Twyla Tharp's Bob Dylan-Inspired Circus

Twyla Tharp and Bob Dylan. Both artists came out of the American Heartland, both born in 1941, only 5 weeks apart. Raised in an era of post-World War II American idealism, they came of age and emerged as artists in a time of political and social unrest. In separate careers, each spanning over 40 years, they have told stories — legends and truths — in unprecedented and unequivocal ways.

Bob Dylan has written over one thousand songs that are, to quote *Time Magazine*, "personal testaments, delivered with a literal and savage electricity, that became part of a cultural vocabulary and an ongoing American myth." Twyla Tharp has created over one hundred twenty-five dances, creations that are tacitly told stories which purely physical and uniquely visceral expression is the language used to explore both American culture and the human condition.

Now Tharp, who has previously used the popular music of such contemporary artists as The Beach Boys, Frank Sinatra, David Byrne and Billy Joel to inform her physical narratives, has been handed the

full canon of the 20th century's most influential minstrel. She created THE TIMES THEY ARE A-CHANGIN', an ancient tale seen through a modern dream world, a place of transformation and exaggeration in which the songs that tell the story seem to come from a place deep within the subconscious.

THE TIMES THEY ARE A-CHANGIN' is set within a low-rent traveling circus run by Captain Arab. Arab's wagon hasn't moved from its location in quite some time, although not by lack of effort from the ragtag band of clowns and performers under his command. One such performer is Cleo, the circus' animal trainer, a young woman exploited by Arab and loved by his son, Coyote. Coyote longs for a different world outside the confines of the family business, where darkness and fear lie beneath the surface. As the circus show plays out, Coyote must decide whether to flee or stay, and if he does stay, he must learn how to inspire change within the troupe.

The narrative presents a funky collision of the two artists' legacies — Tharp has

And don't criticize

What you can't understand

Are beyond your command

Your old road is

Rapidly agin'.

Please get out of the new one

If you can't lend your hand

For the times

they are a-changin'

created characters which speak through Dylan's musical poetry — wide-ranging observations about the nature of life and the world, rich in wit and wisdom. And she has placed these characters in a stark physical universe in which elements of the fantastic combine with a deadpan sense of presentation to create a purely theatrical reality.

A tale of fathers and sons, of men and women, of leaders and followers, of immobility and change, THE TIMES THEY ARE A-CHANGIN' uses prophecy, parable, metaphor, accusation and confession — like the Dylan songs which comprise it — to force change within its world. At once dark and humorous, this musical aims to confront us with images and ideas of who we are and who it is possible to be.

MacArthur Fellowship. She is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an Honorary Member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. She continues to create, write and lecture.

Bob Dylan

(Music and Lyrics)

Bob Dylan is one of the world's most popular and acclaimed songwriters, musicians and performers, having sold more than 90 million albums and performed literally thousands of shows around the world in a career spanning five decades. His most recent studio albums, Time Out Of Mind and Love & Theft have been among his most commercially successful and critically lauded, each having sold more than a million copies and earning Grammy nominations for Album of the Year (Time Out Of Mind won that award in 1998). He has written over 500 songs, including such timeless works as "Blowin' In The Wind," "The Times They Are A-Changin'," "All Along The Watchtower," "Like A Rolling Stone," "Knockin' On Heaven's Door," "Just Like A Woman," and "Lay Lady Lay." In 2001, he received a Golden Globe and an Academy Award for Best Song from a Motion Picture for "Things Have Changed" from the movie Wonder Boys. Dylan's songs have been covered by over 2000 different artists, including The Rolling Stones, Rod Stewart, Guns N Roses, P.J. Harvey, Garth Brooks, Stevie Wonder, Rage Against The Machine, Pearl Jam, Neil Young, Tom Petty, Sheryl Crow, Duke Ellington, Jimi Hendrix, and many others. Dylan's Chronicles - Volume I, his recent memoirs released in October, 2004, was a world-wide best seller, spending 19 weeks on The New York Times Bestseller List. He was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1988 and the Songwriters Hall Of Fame in 1982. His many honors include a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award, the Kennedy Center Honor, the Commandeur de L'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres, the highest cultural award bestowed by the French Government, the ASCAP Founders Award, and honorary doctorates from Princeton University and St. Andrews University, Scotland. Bob Dylan remains one of the world's top touring artists, performing more than 100 concerts yearly around the globe.

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
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
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
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BRENDA MARSH-REBELO AND JOHN REBELO

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

DIRECTOR Profiles



Louis G. Spisto
Executive Director

Louis G. Spisto has been Executive Director of The Old Globe since October, 2002. During his tenure, Spisto spearheaded the return of the Globe's acclaimed Shakespeare Repertory Season and produced several world-premiere plays and musicals, including the current Broadway musical Dirty Rotten Scoundrels. During the past two seasons, the organization has grown its subscription audience an unprecedented amount, countering a trend in the non-profit theatre industry and resulting in the highest level of attendance in over a decade. Prior to coming to the Globe, Spisto served as the Executive Director of American Ballet Theatre in New York City. While there, he increased ticket income and annual contributions for the organization by nearly 20 percent. He also tripled the Ballet's touring weeks and the resources devoted to education and training programs. Spisto has also served as the President of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, where he provided fundraising leadership and creative direction for the orchestra's \$60 million renovation project, and helped dramatically increase ticket sales while initiating several new series for the orchestra. Spisto established a reputation as a superb arts executive here in California, where he spent over ten years as the Executive Director of the Pacific Symphony Orchestra in Orange County. During his tenure there, he tripled the orchestra's annual budget, all while eliminating a prior deficit and successfully completing the orchestra's first endowment campaign. In addition, he established a series of innovative recording projects with Sony Classical and oversaw a number of nationally recognized commissioning projects. A strong advocate of arts education, Spisto built one of the largest and most respected music training and outreach efforts. During his career, Spisto has also served as Director of Marketing for the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and Director of Operations and Development for the Performing Arts Center, UC Berkeley. He holds a Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin in Arts Administration and a Bachelors of Business Administration from the University of Notre Dame, and spent many years acting, directing and producing plays and musicals throughout his student days, as well as in professional summer theatre.



Jerry Patch
Resident Artistic Director

Jerry Patch was appointed Resident Artistic Director of The Old Globe in February 2005. He most recently served as the Dramaturg and a member of the long standing artistic team at Southern California's Tony Award®-winning South Coast Repertory (SCR), where he coordinated the development of 150 new plays, including three Pulitzer Prize winners and numerous other finalists. Patch became the top choice for this new role at the Globe due to his many years of artistic accomplishments, his exceptional relationships with the nation's leading directors and playwrights, and his enthusiastic commitment to new work. While at SCR, Patch worked as Dramaturg on numerous new works, including Donald Margulies' Sight Unseen and Brooklyn Boy, which just opened to critical acclaim on Broadway, Margaret Edson's Pulitzer Prize-winning Wit, Howard Korder's Search and Destroy, Amy Freed's The Beard of Avon, as well as Intimate Apparel, Freedomland and several world-premieres plays by Richard Greenberg, including Three Days of Rain and A Naked Girl on the Appian Way. In addition, he co-conceived *The Education of* Randy Newman with Michael Roth and Mr. Newman. Patch also served as the project director of SCR's renowned Pacific Playwrights Festival, which annually introduces seven new plays to an audience of national theatre leaders. Typically, more than 75% of the plays presented receive multiple productions in theatres across the country. During his tenure at SCR, Patch also held the position of Artistic Director (1990-1997) of The Sundance Theatre Program, which included the Sundance Playwrights Laboratory, one of the nation's leading new play development programs. Additionally, he ran the Sundance Summer Theatre, a repertory of 2-3 productions staged outdoors for Utah audiences and The Sundance Children's Theatre, which was dedicated to the development and presentation of new works for family audiences by leading American playwrights. He has also served as a consulting Dramaturg for New York's renowned Roundabout Theatre Company, one of two of the largest theatre companies in the country.
