We start off with a world-premiere adaptation of the best-selling novel, Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All, portrayed by a single woman: the incomparable Ellen Burstyn. We are delighted to have this multiple-award winning actress grace our stage – and in the spirited role of Lucy Marsden, the child-bride of a tough old captain of the Confederate army who weaves a series of colorful tales of her life in the South, the Civil War, and the triumphs and hardships of a captivating period in American history.

And leading off in the Carter is the gripping new drama, Splendour, by up-and-coming British playwright Abi Morgan, that hones in on a few critical hours in the lives of four fascinating women, all trapped in the grand state residence of a dictator in a war-torn eastern-European country. A timely tale, told in a unique, time-twisting form, by a fresh new voice in the theatre.

The rest of the season promises more delectable offerings, such as Stephen Metcalfe's newest work, Loves & Hours, a heartwarming play about a middle-aged man's search for love. Playing opposite in the Carter is another world premiere that probes the explosive relationships between Lydia, her 79-year-old mother Rose, and Rose's new African-American caretaker, Winsom. And wrapping up the season will be the epic Pentecost, an Evening Standard Award-winner that presents a dazzling array of ideas, from cultural ownership to the meaning and value of art, all across a backdrop of political intrigue; along with Rounding Third, a new comedy about a Little League baseball team, inspired by the playwright's own hilarious coaching experiences. And our Summer Festival, which we are thrilled to announce, will showcase the West Coast premiere of the off-Broadway hit, Dirty Blonde; David Ives' hilarious Time Flies, along with two perennial Shakespeare favorites – Much Ado About Nothing and Julius Caesar.

This incredible year takes on everything from momentous political issues, to the intricacy of everyday family relationships – all with the Globe's usual aplomb. It's just the beginning of an incredible artistic year for the Globe, and we're thrilled that you're here to share in the exhilaration we feel about what's ahead!

I read Splendour about a year and a half ago, soon after September 11, 2001...a date which will forever after be marked in this country as the day on which we learned to fear. I have not been able to get Splendour out of my mind since then.

Until 2001, I was a complacent person. I had known my share of trials and tribulations, but I generally felt safe and satisfied with my lot. However, since September 11th, I have found myself doubting my safety, worrying about who the people around me were, and spending like crazy. Yes, folks, when I feel threatened I go straight to retail therapy. I had never known before what it was to feel at risk - let alone to feel endangered.

I did not know what it was to fear. I still do not know - what it is to live in fear, to fear every waking moment, to awake in fear, to live your waking life in fear. I do not know what it is to fear falling asleep, to fear sleeping, to fear that you might not wake up, to fear that you will wake up and nothing will have changed.

The characters in Splendour live in fear, and they do so because they have been forced to fear; they have been provoked to fear; they have been incited to fear, by an oppressive government that has set them against one another, and purposely brought about a divide amongst their peoples. The four women here are dominated by a totalitarian dictator who has

manipulated every element of their society to create fear: fear of neighbors, fear of friends, and even fear of family.

What each of the women you are about to encounter has done to cope with her fear is take action, both positive and negative: by witnessing for the world, by buying things to fill the void, by loving the enemy, by informing on others that they used to love, all as a means to survive the frightening world in which they live. The more time I spend with the play, the more heroic I find each of these women, living in an impossible situation and not just surviving, but going out in glory.

Upon my first reading of the play, I did not open myself up to it, and I tried to push it into a linear pattern. That way of thinking did not work for this text, which is very different from the norm. Its form is contemporary, and its structure is not linear. Thus the arc of the story does not develop in a straight line, but instead by a collage of impressions. Abi Morgan has crafted it in this way, to illustrate the way of life for the four women we encounter – the eventual fragmentation of the text reflects the disintegration of their society.

The complex style of the play reminds me of Vita & Virginia, a play I directed when I first came to the Globe, which moves in and out of dialogue and direct address, spoken thought and past events. The play is impressionistic, but not in a softfocus kind of way, like the lily ponds of Monet; in Splendour, you get a very strong, stark relief, black and white impression – like a photograph – of every moment, that is not just physical, not just sensory, not just emotional, but is all these things – an impression of incredible dimension that is set in stark contrast to the previous moment. Time jumps back and forth.

We find ourselves in a country that is torn by civil war, in which the ethnic nationalities have been pitted against each other by a ruthless dictator. There is fighting in the city. The revolution is at hand. This could be any of several countries in our

Craig Noel was first appointed director in 1939, directing 15 productions prior to World War II, Since then has directed more than

221 plays of all styles and periods, and produced more than 365 (over 40 of which were directed by William Roesch from 1961 through 1976) His vision from the Globe during the past 60 years resulted in the establishment of the Shakespeare Festival in the late '40s, expansion to two theaters in the '50s, Globe Educational Tours in the '70s and Teatro Meta in the '80s. Among recent directorial assignments were The Pavilion and Over the River and Through the Woods.
