

We've got an exciting trio of productions that celebrate the season, including our annual tradition of Dr. Seuss' *How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*, made possible through the generosity of Audrey Geisel and the San Diego Union-Tribune. This delightful holiday

favorite is a perfect way to begin the Globe's yearlong Seussentennial celebration. In fact, this year out entire education program is being rethought and expanded. Additionally, we are in the process of creating the Old Globe Youth Council, to involve students in the everyday workings of the Globe and to give them a voice in future Globe projects.



DIRECTOR'S NOTES

by Jack O'Brien

here's really no point in telling you much about *How the Grinch Stole Christmas!*, since you are about to see for yourself. If this is your very first time in a theater, I can only say that I envy you the next 80 or so minutes, and rest assured that we're going to do our very best to make sure you never forget this moment, and that you continue to come back for the rest of your life.

If this is your zillionth time in the theater, you know how futile these program notes can be. If I have to "explain" anything, I probably shouldn't have tried to put it on stage in the first place, right? So we can get right past that one, as well.


No, what I wish to share with you in the brief moments before the house lights go down, is an appreciation for a very special kind of genius. The kind of genius that uses words in such an enchanting way as to make us—whether we are children or adults—want to read them! Actually want to read!

No need to talk about philosophy: there's plenty of it tucked away in the work of Dr. Seuss, and there will be ample opportunities for discovery in the delicious musical just ahead. But it's not just that Dr. Seuss had something to write about — it's the way he chose to write it. Words that are fun to see. Words that are fun to say. Words that must be repeated out loud, over and over, and yet, words that never tire our ears, no matter how many generations continue to repeat them.

Made up words. Inverted words. Silly words. Solemn words. Musical words. Percussive words. Words that float like feathers, that loop like birds, that squiggle like gerbils, that splat like tubas.

What an imagination he had! What a thrilling, unmistakable, unique, fabulous imagination. And that he chose to share it with us, while we're young — well, that's the most amazing thing of all!

He made, in the Grinch, a fantabulous creature, one that is destined to live forever. Right up there, I believe, with King Lear, and Harpagon, and Oedipus, and Saint Joan. A creature that fascinates, that challenges, that insults, that even scarifies us. And one we take to our hearts, like that other glowing holiday gorgon, Ebeneezer Scrooge — and for some of the very same reasons.



But in giving this creature to us, Dr. Seuss chose words that have never been put together in a similar way before, nor since. He's a reader's dream. Thank God!

It seems to us here at the Globe we have a great deal to be thankful for this holiday season. We are all here, together for the holidays, together with our real and chosen families. That's quite enough of a gift; but there in the same stocking, is someone called Dr. Seuss. And that, just possibly, is the very best present of all.



Seussentennial Celebrates 100 Years of Dr. Seuss!

In January of 2004, Dr. Seuss Enterprises is launching "Seussentennial: A Century of Imagination," an exciting yearlong tribute to Theodor Geisel (Dr. Seuss) in commemoration of what would have been his 100th birthday on March 2, 2004. Seussentennial will celebrate Geisel's creativity, imagination and invaluable contributions to American society that live on today through his beloved books and iconic characters.

Old Globe Events

- The Old Globe is joining in the Seussentennial celebration through a variety of activities surrounding its annual production of Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas!, including the provision of 4,000 free tickets to local children and families to see the Grinch at the Globe. Tickets are underwritten by Audrey Geisel, The San Diego Union-Tribune, along with generous additional support from several San Diego corporations.
- Other Globe events include the Seuss-abration for Kids, an annual event that brings 600 first graders from 25 classrooms to see Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas! at the Globe. This year's Seuss-abration also kicked off the first annual Grinch Children's Reading Initiative, an ongoing literacy project, in which these 600 children were given the challenge of working together as a classroom to read 100 books by March 2, 2004, which marks Dr. Seuss' birthday and "Read Across America" Day. On that date, Globe staff and cast members will participate in classroom readings. The Globe also launched its first annual Grinch Family Experience, which raised funds for the Globe's education and outreach programs while offering an exciting day of hands-on theatre activities for children and families.

• "From Mickey to The Grinch: Art of Animated

Film," organized by the Erie Art Museum in Erie, PA, is a traveling exhibit featuring the art, history and process of American animation from the beginnings of classic full animation in the 1930s up through the

revival of full animation in the 1970s.

- The United States Postal Service unveils the **Theodor Seuss** Geisel stamp in Springfield, MA on Oct. 27. The stamp becomes available nationwide on March 2.
- In January 2004, Random House Children's Books kicks off the "Imagination Tour" - 100 days of events and celebrations honoring Theodor Seuss Geisel's memory. - The American Library Association (ALA) announces the inception of the Theodor Seuss Geisel Award, in recognition of the country's best beginner reader book author.
- The Geisel Library at the University of California at San Diego unveils a three-part, yearlong rotating exhibit highlighting "The Seuss You Never Knew," "Ted Geisel's Never-Before-Seen Drawings and Cartoons" from the Dr. Seuss archives, and "Seussiana - Dr. Seuss as an American Icon."

• The Chase Group also is planning a major gallery tour and 2004 exhibition: The Art of Dr. Seuss - A Retrospective Exhibition. - Children's Museum of Manhattan unveils a major, new interactive exhibition to launch in Summer 2004. The fantastical exhibition, with environments and activities themed to the Seuss classic Oh Seuss! Off to Great Places, is slated to open in New York and then tour select cities around the country.

• A special Dr. Seuss profile in *USA* Today Weekend kicks off USA Today's annual "Make a Difference Day," the largest national day of service in the country, also benefiting First Book charity.

 Yearlong Seuss Landing birthday celebrations at Universal Theme Parks culminate in a special holiday event.

Craig Noel Artistic Director

Craig Noel was first appointed director in 1939, directing 15 productions prior to World War II, Since then has directed more than 221 plays of all styles and periods, and produced more than 365 (over 40 of which were directed by William Roesch from 1961 through 1976) His vision for the Globe during the past 60 years resulted in the establishment of the Shakespeare Festival in the late '40s, expansion to two theaters in the '50s, Globe Educational Tours in the '70s and Teatro Meta in the '80s. Among recent directorial assignments were The Pavilion and Over the River and Through the Woods. ELSEWHERE: during the 1940s, dialogue director, 20th Century Fox Studios; former director, Ernie Pyle Theatre, Tokyo. Louis G. Spisto Executive Director

Louis G. Spisto was appointed Executive Director of The Old Globe in October 2002. He has over twenty years experience managing some of this country's leading arts organizations, where his track record for fiscal as well as artistic leadership has been highly praised. He returns to the Southern California arts community from his most recent position as Executive Director of American Ballet Theatre in New York City. While there, he increased ticket income and annual contributions for the organization by nearly 20 percent. He also tripled the Ballet's touring weeks and the resources devoted to education and training programs. Prior to his position at the ABT, he served as the President of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, where he provided fundraising leadership and creative direction for the orchestra's \$60 million renovation project, and helped dramatically increase ticket sales while initiating several new series for the orchestra. Spisto established a reputation as a superb arts executive here in California, where he spent over ten years as the Executive Director of the Pacific Symphony Orchestra in Orange County. During his tenure there, he tripled the orchestra's annual budget all while eliminating a prior deficit and successfully completing the orchestra's first endowment campaign. In addition, he established a series of innovative recording projects with Sony Classical and oversaw many nationally-recognized commissioning projects. A strong advocate of arts education, he built one of the largest and most respected music training and outreach efforts. During his career, Spisto has also served as Director of Marketing for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and Director of Operations and Development for the Performing Arts Center at UC Berkeley. He holds a Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin in Arts Administration and a Bachelors of Business Administration from the University of Notre Dame, and spent many years acting, directing and producing plays and musicals throughout his student days, as well as in professional summer theater.





PARISIAN PORTRAITS

The Timken Museum of Art in Balboa Park presents Portraiture in Paris Around 1800: Cooper Penrose by Jacques-Louis David, through Feb. 15. The exhibition highlights a narrow time frame, 1799-1804, and includes not only the Timken's celebrated Jacques-Louis David painting of Irish businessman and abolitionist Cooper Penrose, but also a collection of portraits by some of David's contemporaries. David, considered by many to be one of the finest French painters of all time, is best known for his portraits of Napoleon and depictions of events in France in the late-18th century. Featuring works on loan from the J. Paul Getty Museum, Metropolitan Museum of Art and Frick Collection, among others, the exhibition also showcases portraits by some lesser-known Parisian artists of the time, including several women. THE MAGIC CIRCLE

Queen Califia's Magical Circle, the only American sculpture garden created by renowned French-American artist Niki de Saint Phalle, has opened to the public at Kit Carson Park in Escondido. Bloum Cardenas, de Saint Phalle's granddaughter and trustee of the newly established Niki Charitable Art Foundation, calls the site her grandmother's gift to the region. "This garden," she says, "is the final realization ... of Niki's dream, to create a wonderful legacy for a place she dearly loved." San Diego had become the artist's home in 1994, and the garden was her last major project before her death in May 2002. It is one of only four large-scale sculptural environments designed and built by de Saint Phalle and her studio (the others are

in Italy, Germany and Israel). The garden incorporates images from regional myth and history, and features as its centerpiece an 11-foot mosaic sculpture of the Amazon Queen Califia, the legendary figure for whom our state is named. Surrounding Califia are eight totemic sculptures ranging in height from 11 to 21 feet, adorned with stylized monsters, protective deities, geometric symbols, crests, skulls, humans and animals. The site is also encircled by a 120-foot diameter, undulating "snake wall." RUSSIAN ICON

Fingerhut Gallery presents The Portraits of Sergey Smirnov, through Nov. 14. A Russian native, Sergey Smirnov graduated as valedictorian from the Moscow City Art College, and landed a job restoring aging church icons and frescoes. He continued the long-standing Russian tradition of painting icons, as well—his work now graces several major churches in Russia. In 1994, he decided to devote his time to a more personal vision, one influenced by Klimt, Modigliani, Rembrandt and the masters of slavic icon painting. Smirnov's portraits are of people from his imagination, historical figures and images from his childhood. Smirnov was only the third living artist to have a solo show in the Kremlin's world-class Manezh gallery, and his work is held in the collections of numerous Russian business and political leaders, including Boris Yeltsin. 1205 Prospect St., La Jolla; Monday/Tuesday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m.; Wednesday through Saturday, 10 a.m.-10 p.m.; and Sunday, noon-6 p.m.; (858) 456-9900, fingerhutart.com.
