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

### Synopsis

Late on a June night in Chicago in 1975, advice columnist Ann Landers is hard at work. While writing the next column for her sixty million readers, her daughter, Margo, phones to check up on her. Landers — whose real name is Eppie Lederer — explains that she's been distracted, sorting through twenty years of her past columns in order to assemble her favorites into a book.

The letters from her readers cover a startling range. One woman asks if it's okay to do her housework in the nude. Another confesses that he's fed up after thirty years of enduring his wife's attempts to master playing the accordion.

Eppie takes pride in the reach of the daily column, knowing that many readers send it on to give others a hint, or to say "I told you so." A mention in her column prompted over a million pieces of mail to Washington, resulting in passage of the National Cancer Act.

Eppie attempts to finish the column in her typewriter, but the letters she sorts through recall significant events from her life. A less welcome intrusion is the call from her identical twin sister Popo, who is also an advice columnist known as Dear Abby. Finally, she withdraws to work in her favorite setting: her custom-built bathtub.

When she returns, she has completed most of the column, one unlike any other. This prompts her to recall other times she broke new ground: her frank discourses on sexual topics, and her unpublicized trip to Vietnam in 1968 to visit hospitalized service men and women. Finally, another day's work for the world's most widely read columnist comes to an end.

Una noche de junio en Chicago en el año de 1975, Ann Landers, columnista de consejos, se encuentra trabajando arduamente. Mientras que escribe la siguiente columna para sus sesenta millones de lectores, su hija Margo la telefonea para saber cómo se encuentra. Landers, quien en realidad se llama Eppie Lederer, le explica que se encuentra algo distraída ya que se ha puesto a revisar columnas de los pasados veinte años para poder armar un libro con su selecciones favoritas.

Las cartas de sus lectores son de un sorprendente rango de variedad. Una mujer le pregunta si es malo hacer los quehaceres al desnudo. Otro lector le confiesa estar arto de aguantarse 30 años de que su mujer trate de aprender a tocar el acordión.

Eppie toma orgullo en el poder tocar a sus lectores, sabiendo que muchos de ellos mandan cartas para ver si otros la captan o para poder decir "ya ves, te lo dije." Una de sus columnas logró reunir un millón de cartas a Washington, resultando en la aprobación del Acto Nacional Contra el Cancer.

Eppie procura terminar de escribir la columna en su máquina de escribir, pero las cartas que separa le recuerdan acontecimientos significativos de su vida. Un acontecimiento no muy bien recibido es la llamada telefónica de su hermana gemela, Popo, quien también es una columnista de consejos conocida como Dear Abby. Finalmente se retira a trabajar en su ámbito favorito: una tina hecha a la medida.

Cuando regresa, casi ha terminado la columna, resultando en una columna sin igual. Esto la lleva a recordar otros tiempos cuando presentó inovadores temas, tales como sus sinceros discursos de temas sexuales y la visita que jamás se publicó — y la cual hizo en el año de 1968 — a Vietnam, con el propósito de visitar a los hombres y mujeres militares que se encontraban hospitalizados. Finalmente el día de trabajo termina para la mundialmente reconocida columnista.

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#### CASSANDRA AT MY KITCHEN TABLE

If you think for a moment about reading Ann Landers in the daily paper, you'll probably get a vivid recollection of your breakfast table. The table I remember is the pumpkin-colored Formica "breakfast bar" set with apple-green Melamine dishes in our rural Pennsylvania kitchen around 1970. I had just been deemed old enough to have a cup of coffee with breakfast. I had also just started reading the newspaper every morning, and thus discovered Ann Landers' column.

I thought her masthead photo looked like one of those prim squares who railed against rock music and hippies, but the stuff she printed — wow!

In the repressed, euphemism-laden years before Oprah, Dr. Phil, and tell-all Talk Radio, Ann Landers gave us both permission and a much-needed vocabulary to openly discuss alcoholism, homosexuality, out-of-wedlock pregnancy, incest, venereal disease, masturbation, depression, impotence, frigidity — and more. It seemed she'd take on any question or concern — no matter how sensitive — and respond with her distinct blend of directness, compassion and sassy wit.

Husbands of non-responsive wives were counseled, "Many are cold, but few are frozen." She chided a letter carrier who complained that housewives on his route were still in sleepwear at breakfast, "You ain't ever been a woman at eight o'clock in the morning."

Concerned that an American G.I. was rushing into a marriage with a Vietnamese girl he'd met in country, she advised, "Make sure your two feet are planted on good old terra firma — and the firma the betta." To the woman who wrote that she wanted to marry her fiance's father, Landers snapped, "Drop Daedalus." Though her core values were staunchly rooted in her Midwestern childhood, she was able to change with the times.

She came to know it's unrealistic to expect that every bride be a virgin (though intercourse for high-schoolers remained off-limits). While one of the first to deal publicly and compassionately with homosexuality, it took decades for her to understand that it wasn't an illness. Ultimately, she even supported civil unions for gay couples. She found pornography "rotten," but thought censorship was a greater evil. With time, legalization and regulation of prostitution struck her as sane public health policy, and she even wrote in defense of decriminalizing marijuana.

The column she wrote for 47 years was really a conversation with us as we navigated the most socially turbulent era in our nation's history. That conversation with her audience inspired the form of *The Lady with All the Answers*. You have a role to play in this dialogue, and I think you'll find it easy to perform: just think back and remember your breakfast table.

Every New Year's Day, Ann Landers ran the same column. But she felt it applied to every day of the year. In part, it read:

Make this coming year better than all the others. Vow to do some things you've always wanted to do but "couldn't find the time."

Call up a neglected friend. Drop an old grudge. Share a funny story. A good laugh can be better than any medicine.

Vow not to make a promise you don't think you can keep. Pay a debt. Give a soft answer.

Encourage some youth to do his or her best. Share your experience and offer support. Young people need role models more than they need critics.

Apologize when you realize you are wrong. An apology never diminishes a person. It elevates.

Try to understand a point of view different from your own.

When your temperature reaches the boiling point, ask yourself, "Will it matter a week from today?" Laugh the loudest when the joke is on you.

The way to have a friend is to be one. We are all connected by our humanity and we need each other.

Return those books you borrowed. Reschedule that missed appointment. Clean out your closet.

Take better care of yourself. Pass up that second helping. Walk tall and smile more. You'll look ten years younger.

Don't be afraid to say, "I love you." Say it again. They are the sweetest words in the world.

If you have love in your life, this new year can be the best one ever.



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

It has since grown into an internationally-acclaimed, Tony Award®-winning regional theatre that has stood as San Diego's flagship arts institution for seven decades. Today, of the over two thousand professional theatres in the country, the Globe ranks in the top ten - in number of productions, annual budget and quality of work. Craig Noel, who celebrates his 90th birthday this year, has been a part of the Globe's history for nearly all of its 70 years, and it is his vision that steered the Globe from a community theatre to the year-round professional organization it has become. Along the way he brought in many outstanding actors, designers and directors, including two-time Tony-winner

Jack O'Brien, who became the Globe's Artistic

Director in 1981.



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

### DIRECTOR Profiles



Louis G. Spisto
Executive Director

Louis G. Spisto has been Executive Director of The Old Globe since October, 2002. During his tenure, Spisto spearheaded the return of the Globe's acclaimed Shakespeare Repertory Season and produced several world-premiere plays and musicals, including the current Broadway musical Dirty Rotten Scoundrels. During the past two seasons, the organization has grown its subscription audience an unprecedented amount, countering a trend in the non-profit theatre industry and resulting in the highest level of attendance in over a decade. Prior to coming to the Globe, Spisto served as the Executive Director of American Ballet Theatre in New York City. While there, he increased ticket income and annual contributions for the organization by nearly 20 percent. He also tripled the Ballet's touring weeks and the resources devoted to education and training programs. Spisto has also served as the President of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, where he provided fundraising leadership and creative direction for the orchestra's \$60 million renovation project, and helped dramatically increase ticket sales while initiating several new series for the orchestra. Spisto established a reputation as a superb arts executive here in California, where he spent over ten years as the Executive Director of the Pacific Symphony Orchestra in Orange County. During his tenure there, he tripled the orchestra's annual budget, all while eliminating a prior deficit and successfully completing the orchestra's first endowment campaign. In addition, he established a series of innovative recording projects with Sony Classical and oversaw a number of nationally recognized commissioning projects. A strong advocate of arts education, Spisto built one of the largest and most respected music training and outreach efforts. During his career, Spisto has also served as Director of Marketing for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and Director of Operations and Development for the Performing Arts Center, UC Berkeley. He holds a Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin in Arts Administration and a Bachelors of Business Administration from the University of Notre Dame, and spent many years acting, directing and producing plays and musicals throughout his student days, as well as in professional summer theatre.



Jerry Patch Resident Artistic Director

Jerry Patch was appointed Resident Artistic Director of The Old Globe in February 2005. He most recently served as the Dramaturg and a member of the long standing artistic team at Southern California's Tony Award®-winning South Coast Repertory (SCR), where he coordinated the development of 150 new plays, including three Pulitzer Prize winners and numerous other finalists. Patch became the top choice for this new role at the Globe due to his many years of artistic accomplishments, his exceptional relationships with the nation's leading directors and playwrights, and his enthusiastic commitment to new work. While at SCR, Patch worked as Dramaturg on numerous new works, including Donald Margulies' Sight Unseen and Brooklyn Boy, which just opened to critical acclaim on Broadway, Margaret Edson's Pulitzer Prize-winning Wit, Howard Korder's Search and Destroy, Amy Freed's The Beard of Avon, as well as Intimate Apparel, Freedomland and several world-premieres plays by Richard Greenberg, including Three Days of Rain and A Naked Girl on the Appian Way. In addition, he co-conceived The Education of Randy Newman with Michael Roth and Mr. Newman. Patch also served as the project director of SCR's renowned Pacific Playwrights Festival, which annually introduces seven new plays to an audience of national theatre leaders. Typically, more than 75% of the plays presented receive multiple productions in theatres across the country. During his tenure at SCR, Patch also held the position of Artistic Director (1990-1997) of The Sundance Theatre Program, which included the Sundance Playwrights Laboratory, one of the nation's leading new play development programs. Additionally, he ran the Sundance Summer Theatre, a repertory of 2-3 productions staged outdoors for Utah audiences and The Sundance Children's Theatre, which was dedicated to the development and presentation of new works for family audiences by leading American playwrights. He has also served as a consulting Dramaturg for New York's renowned Roundabout Theatre Company, one of two of the largest theatre companies in the country.
