

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Twelfth Night at White Theatre

In Merry Olde England, Twelfth Night was a last call for holiday cheer. After the 12 days of Christmas, the evening of January 5 was a one-night Mardi Gras: wine and sherry would flow; food got gobbled, and life went topsy-turvy. Come the morning, order would return.

Shakespeare's comedy (1602) extends the occasion for several days. Everyone in Illyria is stuck, almost statue-like, in fact. Duke Orsino swoons unrequited love for Olivia; she promises to grieve seven years for her deceased brother; Sir Toby Belch and the hearty party crowd are on a collision course with pickled livers.

Enter Viola and Sebatian, shipwrecked twins from Messaline (Illyria was on the Balkan Peninsula, across from Italy; Shakespeare invented Messaline). Disguised as Cesario, a young man, Viola almost literally resuscitates the country. At play's end, lovers are paired off (correctly, one must assume) and order restored, though the Puritanical control freak Malvolio dampens proceedings with a vow to avenge himself on everyone.

Though this weekend, the Old Globe/USD Graduate Theatre Program is offering a lively, well-spoken *Twelfth Night*. Director Richard Seer and costume designer Michelle Hunt Souza have reset the play in India during the Raj. Thus Feste (a terrific Jesse Jensen) is a dervish-like Hindu fakir. Duke Orsino (Christopher Salazar) is a consul and Olivia a veiled Brahmin, at least until she locks her eyes onto Cesario. And the twins (Jeremy Fisher's Sebastian and Allison Spratt Pearce's wonderfully perplexed Viola) dress in British beige.

Adam Daveline leads the revelers as Sir Toby, who slurps Bombay gin like water Sean-Michael Wilkinson, as Aguecheek, and Rachel Jenison, as scheming Maria, keep the comedy rolling (and toke hookahs in the big party scene).

Jonathan Spivey does a fine job as Malvolio, the much-abused abuser. The more serious he becomes, the funnier he is. I like what Marjorie Garber said of him: in effect, has Malviolio been "born great," he would have been a great tyrant.

George Ye's fight choreography merits special mention. He has not only staged realistic sword fights but, when horrified Cesario squares off against a trembling Sir Andrew, a hilarious one as well.

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A quick note about the USD MFA program, which Seer directs: It's extremely selective, with only seven students admitted each year (a rate

of some 2 percent). And each summer, every one of those students is pressed into extensive service in the Globe's annual Summer Shakespeare Festival.

So this "Twelfth Night" is a chance for an early look at some of the actors who'll help carry the sprawling, three-play festival come summer.

Actually, a fair number of the students already were seen in last summer's fest, and two — Allison Spratt Pearce and Adam Daveline — also had prime roles in last winter's major Globe musical "Jane Austen's Emma — A Musical Romantic Comedy."

Both of the latter make splashes here, too. Pearce brings a cool savvy to the part of Viola, a castaway on the shores of mysterious Illyria who believes her beloved brother, Sebastian, has drowned. Daveline is a Dionysian riot as the defiantly uncouth Sir Toby Belch, part of the Illyrian soap opera Viola stumbles into when she poses as a manservant named Cesario.

Viola falls for her new boss, the dashing Duke Orsino (a winningly suave Christopher Salazar), while Olivia (Deborah Radloff), the duke's would-be squeeze, starts crushing on Cesario (aka Viola). Meantime, Sir Toby, Maria (Rachael Jenison), Fabian (Danielle O'Farrell), the jester Feste (dreadlocked and deadly amusing Jesse Jensen, who's like a comic shaman) and the fashion-plate fop Sir Andrew Aguecheek (quick-witted Sean-Michael Wilkinson) plot against Olivia's priggish steward Malvolio.

That one's a famously rich role (Patrick Page absolutely chewed it up when the Globe did a Mediterranean-themed version two summers ago), and Jonathan Spivey makes it his own with every agonized laugh, as Malvolio is tricked into thinking Olivia craves him.

The production leaves some questions hanging about the power politics of its setting, and Viola and Sebastian (Jeremy Fisher) look about as much alike here as Amelia Earhart and Woodrow Wilson. But Seer and his team (particularly costumer Michelle Hunt Souza, sound designer Kevin Anthenill and fight-choreography ace George Yé) bring a beautiful sense of mood and sensuality to the romantic story. They do right by the Bard (no matter who you think that might be).

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

This 'Twelfth Night' is a fool's paradise

Old Globe gets Shakespeare's great comedy right—plus, the rest of the plays in local production

The mischievous trio of 0 Twelfth Night (Sir Toby Belch, Sir Andrew Aguecheek and Feste the fool) and their intended 0 foil, the foppish Malvolio, provide the laughs and the substance of the **Share** comedy Shakespeare wrote as a Christmasseason denouement. Substance? Sir Toby loudly acting out his last name? Sir Andrew conking himself in the forehead during a reluctant sword fight? But these sight gags, crowned by the duped Malvolio prancing on the stage in crossgartered yellow stockings, are all the substance that Twelfth Night

requires. That's what makes it among the best, if not the best, of all Shakespearean comedies.

Never mind the "main story" of mistaken identity, courtly types looking for love and a brother and sister separated by a shipwreck.

The weeklong production, a joint effort by the Old Globe and the University of San Diego's Graduate Theatre Program directed by Richard Seer, gets it right. Adam Daveline's bellowing Sir Toby, Jesse Jensen's dreadlocked Feste the fool and Sean- Michael Wilkinson's cheeky Sir Andrew hold chaotic court in the Sheryl and Harvey White theater-in-the-round. Part Marx Brothers, part Monty Python, they quip and prattle and pratfall their way on the periphery of the more serious-minded characters.

All the scampering on and off the small stage ramps up the pace of the production, which still runs well over two hours. An updated setting places Shakespeare's games players in the British-governed India of the 1920s, and Michelle Hunt Souza's costumes— think saris and pith helmets—do the period justice.

A casting quibble: Jeremy Fisher's (Sebastian) significant height advantage over "twin" Allison Spratt Pearce's Viola makes it hard to believe their identities could be mistaken, even by the gullible Olivia (Deborah Radloff). Love must be nearsighted, if not blind.

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

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
Old Globe/University of San Diego Graduate Theatre **Program presents Twelfth Night**

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Can the themes of honor, betrayal and romance all compete for the plot in a comedic play?

Yes! When it's William Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," running through Nov. 13 in the Old Globe's Sheryl and Harvey White Theatre. The play is directed by Richard Seer, and is a co-production of The Old Globe/University of San Diego Graduate Theatre Program.

Seer, an award-winning director and actor, has been the director of the program since 1993. He received his M.F.A. in directing from Boston University, where he was awarded the prestigious Kahn Directing Award in 1985. Seer has directed or appeared in more than 70 productions at regional theaters in this country and Great Britain.

He originated the role of Young Charlie in the 1978 Tony Award-winning Broadway production of Hugh Leonard's "Da" and received the Theatre World Award for his performance. Plays included in his direction at the Globe are "Life of Riley," "The Last Romance," "The Price," "Romeo and Juliet," "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" "Trying," "Fiction," "Blue/Orange," "All My Sons," "Da," and "Old Wicked Songs."

When choosing a project for the program, Seer said he likes to mix the genres up.

"I like to do a comedy when I've just done a drama, etc. I chose 'Twelfth Night' for this production because we try to select plays that are not in competition with what The Globe is presenting. Also, I consider this one of Shakespeare's best plays," he said.

The comedy is about a shipwreck on the rocky coast of India where Viola (Allison Spratt Pearce) disguises herself as a man to be safe and find a job. She ends up as a page in the court working and falling for Duke Orsino (Christopher Salazar). He, however, has his sights on the beautiful Olivia (Deborah Radloff), who in turn becomes infatuated with the new man in court who is really Viola in disguise.

If that's not enough amusement, there are plenty of laughs when servant Malvolio (Jonathan Spivey) gets tricked by Maria (Rachael Jenison) and Sir Toby Belch (Adam Daveline). This all causes delicious havoc throughout the house.

Seer is very familiar with the play; he's acted in it several times and directed it twice. But he had his own take on this version that the students perform. A fan of David Lean's films ("Bridge on the River Kwai," "Lawrence of Arabia") Seer said he really liked "A Passage to India."

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"In re-reading 'Twelfth Night,' I thought, what a great place to set this play, in India during the rein of the British in the 1920s," he said. "It presented all kinds of fun since we have both British and Indian characters, and it's actually kind of sexy. There are — what was presumed back then as — the uptight Brits meeting face to face with a country that embraces the Kama Sutra and has a more sensual feel to it. This is very right for what happens in 'Twelfth Night.'"

With a youthful cast and tickets at reasonable prices, Seer believes it's a great time to get younger family members interested in live theatre. Seer explained the cast is professional and many performed with the summer repertory company that has become The Globe's junior company. He auditions hundreds of students interested in classical work from around the country for the program, but takes only about seven a year.

"This is their opportunity to come to the Globe and play the leads," Seer said, "and the Globe audience will recognize a lot of these actors from the outdoor stages. I also think this is a very funny play and the audience will have fun with it and the subplot, but also the sweetness of the romance. Especially with a young cast who are all the right ages for those characters."



When Richard Seer was thinking about how to direct his upcoming production of "Twelfth Night" at The Old Globe, images from David Lean's 1984 movie "A Passage to India" kept popping into his head.

The epic film adaptation of E.M Forster's 1924 novel was rich with the sights, sounds and class struggles of India during the British Raj era, and Seer thought it would fit perfectly for his Old Globe-University of San Diego MFA student production of William Shakespeare's romantic comedy.

"I'm a big fan of David Lean as a filmmaker, and 'A Passage to India' is about the coming of age of a young Englishwoman arriving in India to get married and becoming enmeshed in the sensuality of India," Seer said. "That seemed to have a lot of parallels with the 'Twelfth Night' story. I was intrigued with the idea of people falling in love with the mystique of foreign lands."

"Twelfth Night" is the story of noble twins Viola and Sebastian who are separated in a shipwreck and cast ashore on the rocky coast of Illyria, each presuming the other dead. Viola disguises herself as a young man and finds work as a page in the court of the lovesick Duke Orsino. Viola falls secretly in love with Orsino, who enlists her to carry love letters to the noblewoman Olivia (Olivia, in turn, falls for Orsino's young page). Meanwhile, Sebastian finds companionship with a group of sailors and is surprised when he first meets Olivia (who mistakes him for Orsino's page, actually his twin in disguise). And Orsino finds himself strangely attracted to his boy page.

In Seer's in-the-round production, Duke Orsino is a British consul in 1920 India, a time when Western women were just beginning to enjoy the freedoms associated with emancipation.

"I loved the mix of cultures we could play with," said Seer, who directs the Globe-USD MFA program. "During the British Raj, we've got the occupation and influence of Britain impacting the mostly Indian characters in the play. Viola and Sebastian are embarking into a strange new land of class and culture and Orsino is falling in love with the sensuality of India."

Just as the characters in Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" were clearly separated by class distinction, Seer's production will separate these characters by India's caste system. Orsino, Olivia, Viola and Sebastian are among the Brahmin wealthy class, while Feste, the play's wise fool, is a Hindu holy man.

Although none of Seer's 13-member cast is of Indian heritage, he said their ethnicity will be suggested by costume. A score of traditional music written for Shakespeare's plays in the 19th century is being redone with Indian orchestrations and using traditional instruments. There will also be some Indian-style dancing.

"When you choose a concept, especially a different period or place, it opens the door for all kinds of invention," Seer said. "We've got a cast member who's a Buddhist who's done a lot of research, we've got two dramaturges on the project who've done research, and the cast members adore it and they've brought in a lot of ideas."





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

Angels in America: A GAY FANTASIA ON NATIONAL THEMES A TWO-PLAY SPECIAL EVENT

The Ion Theatre has taken on the impressive task of reviving the two-part, Pulitzer Prize-winning epic about the AIDS crises which is set in 1985 New York City. In the first of the two-part play, Millennium Approaches, we are introduced to Louis Ironson and his lover Prior Walters, who is sick with AIDS. Louis is unable to cope with Prior's disease progression and abandons him leaving him to his own devices. Next we meet Joe, a deeply closeted Mormon who is being pushed to move up in his uberconservative job by his hypocritical, McCarthyist boss Roy Cohn who is himself sick with AIDS (although his closet is even deeper). Joe is married to Valium-addicted Harper, an agoraphobe who consequently is completely unwilling to move. As the play progresses, Prior's health deteriorates and he begins to have visitations by ghosts and an angel who proclaims him to be a prophet. Joe's Mormon mother comes to New York to rescue her son's marriage, and Roy Cohn is forced to check into the hospital. Perestroika, the second play carries us forward, as Prior finally confronts his mystic visions. Roy Cohn desperately tries to manipulate the health system to his benefit—all the while haunted by one of $his \, victims. \, And \, Harper \, attempts \, to \, regain \, control \, of \, her$ life. The interplay of the cast and the relationships they share are beautifully rendered in this ground breaking show, which confronted the AIDS crisis and questions of morality, community, guilt and forgiveness.

November is the month of Thanksgiving, and arts aficionados can be thankful for a cornucopia of theatrical and musical events taking place throughout the county all month long. Dance lovers can enjoy City Ballet's homage to the Russian masters, and the small-fry set will welcome the return of Dr. Seuss' "Grinch."

The Old Globe's funny and fast-paced production of Richard O'Brien's "Rocky Horror Show" will complete its run on the Main Stage Nov. 6. If you miss the final performances of this musical phenomenon, don't make

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the same mistake with the world premiere of the new Burt Bacharach musical, "Some Lovers." The show (with book and lyrics by multi-award winner Steven Sater) is headed for the Globe's White Theatre Nov. 26. Based on the classic O. Henry short story, "The Gift of the Magi," "Some Lovers" will continue to enchant audiences through Dec. 31.

The youngsters can start celebrating the holiday season Nov. 19, when the Globe's Main Stage is transformed into Whoville for the 14th annual staging of Dr. Seuss' beloved tale, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas!" This delightful musical will light up the stage through New Year's Eve, and the entire Old Globe complex will be decorated in keeping with the show's zany holiday theme. The annual Tree Lighting Ceremony will be Nov. 20 on the plaza, and it will feature live entertainment from the "Grinch" gang.

The Old Globe's Graduate Program will strut its stuff at the White Theatre Nov. 6-13, with a production of the Bard's "Twelfth Night."

The La Jolla Playhouse is bringing a very special revival of Andrew Lloyd Webber's masterpiece, "Jesus Christ Superstar," to town Nov. 18. This second coming of "Superstar" was directed by the Playhouse's former superstar, Des McAnuff, who created his vision of the rock musical in Canada. San Diegans will be able to experience this stunning and widely acclaimed production through Dec. 31. It sounds like a must-see.

The San Diego Symphony is in high gear this month, starting with "Liszt's Piano Concertos," coming to Symphony Hall Nov. 4-6. Jahja Ling will conduct the program, with pianist Stephen Hough performing Liszt's Piano Concertos No. 1 and 2. "Mahler's Ninth" is next on the slate, with Maestro Ling conducting the composer's magnificent Ninth Symphony Nov. 11-13.

The Symphony's Chamber Music Series will feature The Perlman/Quint/Bailey Trio Nov. 8. The threesome will perform works by Haydn and Shostakovich, along with members of the orchestra. "Compania Flamenco Jose Porcel" will perform their fiery Flamenco dance, music and vocals Nov. 20.

The San Diego Repertory Theatre will present a rollicking musical set in a Florida trailer park Nov. 5. "The Great American Trailer Park Musical" will keep audiences in stitches, with its campy humor and cockeyed shenanigans, at the Rep's Lyceum Stage in Horton Plaza through Dec. 4.

North Coast Repertory Theatre's production of "Heroes," a show translated by Tom Stoppard, is currently on the boards at NCR's Solana Beach theater. This poignant comedy of camaraderie among three aging veterans, directed by David Ellenstein, plays on through Nov. 13, with Jonathan McMurtry, Ken Ruta and a third powerhouse actor to be announced. Then on Nov. 18, the troupe will present a special 30th anniversary benefit performance of "Love Letters," starring artistic director David Ellenstein and wife Denise Young.

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


