Synopsis

Summer in Beaumont sur Mer, a fashionable resort on the French Riviera. Another season is just beginning for Lawrence Jameson, a British con artist posing as the deposed prince of a fictional country. Targeting wealthy female tourists who are all too happy to finance his mission to regain his throne, Lawrence's perfect set-up is threatened when a clever young American grifter known as "The Jackal" is rumored to be encroaching on his territory.

Returning from a banking trip to Switzerland, Lawrence watches as Freddy Benson tries to scam a woman on the train with pathetic tales of his grandmother needing an operation. Feeling this new pretender to the throne is no match for him, Lawrence quickly gets rid of the competition. Freddy, however, is on to Lawrence as well, follows him to his chateau and threatens to expose his charade unless Lawrence teaches him everything he knows. The master and student soon prove to be an effective team when Freddy poses as the Prince's younger brother Ruprecht.

Unfortunately the two soon realize that there's not room enough for both of them to work this town and set up a bet — whoever can swindle \$50,000 from a proposed female target will stay on as the reigning prince of Beaumont sur Mer, while the other must move on. When Christine Colgate, a young heiress known as the American Soap Queen, arrives for her first taste of the Riviera, the two have found their mark. What follows are a series of schemes, masquerades and double-crosses in which nothing may ever be exactly what it seems.

Sintiendo que este nuevo pretendiente al trono no tiene punto de comparación con él, Lawrence se deshace de la competencia de immediato. Más sin embargo, Freddy, al igual que Lawrence, lo sigue hasta su castillo y lo amenaza con divulgar su treta a menos de que Lawrence le enseñe todo lo que sabe. El maestro y el discípulo se convierten en un gran equipo cuando Freddy posa como el hermano menor del príncipe Ruprecht.

Desafortunadamente se dan cuenta que no existe suficiente espacio para los dos en el mismo pueblo, así que hacen una apuesta y el que pueda estafarle \$50,000 a una dama podrá permanecer como el príncipe de Beaumont sur Mer, mintras que el otro deberá de irse de ese lugar. Los dos encuentran el punto al blanco cuando llega por primavera vez a la Riviera la joven heredera Christine Colgate, conocida también como la Reina del Jabón Americana. A continuación aparencen varias intrigas, fingimientos y traiciones, en las cuales las apariencias engañan.



John Lithgow

(Lawrence Jameson)



John Lithgow was born to a theatrical family in Rochester, New York, and grew up in Ohio, where his father produced Shakespeare festivals throughout the state. At the age of six, Mr. Lithgow made his

stage debut in a production of Henry VI, Part 3. After graduating from Harvard, he won a Fulbright Scholarship and used the opportunity to study at the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art. In 1973, he settled in New York, where his debut performance in David Storey's The Changing Room won him his first Tony Award®. Since then he has appeared on Broadway 18 times in a wide variety of plays, including My Fat Friend, Trelawny of the "Wells," Comedians, Anna Christie, Spokesong, Once in a Lifetime, Bedroom Farce, Beyond Therapy, and last season's Retreat from Moscow with Eileen Atkins. Most recently he appeared opposite Sigourney Weaver in A.R. Gurney's Mrs. Farnsworth at Tribeca's Flea Theatre. Mr. Lithgow first achieved national attention when his portrayal of Roberta Muldoon in The World According to Garp was nominated for a 1982 Academy Award. Since then he has continued to win popular and critical acclaim for his work in film, on television, and on stage, garnering numerous awards, including a second Tony for the musical Sweet Smell of Success, three Drama Desk Awards, Tony nominations for Requiem for a Heavyweight and M. Butterfly, ten Emmy nominations, four Emmy Awards (three of them for NBC's 3rd Rock from the Sun) and a Golden Globe. His films include Terms of Endearment (a second Oscar nomination), Twilight Zone: The Movie, Harry and the Hendersons, Footloose, Cliffhanger, Shrek, A Civil Action, the forthcoming Kinsey, and many more. This fall he will appear on HBO as Blake Edwards in The Life and Death of Peter Sellers, with Geoffrey Rush. In recent years, Mr. Lithgow has turned his attention to younger audiences. He has published four Simon & Schuster picture books for children, all of which appeared on The New York Times best seller list. A fifth, Carnival of the Animals, comes out this September. He has released two CDs of songs for children, Singin' in the Bathtub and

Farkle and Friends, and has sung concerts for children with the Chicago, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Detroit, and yes, San Diego Symphony Orchestras. In the spring, Mr. Lithgow published his first book for parents, A Lithgow Palooza: 101 Ways to Entertain and Inspire Your Kids, which has won the prestigious Parent's Choice Silver Honor Award. Finally, he recently wrote the narration for Christopher Wheeldon's new ballet, Carnival of the Animals, for the New York City Ballet. In its seven performances to date, Mr. Lithgow has spoken the narration himself and has even danced the role of the Elephant!



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










Iack O'Brien Artistic Director

Craig Noel Artistic Director

Craig Noel was first appointed director in 1939, directing 15 productions prior to World War II. Since then he has directed more than 220 plays of all styles and periods, and produced more that 365 (over 40 of which were directed by William Roesch from 1961 through 1976). His vision for The Old Globe during the past 65 years has resulted in the establishment of the Shakespeare Festival in the late '40s, the expansion to two theaters in the '50s, Globe Educational Tours in the '70s and Teatro Meta in the '80s. His recent directorial assignments include The Pavilion, Over the River and Through the Woods, Scotland Road, Springtime for Henry, Travels with My Aunt, Voir Dire, Mister Roberts, Time of My Life, Wonderful Tennessee, Mr. A's Amazing Maze Plays, The King of the Kosher Grocers, Morning's at Seven, The White Rose, Shirley Valentine, And a Nightingale Sang, The School for Scandal, The Road to Mecca, Love's Labour's Lost, The Boiler Room, The Night of the Iguana, and Intimate Exchanges. ELSEWHERE: During the 1940s Noel served as dialogue director for 20th Century Fox Studios and was the former director of the Ernie Pyle Theatre, Tokyo. Described by Variety as the eminence grise of San Diego theatre, Noel is one of the few San Diegans to have an entire year (1987) proclaimed in his honor, and to be named one of San Diego's "Living Treasures." Additional honors include the Governor's Award for the Arts; inclusion in The San Diego Union's list of 25 persons who shaped San Diego; 1985 Outstanding Alumnus of the Year; San Diego Press Club Headliner Award; a combined tribute from the Public Arts Advisory Council and San Diego County Board of Supervisors (1984); Shiley Award for Lifetime Achievement (1999 Patté), Member, College of Fellows of the American Theatre. He is particularly proud of the following two honors representing education and theatre: Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters, University of San Diego and the annual Awards for Excellence in Theatre named in his honor by the San Diego Theatre Critics Circle.



Louis G. Spisto Executive Director

Louis G. Spisto was appointed Executive Director of The Old Globe in October 2002. He has over 20 years experience managing some of this country's leading arts organizations, where his track record for fiscal as well as artistic leadership has been highly praised. He returns to the Southern California arts community from his most recent position as Executive Director of American Ballet Theatre in New York City. While there, he increased ticket income and annual contributions for the organization by nearly 20 percent. He also tripled the Ballet's touring weeks and the resources devoted to education and training programs. Prior to his position at the ABT, he served as the President of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, where he provided fundraising leadership and creative direction for the orchestra's \$60 million renovation project, and helped dramatically increase ticket sales while initiating several new series for the orchestra. Spisto established a reputation as a superb arts executive here in California, where he spent over ten years as the Executive Director of the Pacific Symphony Orchestra in Orange County. During his tenure there, he tripled the orchestra's annual budget all while eliminating a prior deficit and successfully completing the orchestra's first endowment campaign. In addition, he established a series of innovative recording projects with Sony Classical and oversaw many nationally-recognized commissioning projects. A strong advocate of arts education, he built one of the largest and most respected music training and outreach efforts. During his career, Spisto has also served as Director of Marketing for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and Director of Operations and Development for the Performing Arts Center at UC Berkeley. He holds a Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin in Arts Administration and a Bachelors of Business Administration from the University of Notre Dame, and spent many years acting, directing and producing plays and musicals throughout his student days, as well as in professional summer theater.

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
