# ACTING, LANGUAGE FINE, BUT CLINICAL FIRST ACT DOESN'T 'MEASURE' UP

Old Globe/USD take on Shakespeare's comic morality play a bit short on theatrics

William Shakespeare's play "Measure for Measure" is classified as a comedy. but its sharp wit cuts with a knife's edge, and its laughs are more the "aha" variety than the "ha-ha."


So it seems fitting that the comic morality tale is being presented in a pareddown, drawing-room style in the Old Globe's Sheryl and Harvey White Arena Stage this month.

Staged by director Ray Chambers as a sort of human chess match on a marble checkerboard stage, the Old Globe/University of San Diego Graduate Theatre Program production strips away theatrical artifice to put a laser focus on the Bard's words and his richly ambiguous characters. The

results are mixed. The language is clear and the acting precise, but the production occasionally feels dry and clinical, especially in the opening act.

Shakespeare set "Measure" in Vienna, and Chambers has moved the time forward (or so it appears from Elisa Benzoni's lavish costumes) to the 1700s - a time of Viennese cultural enlightenment and great political upheaval.

The weak-willed Duke Vincentio (an engaging Christopher Salazar) decides to leave his palace to secretly mingle among his fellow citizens dressed as a friar. In his absence, Vincentio's power-hungry deputy Angelo (a taciturn Matthew Bellows) cracks down on long-rampant crime, shuttering brothels

Claudio has impregnated his fiancee and is sentenced to death by Angelo. To save her brother, Claudio's novice sister Isabella (a strong and unforgiving Whitney Wakimoto) leaves the novitiate to beg Angelo for clemency. But Angelo will only agree to save Claudio

in exchange for her virginity. To protect Isabella, the disguised Vincentio tricks Angelo into a sexual encounter with a woman Angelo believes is Isabella (but she is actually Angelo's discarded fiancee). All is ultimately set right when Vincentio reveals himself and the couples are "sentenced" to matrimony.

tion, Isabella is more puritanical warrior than fragile virgin, and she's more suited in style, morality and dress to the black-clad Angelo than the kindly and smitten Vincentio. There's a nice play of contrasts between Isabella's severe simplicity and the faux foppery of other women onstage (high powdered wigs, rouge, corsets and exaggerated panniers skirts). Also a plus is Jeremy Fisher's lively performance as the clown Lucio as a self-absorbed dandy.

But what's missing in the talky, occasionally static production is a sense of danger or depravity. Angelo is like an 18th century Taliban morality cop, meting out dire punishment for a society he sees in sharp decay. But the threat of civic collapse, Isabella's rape or Claudio's death come across as more theoretical than literal.

# THEATER REVIEW: Check out "Measure For Measure," Old Globe's show with USD actors

The nature of justice in civic affairs and honor and integrity in personal contexts are under consideration in Shakespeare's disquieting "Measure For Measure," playing through Nov. 18 in the Old Globe's Sheryl and Harvey White Theatre.

Part of the Globe's partnership with USD, this production features student actors directed by Ray Chambers.

Never shy about borrowing sources, Shakespeare seems to have combined the plots of three ancient folktales here: "The Corrupt Magistrate," "The Disguised Ruler" and "The Substituted Bedmate."

Considered one of the Bard's "problem plays," this offers a bleak view of mankind without a Shakespearean tragic figure to purge it. Instead, we are left to consider our own lives, actions and honor.

The plot, set in 16th-century Vienna, has the kindly Duke Vincentio

(Christopher Salazar), dispirited by what he sees as rampant licentiousness among his people, temporarily handing over power to his straight-arrow friend Angelo (Matthew Bellows). He leaves

venerable old counselor Escalus (here played by the young, pretty and most excellent Danielle O'Farrell) to advise Angelo.

Angelo begins by condemning Claudio (Adam Gerber) to death for impregnating his fiancee, despite the fact that this is a love match and marriage is the intention of both parties. (That Angelo committed the same infraction will become known later.)

When Claudio's sister, the novice nun Isabella (Whitney Wakimoto), pleads for her brother's life, Angelo offers the "Tosca" solution: a tryst in exchange for Claudio's life. What's worse, when she reports this to Claudio, he counsels her to agree. Sometimes, Shakespeare suggests, virtue can be a vice.

Unknown to all, the Duke hasn't gone anywhere: he's been walking around town disguised as a friar, and is not cheered by what he has seen. He has, however, been both amused and annoyed by the fop Lucio (a hilarious Jeremy Fisher), who gets trapped in his own lies.

Other comic relief is offered by professional drunk Barnardine and the word-challenged Constable Elbow (both wonderfully played by Kushtrim Hoxha) and by bawd Pompey (a funny Sean-Michael Wilkinson).

Stephen Hu does a fine turn as the duke's Provost, as do Meghan Boeing and Erin Elizabeth Adams as Mistress Overdone and Claudio's intended Juliet.

Gerber does a fine turn as the condemned Claudio. Wakimoto is excellent as Isabella; Salazar credible as the Duke-turned-friar.

Bellows has good stage presence as Angelo, but has a tendency to rush his lines.

Kudos also to the design team: Sean Fanning for his versatile set design; Chris Rynne and Kevin Anthenill for their fine lighting and sound designs, and most especially to Eliza Benzoni for her beautiful costumes.

In the end, the duke concocts a ruse to save Claudio and ensnare Angelo without besmirching Isabella's virtue. Even Angelo's rejected girlfriend Mariana (Stephanie Roetzel) will get what she wants.

But we're left to contemplate what happened to those human virtues honor and integrity.

The balance between justice and mercy, repentance, forgiveness, self-righteousness, and hypocrisy are themes laid bare in Shakespeare's "Measure for Measure," a commentary on the Puritanical movement of Seventeenth Century England playing at the Sheryl and Harvey White Theatre at the Old Globe in Balboa Park.

Known for walking the line between comedy and drama, "Measure for Measure" is part of a trio of works which became known as the "problem plays" around the mid-1890s. Previously thought unapproachable compared to Shakespeare's more traditional works which clearly fall into three established styles, the plays experienced a renaissance thanks to the growing influence of playwrights like Henrik Ibsen who, at the time, were creating works of theatre that put forth a message addressing some of the more contemporary problems facing society.

With a renewed interest and lens with which to explore these works, the problem plays gained new life and are often the focus of attention for theatre students learning Shakespearean poetry and prose.

Staged in conjunction with the University of San Diego's Graduate Theatre Program, San Diego's newest rendition is an honest, albeit flat, attempt to bring this story of judicial balance to life.

Duke Vincentio (Christopher Salazar), the Duke of Vienna, decides to take respite from his duties and leaves the moralistic Angelo (Matthew Bellows) in charge while he is away. Angelo believes that the Duke has been lax in his rule and, in his absence, decides to clean up the amoral activities he sees happening with more regularity.

He quickly arrests a man named Claudio (Adam Gerber). Accused of impregnating his fiancée before

their wedding vows were exchanged, he is immediately sentenced to death as an example to others who may also wish to engage in some unscrupulous behavior.

Jeremy Fisher's Lucio, a character connected to all of the seedy creatures in the underbelly of Vienna, provides a great deal of the comic relief and delivers with precision.

When his sister Isabella (Whitney Wakimoto), a soon-to-be nun, learns of her brother's fate, she sets off in a quest to save his life. She pleads with Angelo to spare her sibling to which he reluctantly agrees with condition. Attracted to her purity, innocence and chastity, Angelo promises to let Claudio go if Isabella agrees to sleep with him. Caught in a web of scruples and hypocrisy, Isabella must find a way to retain her virtue while sparing her dear brother's life.

In a production that muddles comedy and drama, directors often try to create stark contrast between the two in order to accentuate the humor and deepen the drama. In this particular staging it seemed that director Ray Chambers tried drawing too much contrast. The dramatic lines at times seemed tedious, bordering on monotonous. In one scene Isabella is seen pleading for her own brother's life but it lacked emotion and thus believability.

There are moments when each of the actors shines. Bellows plays a wonderfully despicable heavy while Wakimoto lends a sense of innocence and balance. Jeremy Fisher's Lucio, a character connected to all of the seedy creatures in the

underbelly of Vienna, provides a great deal of the comic relief and delivers with precision. Especially delightful are the moments he unwittingly slams the Duke unbeknownst to him that the Duke is in disguise and taking the brunt of his insults.

Not to be forgotten is Elisa Benzoni's superb, and detailed, costuming. I'm not the type of man to notice shoes but no element was ignored right down to a matching pair of bright aqua or seafoam green heels. Though they were covered by yards of fabric and hardly noticeable, that attention to detail creates a more polished and professional feel. In a production that is trying so hard to create dichotomy, no aspect of this production hit its target closer than the costuming.

Another mention must be made of Sean Fanning's scenic design. Simplistic but not understated and mirroring some of the dichotomous themes of the show, Fanning made this production in the round accessible and functional.

Balance really is the key word for this latest rendition of Shakespeare's "Measure for Measure." Though there is some room for improvement in this staging, there are some moments of brilliance as well and those moments can make an audience very forgiving.

Sean Fanning's clean set design and the way he laid its playing area out - convenient to the voms - allows for rapid ingress and egress, and director Ray Chambers' concentration on the court scenes as opposed to flying off to the Mistress Overdone's brothel, make for a speedy evening that lasts only two and a half hours. Unfortunately, the pace does not support clear diction of young actors working in the round and much text is lost.

Be that as it may, they are handsome and do handsome work. Whitney Wakimoto portrays Isabella and Adam Gerber her condemned brother Claudio, who has runs up against strict morality codes enforced by Angelo (Matthew Bellows), whom the Duke (Christopher Salazar) leaves in charge while he spies on his own citizens, disguised as Father Lodovico. It's a bit distracting to have Danielle O'Farrell portray Escalus, especially in female guise clad in a ravishingly emphatic gown designed by Elisa Benzoni. Send feedback

friend of mine, a novelist, told me he wants to create a character like Humpty Dumpty, with so many sides and contradictions you can't glue him back together. Or, in doing so, you'd have to finesse nagging details that don't jibe.

"Oh," I replied, "you mean like Shakespeare's Measure for Measure?"

Over the years, critics have disagreed so vehemently about this "comedy," it would be easier to reassemble Humpty Dumpty than find common ground. Samuel Taylor Coleridge said, "The comic and tragic parts equally border on the hateful." A.W. Schlegel, another biggie, appreciated "the triumph of mercy over strict justice." In our day, Harold Bloom calls it "authentically outrageous," since it pushes comedy "beyond all possible limits...almost past irony at its most savage."

The Duke has ruled Vienna 19 years. Actually, "ruled" is a misnomer. He favored license over law. Brothels and diseases abound, and children are born out of wedlock. "T'was my fault to give the people scope," he confesses. But to make a sudden change would be "tyranny." So, to rebalance things, he goes on hiatus. He asks young Angelo, who admits he isn't ready, to be his proxy. If the Duke favored frolic, Angelo would flourish at the

Inquisition. He's supposedly a saint, "whose blood is very snow-broth," and "when he makes water, his urine is congealed ice."

Were the Duke to continue, the population of Vienna would double in no time. Were Angelo to have his way, fornication would cease: he "will

> unpeople the province with continency." Angelo's first act is to demolish all houses of ill-repute in the suburbs (which was happen-

ing in London when Shakespeare wrote the play around 1603–'04). His second: enforce a musty old law against lechery. Young Claudio must die for impregnating Juliet, even though they are betrothed (and legal lovers). And, since Angelo wants to set an abrupt example of his stern new policy, Claudio must die soon.

But does the penalty fit the crime? Does it offer a straight across, measure for measure? The play unfolds like tilting scales of justice, or a teetertotter, where one side's always higher than the other. And at the puzzling conclusion, which scatters most critics like autumn leaves in a Santa Ana, the teeter still totters.

When we first see Isabella, Claudio's sister, she wants to become a nun. But she's worried that the order she chose might not be strict enough. When we last see Isabella, she's run a gauntlet through

the smarmy, sex-crazed world she rejected at the beginning: a "saint" (named "Angel" no less) tried to seduce her to save her brother; her brother urged her to have sex with Angelo ("What sin you do to save a brother's life, nature dispenses with the deed so far that it becomes a virtue"); and a Duke disguised as a friar, manipulated lives and deaths, ordered three hopelessly mismatched marriages,





By play's end, Hirsch's Isabella was ready either for a nunnery — the religious kind — or a nuthouse.

For the USD/Old Globe Theatre's production, which closed last Sunday, director Ray Chambers smartly left Isabella onstage at the end, stuffed with confusion. As lights dimmed, you could almost see *Measure for Measure* spin like a Rolodex in Whitney Wakimoto's eyes. She was split, as Isabella says earlier, "twixt will and will not."

Up to this point, the production favored "will." Led by Jeremy Fisher's goofy Lucio, in

a candy-stripe coat, the comic spirit held sway. Actors performed in a straightforward, post-Freudian style (which made Matthew Bellows's Angelo too bland, and his comingout scene with Isabella - the sudden thaw of his repressed sexuality — a letdown). Christopher Salazar's Duke was a well-intended gent. If he erred, or seemed over-controlling, he meant well (and was wellspoken). Two actors gave the piece deeper tones. Adam Gerber's imprisoned Claudio had an eloquent grief, and Danielle O'Farrell's Escalus a pointed ferocity.

So many of the play's characters feel at least two-sided, and flit from the one to the other. To complicate Escalus, costume designer Elisa Benzoni decked her in a mid-17th-century dress with battleship-sized panniers. No matter what O'Farrell said, trying to move about in a costume as wide below the waist as she is tall, was comical.

From the start, Sean Fanning's set suggested darker matters. A marble, checkerboard floor and low walls had edges so sharp you feared for the actors' shins. Chris Rynne's moody lighting draped various hues across the stone.

Were one to have polled the audience at intermission, a majority would have said they were watching another *Twelfth Night* or *As You Like It.* All problems looked surmountable. At the end, however, Isabella's perplexity turned the entire play upside-down. And all the Duke's horses and all of his men, well...

"Oh," I replied, "you mean like Shakespeare's Measure for Measure?"

Over the years, critics have disagreed so vehemently about this "comedy," it would be easier to reassemble Humpty Dumpty than find common ground. Samuel Taylor Coleridge said, "The comic and tragic parts equally border on the hateful." A.W. Schlegel, another biggie, appreciated "the triumph of mercy over strict justice." In our day, Harold Bloom calls it "authentically outrageous," since it pushes comedy "beyond all possible limits...almost past irony at its most savage."


The festival includes entries from several countries, as well as films produced or directed by women and African-Americans.


Christopher Salazar, who plays Duke Vincentio, said the confusing script centers on a Duke who rules with the knowledge that his country has fallen into disrepair.
