic story that O'Brien started on our stage with the blessing of Dr. Seuss' widow, Audrey Geisel, a longtime La Jolla resident."

He said act changes involve an enormous amount of scenery to depict the snowy village surroundings, represented in the book.

Edelstein said the cast will need about two weeks of rehearsals.

He said there will also be an enormous amount of stage changes to make it look like the drawings from the book. The cast also includes Steve Gunderson, returning as


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



'Tis The Season For Christmas Plays

Globe And Cygnet Theatres Bring Back Holiday Classics

Tis the season for holiday theater fare and two San Diego standards are back. The <u>Globe</u> presents "<u>Dr. Seuss' How The Grinch Stole Christmas</u>" for its 16th year, and <u>Cygnet</u> stages the classic "<u>A Christmas Carol</u>" for the second time.

"Every Who down in Who-ville liked Christmas a lot...But the Grinch who lived just north of Who-ville did not."

Dr. Seuss' classic tale becomes a whimsical musical at the Old Globe about a Grinch whose heart is two sizes too small. But little Cindy Lou Who and the others in Who-ville win the Grinch to their side in this family favorite.

This year, The Globe will offer an autism-friendly performance of Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! on Saturday, December 14. It will be performed in a friendly and supportive environment for children on the autism spectrum and their families. This means fewer loud noises and flashing lights that may be challenging for some audience members. In addition, children attending the performance can make a pre-show visit to the Globe this Sunday to familiarize themselves with the Theatre. Regular performances of the play run through December 28th at the Shiley Stage.

Over at Cygnet Theatre in Old Town, there's another familiar holiday tale taking the stage this weekend, and "A Christmas Carol" is also about the transformative nature of the holidays. Charles Dickens' story about the bitter and miserly Scrooge and his transformation is presented as a live radio play direct from the fictitious broadcast studios of WCYG. One of the attractions is the live <u>foley</u> work to add sound effects to the play.

Globe's autism-friendly 'Grinch' returns

Theater also adds specialized performance of summer's 'Woods'

The Old Globe borrowed a page from Broadway last year – and broke new ground for regional theaters – when it became the first big company outside New York to offer an "autism-friendly" performance of one of its shows.

<u>That performance (http://www.utsandiego.com/news/2012/Dec/15/old-globes-autism-friendly-grinch/)</u> of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!," which for many families provided a rare (and even first-ever) chance to see a play together, proved successful enough that the Globe is presenting an encore this season.

The specialized "Grinch" performance takes place this Saturday (Dec. 14) at 10:30 a.m., and tickets are still available. (For details, call (619) 234-5623 or check out the theater's <u>detailed online information (http://www.theoldglobe.org/education/grinch/grinch_autism.aspx)</u> on the show, including an autism-friendly FAQ and materials to make a "social story" previewing the experience for potential attendees.)

Beyond that, the theater is announcing that this summer it will offer an autism-friendly performance of another family-appropriate musical: "Into the Woods," the Stephen Sondheim-composed fairy-tale riff that was born at the Globe some 27 years ago.

The designated performance of that show will take place Aug. 9.

Globe artistic director Barry Edelstein wasn't in San Diego yet when the initiative launched at the theater last year, but he says it's a consummate example of the kind of community service San Diego's flagship cultural institution should be providing.

"This is a segment of the community that has encountered an obstacle when trying to get to the work at the Globe," he says. "The conventional theatrical presentation isn't suitable for some on the autism spectrum.

"And by making our work more sensory-friendly we're saying, 'OK, here's a part of the community that has not been able to enjoy the work of the Globe. And by taking some very simple steps, we can welcome them into our campus. And that's just so, so important."

Edelstein adds that "I'm actually myself incredibly excited to be here and see it. By all accounts, it's just extraordinarily moving.

"These are families, many of them, who literally have not had the opportunity to go to the theater as a family before. The thing that my wife and I and our son and daughter take completely for granted is something that was just inaccessible to them up until now.

"That the Globe can do that, and make its extraordinary work available to a segment of my city that hasn't been able to enjoy it, is to me just hugely moving and hugely necessary."

In a concrete sense, the autism-friendly approach -- pioneered on Broadway by the Theatre Development Fund -- involves making slight adjustments to technical aspects of the show, including toning down loud noise and flashing lights that can disturb some people on the autism spectrum.

The Globe also is making the theater's lobby a quiet area for those who might need to take a break during the show. And volunteers will be on hand to offer assistance throughout the performance.

Just as important, though, is the welcoming atmosphere that comes with attending a show among families who understand each other's struggles, and are unlikely to be perturbed if someone is more vocal or fidgety or demonstrative than the typical playgoer.

Edelstein says that the "Into the Woods" performance will be a bit of a further experiment, as that show is longer (and has an intermission, unlike "Grinch") and involves more complex musical and storytelling elements.

But, he adds, "I would like to see this become as much a part of our regular programming as it can."

ith apologies to Dr. Seuss (and at this point I probably owe a lot of them): Oh, the places you'll go when you sign up to engage in total doofus-tude before a live audience. □ Also: Oh, the things you'll learn. □ On a recent weeknight, I spent about six minutes testing the Old Globe's hard-earned reputation for theatrical excellence by taking the stage as a walk-on in the beloved production of "Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" □ But my first big teaching moment actually came during a fitting two nights earlier, when I discovered that some costume pieces are sprayed with vodka to help clean and disinfect them.

And my first disappointment? Discovering this does not happen while the performer is *in* the thing.

I could've used a good spritz to get me stageready, although something stronger might've helped; say, a shot of 100-proof, spray-on acting talent.

It turns out that spending one's life watching plays — my lot as the U-T's

theater critic — does not necessarily make one more qualified to be in them.

In fact, while onstage at the Globe, I caught myself laughing over moments that were supposed to amuse only the audience, not us citizens of Whoville.

But that kind of reckoning was the reason for agreeing to this idea in the first place. The intention was not to steal glory from the talented artists I cover (good thing, as that would've been doomed to disaster), but to get a firsthand feel for what it takes to make a show like this happen.

In other words, to step into the "Grinch" team's comically pointy Whoshoes, at least for a night.

As it happened, I got to wear my own shoes for my role as a "WHiPs" officer aka the official Whoville highway patrolman.

He is a curious figure, in that Whoville suffers from a distinct lack of cars. (That, coupled with its ultimately anti-consumerist stance, the preponderance of the color red and the existence of pointless government employees such as myself, deepened my suspicions the place is modeled after a small and unusually whimsical Communist country.)

At any rate, if you've seen "The Grinch" - Theodor "Dr. Seuss" Geisel's story of a furry green malcontent who learns the meaning of the season you know the extravagant costumes (designed by Robert Morgan) are a show all their own.

Mine took in at least 14 pieces, including pink socks, mirror shades, white gloves and spiffy patent-leather spats, plus a jaunty red hat that was the envy of several cast members, including the Grinch himself, Steve Blanchard. (He pilfered it from me briefly.)

The setup also included the "pod" — the mushroom-like structure that gives nearly every Who character that adorably roly-poly appearance.

(Note: If you're ever in the "The Grinch," don't bother asking, "Does this costume make me look fat?," because it's kind of the whole point.)

At my first fitting, Globe resident design associate Charlotte Devaux and tailor Wendy Miller adroitly figured out how to put all those pieces together, with help from a photo of the last person to portray the WHiP, a few years back.

And on performance night, the items were all laid out neatly in Dressing Room 17, a wedge-shaped space thoughtfully marked by a sign with my name on it. (Better there than, say, a dart board.)

On hand was the everpatient wardrobe supervisor Beverly Boyd, enlisted as my dresser (which is kind of like having Christo bag your groceries).

Know this about those bulbous pods: They make it an adventure just to sit down, walk around or even bend over, and Boyd might well be the first person to have tied my shoes for me since I was about the age of the show's heroine, Cindy-Lou Who. (Cindy-Lou was played by Taylor Coleman, a poised and funny 7-yearold, on the night I was there.)

Before donning the pod, though, I was shepherded through a quick run-through of the two scenes I'd be appearing in, courtesy of the unflappable "Grinch" director, James Vásquez, who has headed the production for four of the show's 16 seasons.

The most involved bit required that I nod in unison to the music during the number "It's the Thought

That Counts" (no problem; I'm fully certified in the rock-concert head-bob), as well as make appropriate facial expressions (a little trickier; is a traffic cop supposed to be jolly?).

For the other scene, near the show's climax, I was asked to hit a specific point onstage marked No. 11. Again, no problem, I thought. (Problem.)

One moment during our abbreviated rehearsal seemed to capture perfectly the playful artistry and ready-for-anything spirit of the people behind this show.

When I mentioned I was hoping to carry my notepad onstage (passing it off as the cop's ticket book), Vásquez asked property master David Buess if he could locate a black pen.

About three minutes later, Buess brought one back — nestled inside a handmade, perfectly Seussian, striped wooden stylus with the words "Who Blanc" emblazoned on it. The thing was so freshly made I could still smell the paint on it. (And it still works.)

After finishing the run-through, I was placed in the capable hands of

Not to mention the Broadway-seasoned Blanchard, who frequently tosses fresh catchphrases into the show and gets the kids in the cast repeating them gleefully. The ever-versatile Randall Dodge (another Grown-Up Who), whose stirring baritone was heard over the summer in Moonlight Stage Productions' "South Pacific," was surprised I was permitted to retain my facial hair, leading me to wonder aloud whether I was destined to be shaved onstage. (Cue discussions of a

potential mashup between the Grinch and that demon barber Sweeney Todd.)

And let me just say that I have never been shoved around by a finer actress than Nancy Snow Carr (also a Grown-Up Who), who was tasked with steering me to the missed mark in my final scene. (Unlike the band Spinal Tap, I apparently don't go to 11.)

It's really the kids who make "The Grinch," though, and the young Whos were highly entertaining to watch backstage - pretending to "throw" electronic candle flames to each other, or engaging in a pillow battle with carpenter Christian Thorsen.

They also were fascinated to have an interloper in their midst - and, apparently, a bit skeptical.

"Why does someone need to give traffic tickets here?" one finally asked me.

So, mustering all I had learned, I handled the situation like a seasoned pro.

I wrote them all up for loitering.

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The Grinch is Anything But Mean to Local Actors

Booking a long running show in San Diego seems like an oxymoron. Granted, *The Grinch* comes but once a year, but when it comes, it is a much-needed Christmas bonus to local actors.

Now in its 16th year at The Old Globe Theatre, the cast of *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* reads like a who's-who(ville) of local actors, with many actors including a tally sheet of years logged in Whoville. Here is Steve Gunderson's bio as an example: "Steve Gunderson (Old Max) has previously appeared at the Globe in *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* ('99, '00, '03, '05 and '07-'12)." Mr. Gunderson has an impressive list of other theater and film credits in New York and around the region, but clearly *The Grinch* with its lengthy rehearsal and performance run, is the mainstay of his acting year.

And he's not the only one. The Old Globe's *Grinch* has brought Christmas-time employment to hundreds of actors, musicians, and backstage crew.

According to press rep Mike Hausberg, "While I don't know the exact number of different actors who have appeared in the show over the past 16 years, I'd say it has been about

300, over half of them being local children. Twenty young actresses have played Cindy-Lou Who over the years; the best-known is Vanessa Hudgens, who was the first Cindy-Lou and who went on to "High School Musical" fame. Six

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The show, which runs for six weeks every November and December, is the cornerstone for the holiday season in San Diego's beautiful Balboa Park. The annual Christmas tree lighting in the courtyard of The Old Globe complex attracts a gigantic crowd and serves as the kick off for the season.

The Old Globe has expanded its *Grinch*-y reach, with productions of the show appearing around the country, including a run on Broadway in 2006 and 2007, a National Tour, and a sit-down company in 2009 at The Pantages Theater in Hollywood.

Keeping the show fresh and updated year to year is important to The Old Globe, and the production has changed over the years. According to Hausberg, there have been a few changes made: "The beloved "You're a Mean One, Mr. Grinch," from the classic TV movie version, was added on the sixth anniversary. For the 10th anniversary in 2007, Jack [O'Brien, the original director] and the original creative team gathered for a two-week workshop to enhance and update the production. The show had opened on Broadway the year prior, and they wanted to adopt some new elements so the different productions would resemble each other and create a cohesive Grinch universe:

- 1) Fah Who Doraze," from the TV movie, was added as a recurring theme in the show.
- 2) The Christmas shopping scene had a new song added, "It's the Thought That Counts"
- 3) Some costume updates, including adding Cindy-Lou Who's nightgown
- 4) Some dance restaging."

The Old Globe's commitment to *The Grinch* not only means work for local actors, but a live theater holiday tradition in Balboa Park. For many children in attendance, this was their first live theater experience, with the ushers educating the children to "use the restroom" and "unwrap candy" before the performance started. An usher even ran up the aisle to get a booster chair for a child seated behind a tall adult. The Old Globe's attention to detail and commitment to quality, both onstage and in the audience, will keep *The Grinch* running for many years to come. Which is music to many local actors' ears!

The annual holiday musical will run Nov. 16 - Dec. 28, 2013.

The Grinch is directed by James Vásquez with book and lyrics by Timothy Mason and music by Mel Marvin. The original production of *Dr. Seuss'How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* was conceived and directed by Jack O'Brien with Additional Lyrics by Theodor S. Geisel, Additional Music by Albert Hague and original choreography by John DeLuca.

Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! is a wonderful, whimsical musical based upon the classic Dr. Seuss book. His Off Broadway credits include *Suds: The Rocking '60s Musical Soap Opera, Forever Plaid, Back to Bacharach and David, Butley* and *Street Scene*. Playing Young Max is **Jeffrey Schecter**, who previously appeared at the Globe in the world premiere musical *Robin and the 7 Hoods*. His extensive Broadway credits include *Nice Work If You Can Get It, Anything Goes, A Chorus Line* and *The Pajama Game* among others.

Slight adjustments will be made to the production including fewer loud noises and flashing lights that may be challenging for some audience members. Additional features will also help make the experience safer and more enjoyable for children with autism and other sensitivity issues, including a pre-show visit to the Globe to familiarize children with the theatre; an online social story available to view and print at home that will outline in words and pictures the experience of a visit to the Globe; a quiet area in the lobby of the theatre; and on-site volunteers to assist families as needed. Theatre Development Fund's (TDF) Autism Theatre Initiative serves as an advisor for The Old Globe's autism-friendly *Grinch* performance (www.tdf.org/autism).

His extensive television and film credits include "Law & Order," "Third Watch," "Cupid," "Ed," *Those Who Wander, Dark Vengeance, Savva* and *Rap Master Ronnie: A Report Card* for HBO. He can be heard on the original recordings of *Johnny Guitar, Sundown, Frankenstein* and *Northbound Train.*

James Vásquez has recreated the original musical staging of *Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* since 2003. At the Globe, he directed *Richard O'Brien's The Rocky Horror Show*, served as Associate Director of *Jane Austen's Emma – A Musical Romantic Comedy* and provided musical staging for *Boeing-Boeing* and last summer's Shakespeare Festival production of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. He received San Diego Theatre Critics Circle Award nominations for Outstanding Direction of a Musical for the world premiere of *Harmony, Kansas* and the West Coast premiere of *[title of show]* (Diversionary Theatre) and won the award in 2010 for *Sweeney Todd* (Cygnet Theatre Company). His other recent directing/choreography credits include the workshop of *Harmony, Kansas* (Goodspeed Musicals), *Marry Me a Little, Birds of a Feather, Pippin* and *Next Fall* (Diversionary), *Hedwig and the Angry Inch* and *Little Shop of Horrors* (Cygnet) and *Into the Woods* (New Village Arts). In 2004, Vásquez founded Daisy 3 Pictures with Mark Holmes and Carrie Preston. Their first two feature films, *29th and Gay* (TLA Releasing, Here TV) and *Ready? OK!*(Wolfe Video, LOGO), have played national and international film festivals, with *Ready? OK!* winning Best Feature Film awards in Seattle, North Carolina and San Diego. Their latest feature film, *That's What She Said*, starring Anne Heche, made its world premiere at the 2012 Sundance Film Festival.

Those who prefer their "Christmas Carol" straight up should know that a traditional telling of Charles Dickens' work opened December 7 at Cygnet's Theatre in Old Town, where it continues through December 24. This provides extreme contrast to the in-drag sendup, "Scrooge in Rouge" (through December 29 at Diversionary Theatre).

You may take the nieces and nephews and others to this "WCGY Playhouse of the Air Presents A Christmas Carol," adapted and directed by Cygnet's Artistic Director Sean Murray with an original score by Billy Thompson. In its second year of production, the "radio play," in which the audience becomes a studio audience in 1944 Manhattan, is more musical and affecting than before.

Composer Thompson interweaves the Murray-adapted text with carols, and Murray writes new, fetching lyrics appropriate to the familiar story and characters.

Once again, extraordinary San Diego actor Tom Stephenson, who's played the role numerous times thither and yon, portrays the emotionally shriveled Scrooge, whose miserly

life is

punctuated by nastiness and bowls of thin gruel, that is, until he is visited by the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Future. Stephenson's newly conceived performance is differently imbued, exacting and replete with subtle hints that even at the worst of times, and even before he's reminded of it, Scrooge has known, and has been a better man. Stephenson's mumbled, almost trancelike voyager gives way to redemption in exceptionally joyous fashion. The production is rife with humor and good will.

A trio forged in heaven last year, Maggie Carney, Melissa Fernandes and Melinda Gilb are even funnier, more versatile and crisp as they morph from radio personalities into scenes where they portray Scrooge's young love, his sister, his sister-in-law, his housekeeper, Ghost(s) of Christmas Past, and even Tiny Tim. They sing together divinely and, in memory's eye, seem to have been attired in Victorian costumes rather than the 1944 peplums and seamed hose they actually wear. Patrick McBride, who made his Cygnet debut as James Joyce in "Travesties," at first seems bland in his radio-

> each of his characters expertly - Bob Cratchit, Scrooge's nephew Fred and Marley. With his mellif-

luous singing and speaking voices, the exceptionally musical David McBean is the force

that forges the ensemble singing. Sean LaPerruque portrays Stanley Church, the radio studio pianist. Brian Mackey is the sound effects guy, and Jonathan Dunn-Rankin, the announcer and narrator of the familiar tale.

Murray has tightened the script, and the production clocks in at 90 minutes including intermission. Shirley Pierson is costume designer; R. Craig Wolf, lighting designer; Matt Lescault-Wood, sound designer; Peter Herman, the wig and make up designer; and Angelica Ynfante, the props designer,

One of the funniest lines on opening night was unscripted and delivered by Maggie Carney. In her radio show performer persona, she was warming up the audience during the preshow, when she suddenly turned and saw Murray at her elbow, dressed in his 2013 Christmas sweater and about to deliver pre-show announcements regarding cellphones and exits. Carney surveyed the director, took a step back, and asked, "Are you from the future?" Murray, surprised for only a moment, said, "Yes, I guess I am from the future."

A Londoner who was raised in straitened circumstances, Charles Dickens (1812-1870) wrote "A Christmas Carol - a Ghost Story of Christmas" in 1843. An immediate success, the book was dramatized almost immediately. Scrooge has become synonymous with greed, avarice and tightfistedness, and has informed many other literary characters, including Dr. Seuss's Grinch, whose show, currently in its 16th year, holds sway at The Old Globe.
